A contract for 19.81 miles of construction on SH 86 and FM 1065 in Briscoe and Floyd counties has been awarded to a Lubbock firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway

Boswell and Crafton, Inc. submitted the low bid of \$243,866 on the project. Grading, structures, widen base and surfacing from Quitaque to the top of the Cap Rock on SH 86, from Quitaque to Los Linguish Creek on FM 1065, from FM 146 to Armstrong County line and from SH 86 in Quitaque west and east 3.6 miles is expected o take 120 working days, accordng to Palmer Massey, District Highway Engineer at Childress.



It kills some insects by contact, but its greatest asset is that it kills most sucking and chewing insects by systemic action. When Bidrin is applied to growing cotton, it is almost immediately absorbed into the plant. Its killing action to insects in the plant may last from one to two weeks. Since most of Bidrin applied to cotton plants is absorbed it is not available on the plant surface. Hence, beneficial insects develop in a normal way. In a 1962 cotton season, Bidrin was used with good results for thrip control on 1500 acres of cotton of lands of the Texas Prison Farm System. semesters at McMurry College.
