## Mustangs Outrun Owls In First Home Game

The Claude Mustangs, giving their best for their new head coach Jerry Cannon, raced past the Silverton Owls here Friday night with a 14-0 margin.

Led by Quarterback Jerry Bartley, Halfback Don Mitchell and Halfback Denton Fox, the Mustangs battled the Owls through a scoreless first half. The first score of the game came after the Owls halted a Mustang drive deep in their own territory. Holding the Claude team to no gain at about their own 10 yard stripe, the Owls took over the ball on downs and attempted to move the ball upfield. Lady Luck frowned as an Owl back dropped into the end zone, fumbled, and Jack Allen, a Claude guard, recovered for the touchdown. Halfback Denton Fox ran around end for the two extra points.

The second score of the game came seconds into the fourth quarter when Don Mitchell climaxed a Claude drive by running four yards into the end zone. The Owls stopped the around-end sweep and no extra points were made.

Claude completed 13 first downs during the evening, nine of them in the second half. Silverton netted yardage for 12 first downs, 6 in each half.

Silverton was penalized 10 yards while the Mustangs saw 80 yards marched off against them for offenses including holding, roughness and unsportsmanlike conduct.

Neither team did very well in the passing department. Claude completed 7 out of 19 tries, and Silverton completed passes to Stafford, Garner Garrison and Dennis Tomlin, had one intercepted shortly before the half by Jerry Bartley, and had 8 fall incomplete.

Silverton Halfback Fred Stafford suffered a badly bruised leg and Rocky Curby, who turned in a good job at end, suffered broken bones in his foot during the game.

The Owls have an open date Friday night, and the coaching staff is hoping that by next week the team will be in better shape and some of the boys who have injuries will be ready to go back into the lineup. Emmett Tomlin, who has a broken arm, and Curby will likely be out from six to eight weeks.

A lot of inexperienced boys saw action during the game. Coach Robert Whelchel reported that 22 boys played, and most of them deserve a lot of credit for a job well done. Claude surprised the Owls and themselves with their show of strength. They went into the game remembering the defeat the Owls handed them last year, and were determined to win for their new coach.

Friday, September 20, the Owls travel to Turkey for their second game of the season. The pep squad bus will leave Silverton at 6:00 p.m. and the girls have requested that all Owl Boosters meet at the school between 5:30 and 6:00 so that they can attach streamers to the cars which are going to make the trip.

## General Telephone Company Completes Construction

A 100-line equipment addition was completed early this spring and the outside construction was completed in June in Silverton by General Telephone Company of the Southwest. All applicants waiting for telephones have been served, and General Telephone Company is presently serving approximately 540 phones here. These additions were made to improve service by relieving congested conditions which existed in Silverton, according to Woody Frazier of Ralls, District Manager for the telephone company. The additions also provided the necessary facilities for upgrade and outside relief.

In order to provide extra lines and to rebalance the equipment approximately 50 Silverton telephones numbers will be changed. This is necessary to reduce the present overloaded equipment groups. This change will aid in

rendering you and the other customers in Silverton better telephone service, Mr. Frazier said.

The number changes will be made effective with the new Silverton directory in November, and all customers will be notified of their new numbers within the next few days.

Telephone service was interrupted Thursday, September 5, when lightning struck three of the Southwestern Public Service

Service continued to telephone patrons for more than an hour on emergency power, but all local service was out from about 7:15 until 10:30 p.m. It was necessary to call a crew from Plainview to restore the Southwestern Public Service Company equipment which serves a number of homes and businesses in that area.

## Van Breedlove Honored at Pep Rally

Friday, September 6, during a pep rally in the school gymnasium, Van Breedlove was honored with a standing ovation by his former classmates and members of the Silverton Quarterback Club. As a further tribute to his ability as a football player for Silverton High School, his number 23 jersey was retired and is being placed in the trophy case.

A 1963 graduate of Silverton High School, Breedlove earned the respect and admiration of his fellow classmates, teammates, his teachers and townspeople. An honor student both in classroom and on the gridiron, he finished fourth in his class.

He was named to the All-District team all four years of his high school football career. In October, 1961, Van was named Player of the Week by the Amarillo Daily News after Silverton was defeated 22-8 by Happy. It was a rare thing for a player on a losing team to be accorded the honor, but Breedlove earned it by making 19 unassisted tackles, assisting on many others, intercepting a pass and gaining 40 yards rushing in that particular game.

He was ill-fated as a ball carrier during his senior year, injuring both his knees early in the season. He remained a stalwart to the team as an outstanding linebacker with a built-in radar which told him instantly which direction a play would go. He was not able to play on offense again until the last game of the season, and what a finish he placed on his high school football! He led the Owls in shaking the district champs, Petersburg, by making a touchdown, two extra points, and gaining more than one hundred

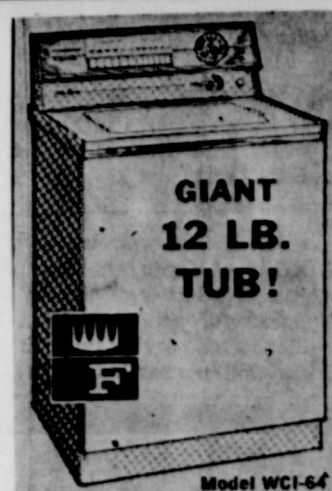

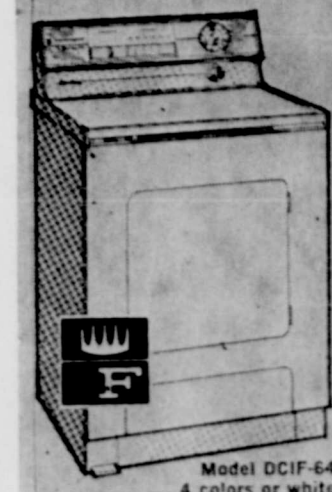

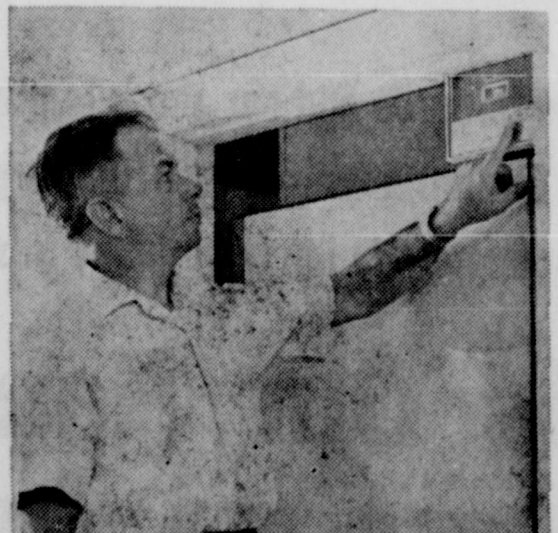
