

V.F.W. Rodeo Opens Tonight In Local Arena

Silverton's annual V.F.W. Rodeo will get underway tonight at 8:00 o'clock. Performances will continue through August 10. Stock will be furnished by Ratjen Brothers Rodeo Company of Happy, Texas. Events will include The Down Calf Roping, Heading, Heeling and Face, Saddle Bronc Riding, Bull Riding, Bull Dogging, Ladies Barrel Race, Kids (15 and under) Breakaway Roping, and Calf Scramble.

A wild horse scramble has been planned as an added rodeo attraction. In this event five wild horses are released from the chutes with

riders who will be trying to take money off a line stretched across the arena. Ratjen Rodeo Company says that this event will add lots of thrills and spills.

Rodeo entries are coming in about as in years past, according to Fred Strange, rodeo secretary. "Entry fees have been lowered in some of the events to encourage local talent to enter the rodeo," he said.

Saturday evening, August 10, a five-year guaranteed cushion-seated saddle will be given away by the Silverton Riding Club.

The Rodeo Queen will be pre-

sented at the Saturday night performance of the rodeo. Candidates are Becky Thomas, Jealeta Eddleman, Marcalyn Lee, Raye Garrison, Judy Bingham, Martina Williams, and Mary McWilliams. The girls are selling rodeo tickets, and the girl who sells the most tickets will be named queen.

The rodeo parade will be staged in downtown Silverton Thursday, beginning at 2:30 p.m. A number of floats have been entered, and riding clubs have been invited from over the area to participate.

Parade entries seem to be run-

ning well ahead of last year, with a number of groups and clubs already having indicated that they are preparing entries.

A free barbecue will be served to the public beginning at 5:00 p.m., sponsored jointly by the V.F.W., Silverton Riding Club, Silverton Lions Club and Silverton merchants.

Dances will be held in the Fire Hall beginning at 9:30 each evening. Music will be by the band of Jimmy Mackey.

"Dear Chuck:

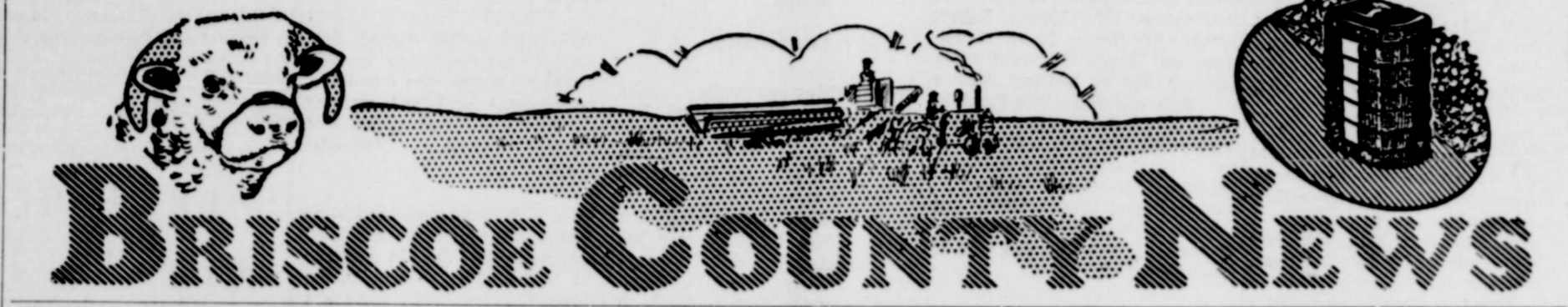
"I appreciate very much your letter. It has been a great while since anyone thought of me before carols in toy departments stirred them to action.

County 4-H'ers Finish Electric Study Camp

State Capital NEWS

Supporters of the proposed billion-dollar Trinity River development plan won the first round on the opening day of hearings when the Texas Water Commissioners turned down the railroads' motion to delay the Austin hearing.

Gov. John Connally's approval of the commission's proposed plan was expected. He had long since pledged his support.

Connally called the navigation project, "a major step in one of the most important water conservation, flood control, and navigation projects in the history of Texas."

Texas Highway Department's 420-seat capacity auditorium overflowed during the two-day hearing as every community in the vast Trinity watershed was represented.

Spokesman for the railroads was Walter Caven, counselor for the Texas Railroad Association.

Plan of the U. S. Corps of Engineers calls for development of the entire watershed for navigation, flood-control, water conservation, water quality control, drainage, irrigation, hydroelectric power, fish, wild life and recreation.

Thirteen reservoirs are included in the long-range plan. Locks and other features to make the river navigable from the Gulf to Fort Worth would claim more than \$515,000,000. That's more than a million dollars a mile for the 500 mile project.

Barge-line navigation of the Trinity from the Gulf of Mexico to the Dallas-Fort Worth market was the target of railroad objections.

Railroads claimed that Army engineers "greatly overestimated" traffic potential, future growth and benefits to be derived. Caven said the 20 railroads would have to spend more than \$25,000,000 to relocate lines and bridges in the Fort Worth area. Then they would lose \$6,500,000 annually in freight business to the barge lines.

New Speed Limit Okayed
Some 41,500 miles of state-maintained highways will be zoned for the new 70-mile per hour speed limit when the law becomes effective on August 23.

Texas Highway Commission approved the daytime maximum for passenger cars for more than two-thirds of the state's highway system. But the old 60-mile per hour maximum still applies to 18,640 miles. Engineering studies indicated that these roads couldn't handle faster traffic.

A large percentage of the Farm-to-Market Road system will come under the 70 mph maximum. Lower limits will apply where conditions warrant.

District engineers are expected to release news of re-zoning on a local basis.

Heart of Texas
A roadside park some 20 miles north of Brady on U. S. 377 is the geographical center of Texas.

It will be so designated when the Highway Commission erects a brilliant aluminum "Heart of Texas" marker.

Other \$600 aluminum markers are scheduled for Pilot Knob in Travis County, location of the state's only exposed submarine volcano; the Llano Estacado in Garza County; and Old Tascosa in Oldham County. The latter is famed for its Boot Hill Cemetery.

Commission figures each marker will earn more than 10 times its original cost in added tourist revenues.

Chemicals Kill Crops
"Weekend farmers" and "absentee owners" not acquainted with the dangerous potential of hormone-type herbicides (such as 2,4-D and 2, 4, 5-T) have contributed to a new pattern of crop damage, says Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

He estimated 7,000 to 8,000 acres of crops, principally cotton, have been affected by damaging doses of the herbicides.

"Fortunately, most of the effect has been only light to moderate on the cotton," White said, "and the yields are not seriously threatened."

"But we've been lucky so far," he added. "When carelessly applied, herbicides are capable of wiping out crops several miles away from the sprayed area."

Hot Weather Toll
Four consecutive weeks of 100-plus degree weather plus drying wind took a toll of crops and pastures over the state, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Early harvesting was used to beat the heat in many places.

Reporting Service predicts that

general rains in all areas still could revive pastures.

Polio Fades To Four Cases
Poliomyelitis, the dread disease that kept parents stiff with fear for many summers, has declined to the point that the State Health Department has received only four reports of cases so far this year.

Total caseload for the state last year was only 114. Credit for the decline of the crippler is given Salk and Cabin vaccines.

But health officials continued to warn Texans not to be complacent. People of all ages are urged to follow up with booster shots.

Peace Precincts Puzzle
Ector County's Commissioners Court had a plan to provide offices for the county's four justices of the peace in the new county courthouse, to be completed early in 1964.

Plan was to rezone the four peace precincts so that all would intersect at the new courthouse. Current justices would keep their present offices.

But Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr ruled it cannot be done that way. "If the commissioners' court alters the boundary lines of any justice precinct," Carr commented, "a vacancy exists in the office of justice of the peace and constable, which the court must fill by appointment until the next general election."

Legislative 'Rider'
A legislative "rider" on the 1964-65 state budget to cut physical training programs in 20 State colleges to little more than "mass calisthenics" was declared invalid by the attorney general.

Carr said that while "riders"—i.e., restrictions on legislative appropriations—usually get by, this one went too far. It would have kept colleges from spending all their allocated budget if compulsory physical training programs were offered.

Commission on Higher Education asked for the attorney general's opinion, after physical training directors claimed the "rider" would have crippled their work.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1963.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21 proposing an amendment to Article XVI, Section 62 of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new subsection authorizing all political subdivisions of Jefferson County, Texas, to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for all appointive officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, by providing for each election form of ballot, proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS, That Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

(c) Each political subdivision within Jefferson County, Texas, shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for all appointive officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas; or all appointive officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas; provided that same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such political subdivision and after such election has been advertised by newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four (4) consecutive weeks ending on the first Monday after the first Monday in the month of November, 1963, for the same purposes from the income of each such person and shall not exceed one (1) percent of the compensation paid to each such person by the political subdivision.

"All funds provided for the compensation of each person or by the political subdivision of Jefferson County, Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the political subdivision, shall be deposited in a separate fund for each such person and shall be used for the purposes of such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the political subdivision."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1963.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 18 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of Texas, to increase the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Fund to Three Hundred Fifty Million Dollars (\$350,000,000.00); providing for the issuance of such bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for the election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendment to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas known as the Veterans' Land Fund, which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue in function for the purposes specified in all the Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be a member of the Senate, to be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed in the event of any such citizen member, the death of any such citizen member, or the resignation of any such citizen member, a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member has been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Three Hundred Fifty Million Dollars (\$350,000,000.00) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000.00) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, and in such amounts as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four and one-half percent (4½%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or pur-

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1963.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Sections 61-a and 61-b of Article III so that the same shall consist of one Section to be known as Section 61-a; providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to (1) citizens of Texas who are aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years; (2) needy persons who are at least eighteen (18) years of age and less than sixty-five (65) years of age who are permanently and totally disabled; (3) needy blind persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years; and (4) needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility for such assistance; repealing the Constitutional limit on the amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient of such assistance; and providing that the amount of such assistance shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

"(4) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for such assistance as such Government may offer not inconsistent with the residence requirements in set forth; provided, however, that the amount of such assistance out of state funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount matchable out of federal funds; and provided further that the total amount of money to be expended per year out of state funds for such assistance shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000.00)."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 61-a and 61-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same are hereby amended, so that the same shall consist of one Section to be known as Section 61-a of Article III, which shall read as follows:

"Section 61-a. The Legislature shall have the power by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and subject to the residence restrictions and regulations as may be provided by the Legislature, for the assistance to and for the payment of assistance to:

(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any such person who is permanently and totally disabled, while such inmate; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.


(2) Needy individuals, who are citizens of the United States, who shall have passed their sixtieth (60th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday, who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps and not feasible for vocational rehabilitation; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided further, that no individual shall receive assistance under this program for a period when he is receiving Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Needy Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children, nor while he is residing permanently in any completely state-supported institution; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

(3) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such

enroute to White Sands, New Mexico, from Fort Sill, Oklahoma, Tuesday.

The first unit of the convoy arrived Monday afternoon, and set up a communications power unit just west of Silverton. Main branches of the eight-mile long convoy began arriving at about 11:30 a.m. Tuesday.

Huge trucks, jeeps, army planes and other vehicles were still swarming about the local airport late Tuesday afternoon. The convoy segments halted here, refueled, etc. before moving on.

BOYS RANCH RODEO
WILL BE SEPTEMBER 1, 2

The largest crowds in the history of the famed Boys Ranch Rodeo are expected at Cal Farley's Boys Ranch over the Labor Day weekend, September 1 and 2, when the 312 boys now being cared for hold their 19th annual event.

To accommodate the holiday crowds, the rodeo arena seating capacity has been expanded with the construction of 81 new concrete reserved boxes made possible by the Ranch's neighbor, the Texas Sand and Gravel Company, donating the materials. The older boys of the Ranch worked on much of the construction as part of their vocational training. The new boxes will provide front row seats for more than 500 spectators with four, six and eight seats in a box.

The Boys Ranch Rodeo is the only rodeo of its kind in the nation in which boys are the only contestants. Riding professional rodeo stock, they attract larger crowds each year with more than 7000 attending last year's two performances. It is fast-moving entertainment as older boys ride bucking broncs, Brahma bulls and steers while the younger Ranchers take on the calves. All of the boys have some part in the rodeo.

A rapid sale of reserved box seat tickets is expected by Boys Ranch officials and advance orders are being taken at the Ranch's headquarters in Amarillo. The reserved box seats are \$2.50, which includes all admission charges. General admission will be \$1.50 for adults and 75c for children and servicemen in uniform. Proceeds from the rodeo will be used for the Ranch's expansion program.
