

All Around the Town

In this issue of the Briscoe County News is the text of three of the four proposed amendments to the State Constitution, all of which are to be voted on in a special state-wide election in November. We can't recommend all of the amendments, but we do recommend that you read them all now, familiarize yourself with their provisions, and next November VOTE ON THEM.

**PROPOSITION NO. 1**  
This will eliminate the poll tax as a requirement to vote in this state. Otherwise qualified voters, instead of being required to pay a poll tax, will simply have to register. Other qualifications for voting shall remain as follows:  
Voter shall be 21 years of age or older, a citizen of the United States, and a resident of Texas for one year preceding election and a resident within the district or county in which vote is cast for the past six months preceding the election.

Service personnel will be exempt from this last qualification, and may vote in the county of their residence at the time they entered the service.  
In the special election on November 9, voters will decide whether or not they want to repeal the poll tax as a prerequisite to voting. If it is repealed, a new law will go into effect, setting up a 25 cent registration fee. To make matters more complicated, the November 9 vote really would not repeal the poll tax. In theory it would still be due and payable. But not many are expected to pay the tax if the voting privilege is removed from it.

However, another amendment could be carried to law shortly after the first of the new year which would set up a system by which voters would apply to their county tax assessor-collectors for special registration certificates—at no charge—to vote on races involving only federal offices.

It appears that since the Legislature has already set up the voter registration system in anticipation of the passage of Proposition No. 1, it appears that passage of this one would relieve some of the confusion which is going to result.

I have not been for the removal of the poll tax as a prerequisite for voting, but under the circumstances, I hope this one will pass.

**PROPOSITION NO. 2**  
This amendment would unite two sections of the state constitution to repeal the Constitutional limit available under the state's "Old Age Assistance and Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled" to increase it to cover up to, but not exceeding federal aid available in each case.

State aid would be available to:  
(1) Citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of 65.

(2) Needy persons at least 18 years old and less than 65 who are permanently and totally disabled.

(3) Needy blind persons over 21.

(4) Needy children under 16.  
State aid shall not exceed \$60,000,000 annually.

This amendment increases the ceiling on state participation in programs of aid to the needy aged, aid to the disabled, and aid to needy children, boosting the state participation to \$60 million, provided that state contributions should not exceed matching federal funds. Voters approved amendments last year which raised the limit from \$47 million to \$52 million for the first two categories, and provided an additional \$2.5 million in aid for needy children. This amendment lumps all these funds and adds \$5.5 million to their total ceiling, another indication of the increased cost of living and probably inevitable.

**PROPOSITION NO. 3**  
This amendment would authorize all political subdivisions of Jefferson County to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for all appointive officers and employees of political subdivisions within the same county.

This amendment pertains to only the one Texas County. Voters turned down a proposed amendment last November which would have permitted such retirement plans in all counties, and may take a dim view this year of permitting this sort of thing in one particular county.

## ASC Committee Elections Near

Farmers in Briscoe County were reminded today that community elections of Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation farmer committee members will soon be taking place.

Louie Kitchens, Chairman, ASC County Committee, said that a farmer will be eligible to cast a ballot for the men he wants to represent him on the committee if

he is participating or is eligible to participate in one or more of the national farm programs administered locally by the farmer-committee members. Such a person is eligible to vote in the committee election if he or she is of legal voting age and a farm owner, tenant, or sharecropper, or, if not of legal voting age, in charge of the farming operations on an entire farm.

## New Fire Alarm System Installed Here

A new fire alarm system has been installed in Silverton. When you dial the fire alarm number you will now hear a continuous ring and no alarm will automatically sound. Instead, telephones in the homes and businesses of ten firemen will simultaneously ring. You MUST stay on the phone until the fireman or firemen answer to tell the location of the fire. If you get a "beep beep" busy signal you will have to dial again.

The fire alarm will then be sounded by one of the firemen, and there will be no more false alarms given by people who dial the fire alarm number by mistake.

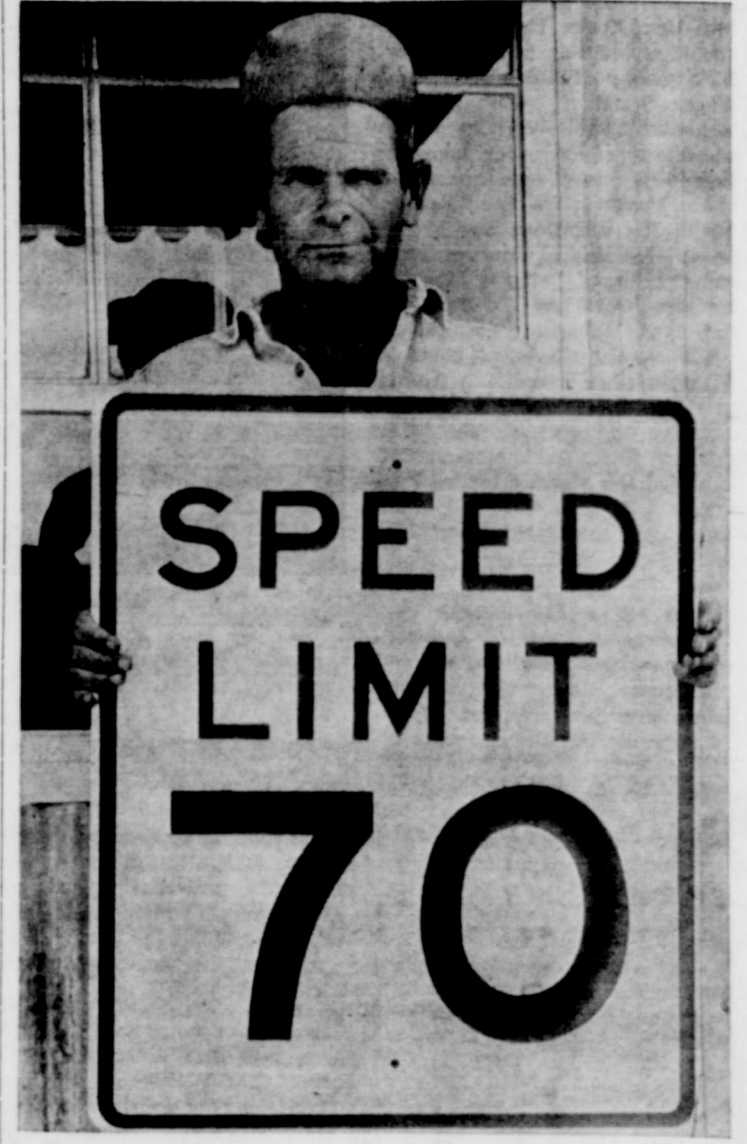
3.) Purchase of weights for basketball boys; 4.) Purchase of burrs for football field improvement; 5.) Purchase of film for football games.

PROPER PASTURE MANAGEMENT IN CAP ROCK S.C.D. IS DISCUSSED

The success of irrigated Bermuda grass depends upon proper pasture management. I. F. Reed, pasture manager, E. G. Reed, have sprigged 12 acres of Midland Bermuda

irrigation. A total of 240 bushels of sprigs were set out on the 12 acre field. The pasture is presently in excellent condition, but only after many hours of labor and several dollars of expense. E. G. reports that they plan to bale the hay this week and the pasture has had 23 head of cattle on it since it was well established.

Raymond Teeple, J. D. McGavock, Alva Jasper and others of Silverton have also sprigged Bermuda grass this past spring. The depth of planting should be one to three inches and planted (sprigged) from April 15 to July 15. The establishment of a good pasture requires proper seedbed preparation, pre-irrigation, fertilizing, weed control, good sprigs and a type of irrigation system and irrigation water management to be used to apply irrigation water to meet the needs of

the grass without waste or erosion. A graded border irrigation system should be used above the Cap Rock and a sprinkler irrigation system works well on the sandy soils below the Cap. Farmers and ranchers are striving toward the goal of more pounds of beef on less acreage. To have maximum use of our pastures and more pounds of beef per acre, we must practice proper pasture management. Proper pasture management is grazing so as to remove no more than about 50 percent of the current growth during the growing season. One applies different types of practices to get an abundant harvest of grains and cotton. Pastures are to be used for the production of beef. The crops of grains and cotton require labor and expense to have an abundant harvest. Sprigged Bermuda grass should be treated as any other crop, and then the abundant harvest will be more pounds of beef per acre.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED UPON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1963. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Sections 51-a and 51-b of Article III so that the same shall consist of one Section to be known as Section 51-a; providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to (1) citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons on the age of sixty-five (65) years; (2) needy persons who are at least eighteen (18) years of age and less than sixty-five (65) years of age who are permanently and totally disabled; (3) needy blind persons on the age of sixteen (16) years; (4) needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility for such assistance; repealing the Constitutional limit on the amount paid out of state funds to individual recipients of Old Age Assistance and Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing that the amount for such assistance payments shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and providing that the total amount of such assistance payments shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds. "The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for such assistance as such Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions hereinafter set forth; provided, however, that the amount of such assistance out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall never exceed the amount matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount of money to be expended per year out of state funds for such assistance shall not exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000)." BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Sections 51-a and 51-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same are hereby amended, so that the same shall consist of one Section to be known as Section 51-a of Article III, which shall read as follows: "Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, such other assistance, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to and for the payment of assistance to: (1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any individual recipient who is permanently and totally disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps and not feasible for vocational rehabilitation; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided further, that no individual shall receive assistance under this program who is permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is receiving Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, or Aid to Dependent Children, nor while he is residing permanently in any completely state-supported institution; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased by said Board (although nothing herein shall be construed to prevent said Board from purchasing lands for a portion of any tract), and of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as other lands of said Board dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund. "The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board, at such prices, at such rates of interest and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to Texas veterans who served not less than ninety (90) continuous days unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955, and who upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from the service, or discharged from his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or draft into the service of the United States of Texas. The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. "All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained by said Board for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund. "When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the moneys purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys attributable to such bonds may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division which portion shall be set aside and remain a part of such Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the

principal and the interest thereon, together with the expenses hereof or hereafter incurred and sold by said Board; such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of the Board; and there shall be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party. "All of the moneys attributable to a series of bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board (a series of bonds being all of the bonds issued and sold in a single transaction as a single installment) shall be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on bonds heretofore issued and sold shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the retirement of any bonds heretofore issued and sold and to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, until there are sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds heretofore issued and sold, at which time all such moneys then remaining in said Veterans' Land Fund and thereafter becoming a part of said Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein. "This Amendment being intended only to establish a basic framework and not to be a comprehensive treatment of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby reposed in the Legislature full power to implement the intent of the design and objects of this Amendment, including the power to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it believes necessary. "Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature. "This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption by the Legislature. Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas at the election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1963, at which election all ballots have printed thereon the following: "FOR THE Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$150,000,000; said Fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955; such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law"; and "AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$150,000,000; said Fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955; such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law." If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of same Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and shall be effective from the date set forth in said Amendment, and the Governor shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith. Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this state.
