Now in effect is a new compulsory school attendance law which requires school children, ages seven to 16, to go to school 165 days out of each 175-day school year.

Before the 58th Legislature passed this law, the minimum attendance requirement was 120 days. This left a wide margin for truancy—especially by children of migrant farm workers who are on the move two to four months out of the year.

Laxity of compulsory attendance laws has been cited as one reason for the high rate of illiteracy among Latin Americans. Texas' rate of illiteracy is high for all races. It has been estimated that almost 10 per cent of the state's population is functionally illiterate.

A recent U. S. census survey showed that the average school child in Texas, with a Spanish surname, did not go past the fourth grade. Average Anglo finished the 10th grade and the average Negro completed the eighth.

It will be up to individual school districts to see that children attend school 165 days a year, according to Leon Graham, deputy commissioner of the Texas Education Agency. However, the main responsibility lies with the parents. If a school officer warns the parents of a truant child, they are subject to a fine of \$5 for the next day he fails to attend school; \$10 for the second offense, after a warning, and \$25 for each subsequent offense.

Graham said it is no problem for a migrant parent to enroll his child in any school. No formal transfer is required. "Our schools are here to serve the children of Texas," he said. "All they have to do is say, 'Here I am!'"

**Screwworm Program Praised**

Dr. E. F. Knipling—known as the "father of the screwworm eradication program"—addressed Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation trustees at their annual meeting in Austin, and praised the progress of their eradication campaign. But he cautioned them against complacency.

Knipling reported that in August, only 81 screwworm cases were reported in Texas, compared to 5,088 in August, 1962. But a large percentage of the 81 were in the Trans-Pecos area.

Animal health officials feel the Trans-Pecos problem is a direct result of screwworm flies migrating from Mexico. Mexico's northern border has been the target of sterile fly drops for several months now. But newly-gained knowledge that the fly can travel about 180 miles on his own volition is worrying officials.

Knipling said, "We must intensify our survey efforts to find out where fly drops will be most effective; then widen the barrier to prevent infestation."

**Fall Rains May Pose Problem**  
Charlie Scruggs of Dallas, president of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, said his group is beginning to worry about a growing rate of screwworm infestation when fall rains come.

Cool weather and dampness, usually associated with early fall, may couple with shearing and calving wounds to foster screwworms if livestock producers don't take precautions. Scruggs said an "information campaign" will be launched soon.

### New Officers

### Educators Meeting Set

Texas Association of School Administrators and Texas Association of School Boards will hold a joint meeting in Austin on September 23 to hear talks on education in the Space Age. They will hold seminars on: School dropouts, the migrant pupil, religion and the schools, teaching Americanism-versus-communism, and textbook selection in Texas.

### Poll Tax Repeal

Campaign for repeal of the poll tax as a requirement for voting was launched by the Texas League of Women Voters, with Gov. John Connally and Vice President Lyndon Johnson giving their support to the movement.

On November 9 Texans will vote on a constitutional amendment to remove the 60-year-old requirement that you pay a poll tax to vote. Texas voting will be under the shadow of a proposed U. S. constitutional amendment outlawing taxes on the right to vote in elections of Federal officials. Legislatures of 36 states already have ratified this amendment, and when two more approve, it will go into effect.

Texas Legislature provided Texans a "do it yourself first" route by submitting the proposed amendment to the Texas constitution at the November 9 election. There is no chance for the U. S. amendment to go into effect until after that date.

### Tourists

Texas' first formal effort to attract tourists will get under way now that Governor Connally has appointed the seven men to head the new Texas Tourist Development Agency.

Interestingly enough, most of the seven are natives of other states, indicating that Connally felt they would best know how to bring other Americans into Texas.

Frank Hildebrand, jr., former Louisiana, Baytown, Houston and Dallas news writer, will be executive director. For the last year, he has been chief of the travel promotion section of the Texas Highway Department.

On the advisory board which will help Connally direct Hildebrand are Bill Berger of the Hondo Anvil Herald and president of the Texas Press Association; Chris Fox, El Paso banker; James M. Gaines, San Antonio radio-TV executive and president of the Texas Tourist Council; John McCarty of Dallas, vice president of advertising for Frito-Lay, Inc. G. A. (Pop)

### COUNTY ACCIDENTS INVESTIGATED

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Briscoe County during the month of August, according to Sgt. W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for one person injured and an estimated property damage of \$1,000.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county from January through August of 1963 shows a total of 13 crashes resulting in one person killed, 14 persons injured and an estimated property

damage of \$28,335.00. Now is the time to have all motor vehicles "winterized," the Sergeant stated; that is to have their vehicles safety inspected at one of the approved inspection stations to determine that all parts are in top condition.

The new 1964 vehicle inspection sticker is now available. All vehicles registered in this state are required to be inspected once a year. All motorists are urged to have their vehicles safety inspected to avoid the rush later on.

### FOUR BRISCOE ACCIDENTS INVESTIGATED IN JULY

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated four accidents on rural highways in Briscoe county during the month of July, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for two persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$1,891.00

"There are many good jobs open in the Texas Highway Patrol for young men between 21 and 35 who would like to help prevent the tragic crashes and collisions that occur on the streets and highways," Sergeant Wells said.

With the starting of school facing us the Sergeant reminds all motorists of the state law regulating traffic in regard to school buses. "The driver of a vehicle upon a highway outside the limits of any incorporated city or town upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus which is stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall stop the vehicle immediately before passing the school bus, but may proceed past such school bus at a speed which is prudent, not exceeding 10 miles per hour, with due caution for the safety of such children."

"During the first six months of this year, Texas had one person killed and 110 injured in accidents involving school buses," the Sergeant said. "This is tragic and useless. School buses are plainly marked and motorists know that they carry a priceless cargo—human lives."

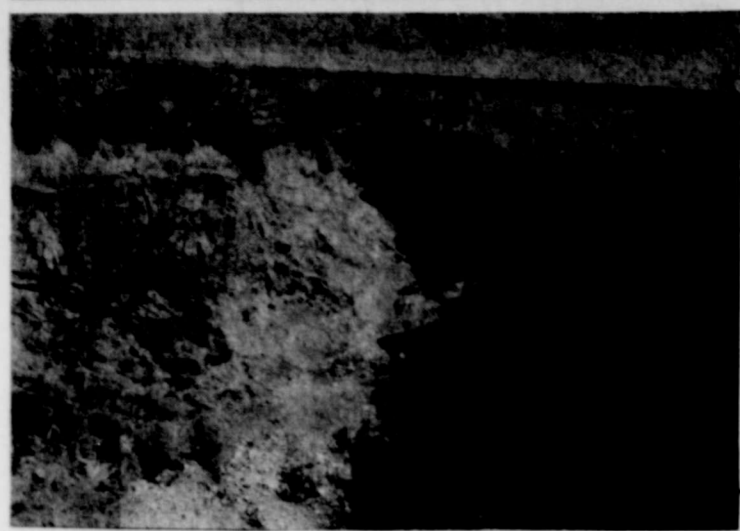

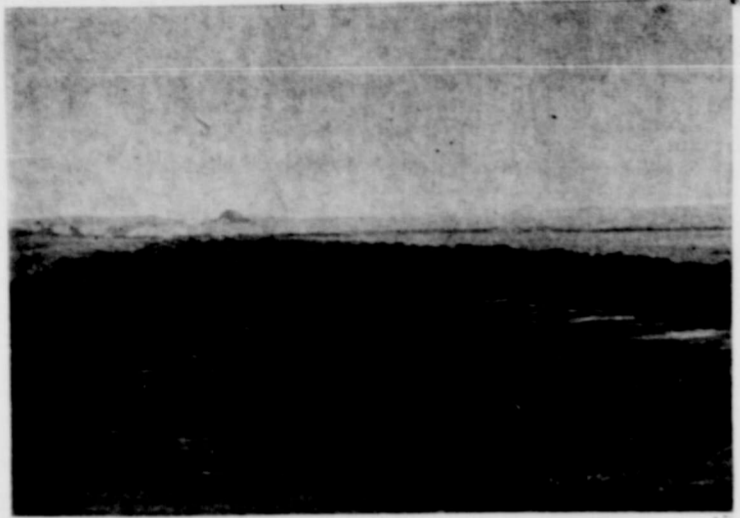

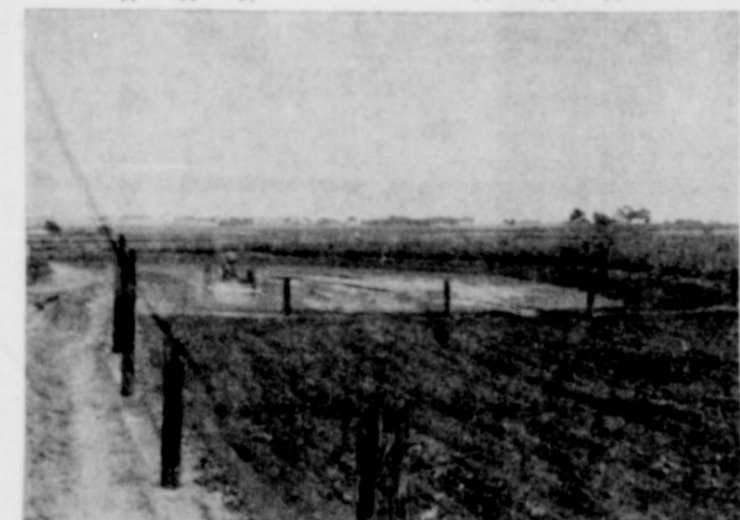

This waterway is a tributary of Kent Creek. Once a yawning gully deeper than the one pictured, it will be seeded to wheat or rye as soon as possible. When the native grasses are established some grazing will be possible, and the owner, J. B. Baird, will be able to move machinery from one field to another without detouring the deep chasm.



The Pierce White waterway construction is pictured as a tractor prepares the ground for seeding. This waterway, inside the Kent Creek Watershed, is part of the channel not included in the Kent Creek construction program which is to begin soon. The Soil Conservation Service and farmers are working through the Great Plains Program to accomplish this additional construction.

## FARMERS RECLAIM WASTED LAND WITH SOIL CONSERVATION PRACTICES

Several farmers in the vicinity of Quitaque have shown an interest in shaping of the Kent Creek channel and its tributaries into grassed waterways. One of the projects, almost completed except for the grass seeding, is the Kent Creek channel that crosses the property of Pierce White, R. P. McWilliams and J. B. Baird. This channel before, construction was started, was approximately fifteen feet deep in places with very steep banks.

The banks were pushed into the channel and new banks were built that can be crossed with farm equipment. The new channel has a flat bottom with a uniform grade from one end to the other.

Wheat or rye will be drilled on the new channel as soon as possible to hold the shaped surface and to furnish a litter cover to seed native grasses into this coming spring.

J. B. Baird has started construction on a tributary on the Kent Creek that crosses his property

and goes just north of his house. This channel will also be seeded to native grass this coming spring.

Wayne White, Cecil Price, Donald Duck, and J. A. Mayfield have plans for shaping more of the Kent Creek channel and one of its tributaries. This channel will start at the Erosion Control Dam No. 1 on J. A. Mayfield's place and tie into Kent Creek at the highway bridge just north of Quitaque.

Some diversions and terraces have been planned along the waterways mentioned above to aid in the control of water into the new channels and to protect cropland from erosion.

These shaped waterways will not only prevent erosion in the steep gullies that are presently there, but will furnish some grazing after a good native grass cover has been established.

Your local Soil Conservation Service has been planning and cost-sharing the work planned on the waterways mentioned above.

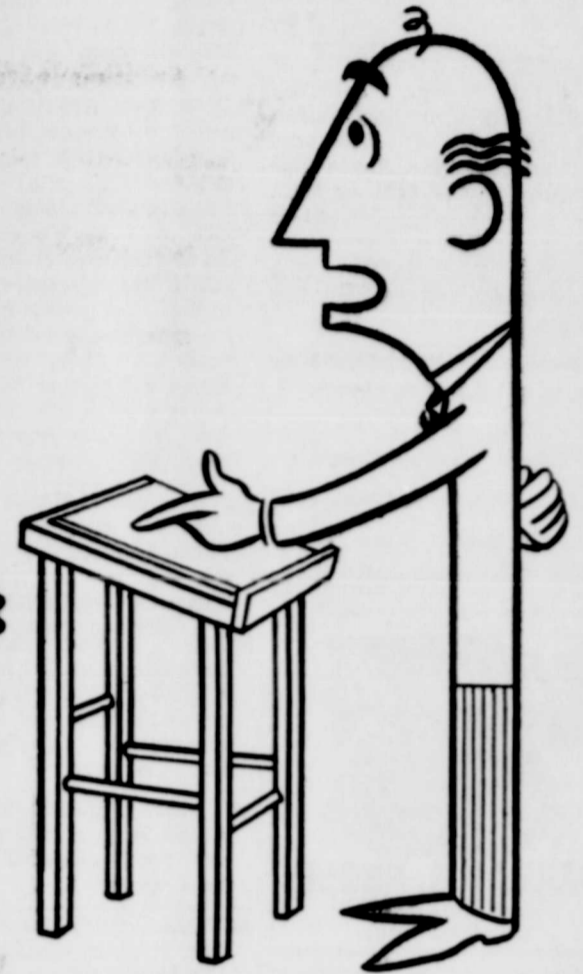

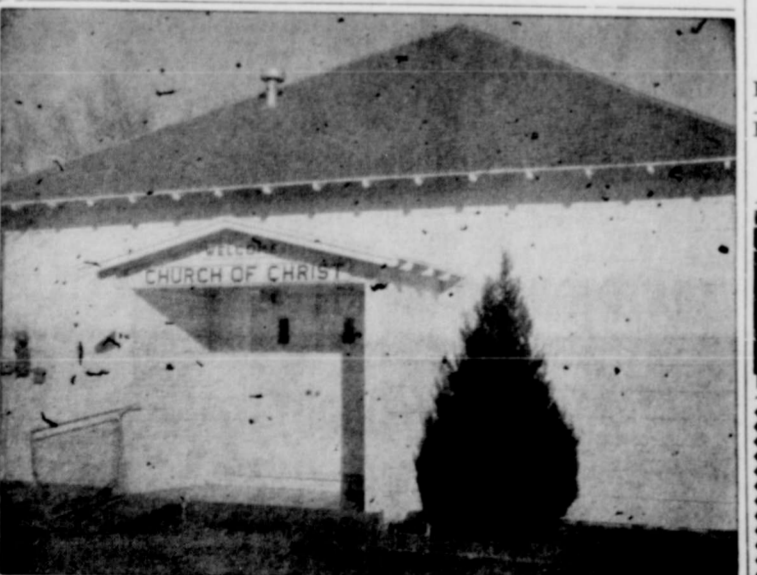
