In this issue of the Briscoe County News is the text of three of the four proposed amendments to the State Constitution, all of which are to be voted on in a special state-wide election in November. We can't recommend all of the mendments, but we do recommend that you read them all now, familiarize yourself with their and next November VOTE ON THEM.

PROPOSITION NO. 1 This will eliminate the poll tax as a requirement to vote in this state. Otherwise qualified voters, instead of being required to pay poll tax, will simply have to noting shall remain as follows:

States, and a resident of Texas shortly after 12:00 noon. for one year preceding election and a resident within the district also open on Tuesday, September or county in which vote is cast 3. for the past six months preceding the election.

Service personnel will be exempt from this last qualification. and may vote in the county of their residence at the time they entered the service.

In the special election on November 9, voters will decide whether or not they want to repeal the poll tax as a prerequisite to voting. If it is repealed, a new law will go into effect, setting up a 25 cent registration fee. To make matters more complicated, the November 9 vote really would not repeal the poll tax. In theory it would still be due and payable. But not many are expected to pay the tax if the voting privilege is removed from it.




