Following a meeting of leaders in the screwworm program, Dalph Briscoe, jr., of Uvalde, predicted the eradication drive will face perhaps its most crucial test within the next 30 to 60 days.

Screwworm cases were reported in the Big Bend area, Wilson, Kinney, Medina, Bandera, Dimmit, Maverick, Edwards, Frio, Val Verde, and Zavala counties.

Program leaders called for early drops of more sterile flies in the areas hardest hit. Also establishment of a federally-financed "barrier" zone 200 miles deep into Mexico to block continued migrations of screwworm flies across the border.



which have too little. "We have the water resources to meet future demands. But only if they are properly developed, conserved and managed," the Governor stated.

According to the Texas Water reservoirs in the Commission, state stand at 65 per cent of capacity. That's nine per cent less than last year at this time. As of the end of August (before Hurricane Cindy) streamflow was deficient for the entire state.



> The new law also provides for more effective enforcement of the law with a new provision which provides that "all prosecutions and process serving" on any hot check case shall be the same as if the offense were of felony grade. which means that hot-checkers who dodge across state lines can be extradited . . . and compensation of witnesses at a trial shall be the same as if the offense were of felony grade.

This is intended to make it easier to bring the paper-hangers back to face trial . . . and easier to bring witnesses to the courtroom to testify against them. It's all a part of a movement to put under the check-writer as he puts on the check.
