### Farm Safety Week Is July 21-27

"Inspection Plus Correction Equals Protection" is the theme for National Farm Safety Week, July 21-27. President John F. Kennedy, in proclaiming the week, called upon all Americans, especially those allied with agriculture, to unite their efforts to cut down the number of farm, home and highway accidents.

The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, long active in the promotion of rural safety, points out the need for making farm and home safety a year-round effort. Prevention of accidents takes action by people and it must be continuous throughout every year, says the Council.

A very high percentage of all farm accidents can be traced to a specific cause, and carelessness is a major contributor, the councilmen say. A little checking close to home, they add, will likely reveal that most crippling or fatal accidents on the farm or in the home result from actions wherein people should know better.

The accident record of agriculture is not good and with the ever-increasing use of power machinery and allied equipment, the rate can be expected to move higher unless the people involved make up their minds to do something about it, warns the Council. Therefore, they add, it's up to farm families to find and remove hazards which can cause accidents and to practice safety in their daily living. The outstanding records in accident prevention by other industries of the nation haven't just happened, says the Council, but are the result of well-planned and conducted safety educational programs.

National Farm Safety Week is sponsored by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the National Safety Council. They work in cooperation with the state Agricultural Extension Services, farm organizations, the farm press, radio, television and other interested individuals and groups.

A free barbecue will be served in the Silvertown Park from 5:00 until 7:00 p.m. Thursday, August 8. The highlight of Friday, August 9, will be Silvertown's second annual Appaloosa Horse Show. Judging starts at 11:00 a.m.

The Fiddler's Contest will be conducted on the square in Silvertown beginning at 2:30 p.m. Saturday, August 10. Fiddlers from

all over the area are invited to participate.

Rodeo dances will begin on each of the three nights at 9:30. Music will be by Jimmy Mackey and The All Stars.

The V.F.W. Rodeo will begin at 8:00 p.m. each of the three nights. Stock will be furnished by Ratjen Brothers of Happy, Texas. Events will include Tie Down Calf Roping, Heading and Heeling and Face, Saddle Bronc Riding, Bull Dogging, Ladies Barrel Race,

Bareback Bronc Riding, Bull Riding, Kids (15 and under) Breakaway Roping, and a Calf Scramble. Books close Thursday, August 8, at 11:00 a.m. Entry fees must accompany the entry. The club reserves the right to run into one go-round if necessary.

### Engineers For Kent Creek Watershed Arriving This Month

Announcement has been made by the Board of Directors that work will begin about August 1 on the Kent Creek Watershed.

The first crews to arrive will be an advance corps of engineers. Requests for housing in the Turkey-Quitque area have been numerous, and the Watershed workers are expected to remain in the area at least one year.

Work has already begun toward letting contracts for Sites One, Two and Three (the Mayfield, Weaver and Tate dams) and thirty days later bids will be let on the remaining four structures. On November 1 it is expected that contracts will be let for the eight miles of channel improvement, and if everything goes as planned construction should be underway in 60 to 90 days.

Instead of the original completion time of three years, it is now hoped that with the concentrated effort completion can be in 12 to 18 months.

The money for the project has been approved and set aside in Washington, the engineers have their orders, and at long last the Kent Creek Watershed in Briscoe and Hall counties is about to become a reality.

### Three Rural Traffic Accidents In June

The Highway Patrol investigated three rural traffic accidents in Briscoe County during the month of June according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for one person killed, six persons injured and an estimated property damage in the amount of \$4,300.00.

The Sergeant stated that this brings the total for the year thus far in Briscoe County to 12 accidents that claimed one life, injured 11 people and caused property damage of \$8,425.00.

For a comparison, the Patrol Supervisor pointed to accidents in this county for the first six months of 1962 that accounted for two deaths, six injuries, and property damage of \$4,835.00.

"Prior to July 1, there had been a total of 941 fatal accidents in Texas," Sergeant Wells said, "that took the lives of 1136 persons."

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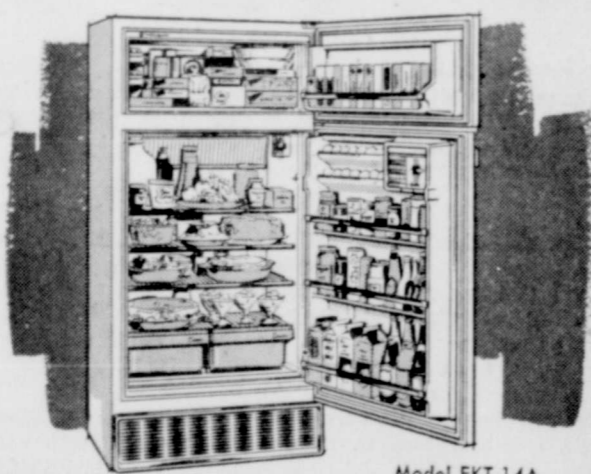
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# State Capital NEWS

AUSTIN, TEXAS —A growing toll of accidents on city streets and freeways, heavier damage claims and an act of the Legislature . . . all have combined to cause insured motorists in Texas a double-dip premium increase during the next five months.

First boost for most drivers will come on policies renewed after August 1, when no wait insurance rates set by the State Board of Insurance go into effect.

Many others face a second increase in liability insurance premiums after January 1. This is effective date of a new law requiring financial responsibility of \$10,000 per person and \$20,000 per accident.

Present law requires \$5,000-\$10,000. So those now carrying minimum insurance will pay an average of \$4 more after January 1.

Increasing accident losses, mainly in urban areas, forced Insurance Board to hike liability and collision rates in most sections of the state.

Average premium boosts after August 1 will be 5.2% for property damage and 8.4% for collision. This will cost policyholders a total of \$12,000,000. Drivers in some rural areas, however, escaped the rate increase.

### Physical Education

Attorney General Waggoner Carr has been asked to come to the aid of hardpressed physical education departments in the 20 state-supported universities and colleges.

Commission on Higher Education asked Carr for an opinion on the legality of the "rider" in the new appropriation bill, which goes into effect on September 1. Rider declares that state funds for physical education can be used only for mass calisthenics unless the students are majoring in PE. Net effect would be special fees charged by the schools if they wanted to give instruction in games.

Some schools have protested that the rider would seriously curtail physical education programs.

### Jobs Assigned

Speaker Byron Tunnell has more than 60 appointments to make on interim study committees. He is making them at the rate of one or two a week.

Representatives George Cook, Odessa; J. Collier Adams, Lubbock; Maurice Doko, Wichita Falls; George Hinson, Mineola; and Ben Jarvis, Tyler, will study the oil and gas industry. Their assignment is no small chore . . . how to restore prosperity to the Texas oil industry.

Representatives Ben Atwell, Dallas; Dick Cory, Victoria; and David Crews, Conroe, will take up membership on the Committee on State and Local Tax Policy. Lt. Gov. Preston Smith has named Senators George Parkhouse, Dallas; W. T. Moore, Bryan; and Jack Strong, Longview. Balance of the committee will be composed of three citizens to be named by Governor Connally.

### AFL-CIO LOSES

A suit by State AFL-CIO leaders alleging improper lobbying activities by Texas Employment Com-

mission members and four employees was dismissed in 33rd District Court at Austin.

Suit, filed last February, claimed TEC pushed 11 pro-employer bills in the Legislature. Judge Herman Jones said the union failed to prove its case.

Union said it would appeal the decision.




Entries must have been executed within the past two years. Work done under supervision is not eligible.


Media includes oils, pastels, tempera, casein, drawings (pen and ink, pencil, charcoal), watercolor, mixed media.
