### Six Players Perform Owl Scoring Attack

Six members of the Silverton Owls have been responsible for the 168 points scored by the football team this season. Going into conference play the Owls had scored a total of 112 points as compared to 40 scored by their opponents. The present calculation is 168 for the Owls and 136 for their opponents.

While owning only a 3-5 record this season, the Owls have been shut out only twice—by Claude and Hart, both of which lacked a lot being the best teams the Owls have faced.

Passes have counted heavily in the Owl attack. Greg Towe has thrown to Fred Stafford, Dennis Tomlin and Max Garrison for a total of five touchdowns and three conversions. Stafford has passed to Dennis Tomlin, Garrison, and Emmett Tomlin for four touchdowns and two conversions. Dennis Tomlin has passed to Stafford and Randy Hughes for one touchdown and one conversion.

Individual scoring leader continues to be Stafford with 60 points tallied on nine touchdowns and three conversions. Dennis Tomlin has scored 42 points by catching passes for six touchdowns and three conversions.

Monty Smith, who was unable to play last week due to injuries, has scored 22 points on three touchdowns and two conversions.

Max Garrison has carried five touchdowns and one conversion for a total of 32 points.

Emmett Tomlin has run one touchdown for six points. Greg Towe has carried three conversions for six points.

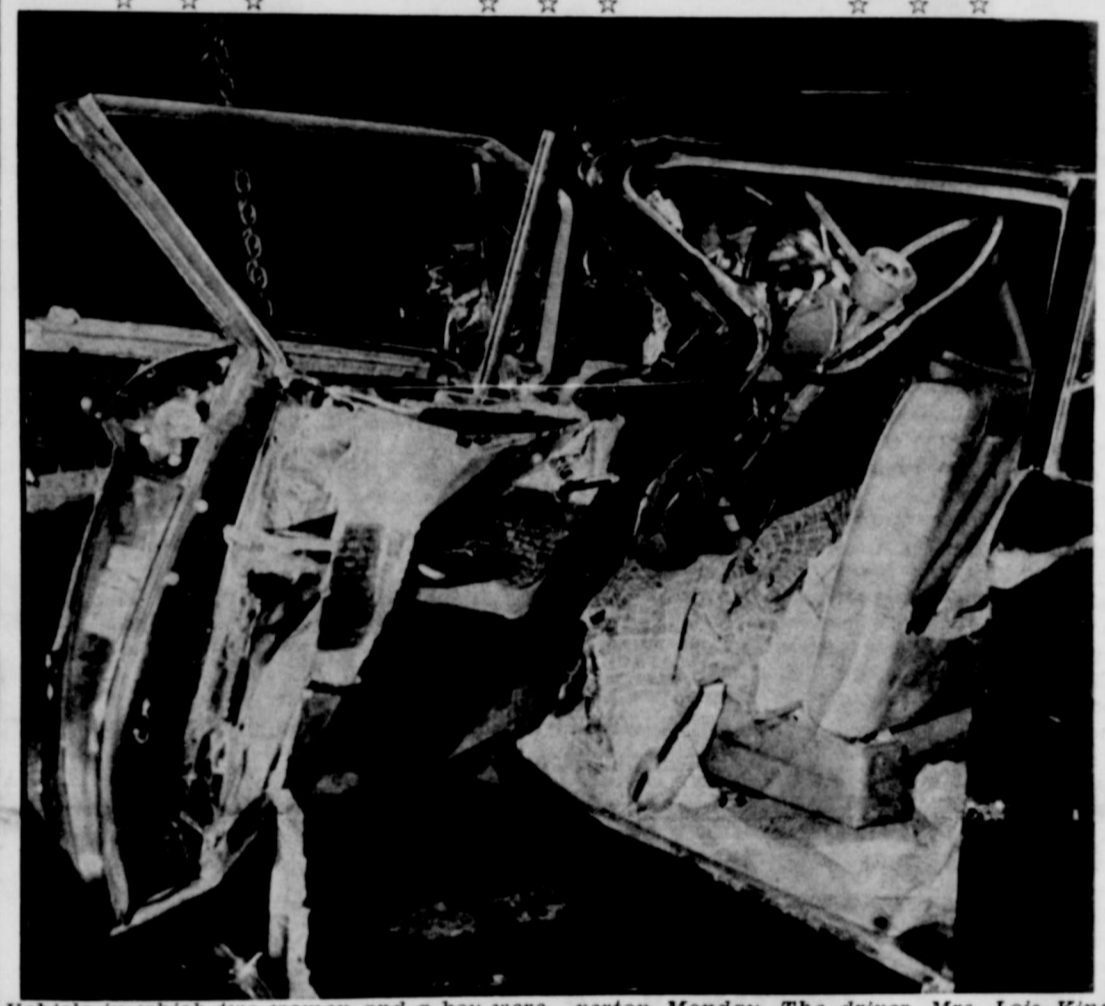

## One Dead After Collision Three Miles East Of Here

A woman died and four persons were injured in a two-car collision three miles east of Silverton Monday at 6:00 p.m.

The dead woman was Lois King, 35, of Snyder, Oklahoma. Injured were the other occupants of the automobile driven by Mrs. King: her son, Lindsey Hutcheson, 10, and Peggy M. Adams, 55, also of Snyder, Oklahoma. The Adams woman and Hutcheson boy were taken to Plainview Hospital and Clinic in serious condition.

Also injured were Henry Ivory, 50, driver of the other automobile, and his daughter, Catherine Ivory, 19, both of Quitaque. Miss Ivory was treated and released from Swisher County Hospital at Tulla, and her father is still receiving treatment there for a broken jaw and ankle fracture.

The accident occurred at the Y intersection of Highways 86 and 256 east of Silverton. The automobile driven by Mrs. King was traveling west from Highway 256 onto Highway 86 and Ivory was driving east toward Quitaque, according to Briscoe County Sheriff Johnnie Lanham.

Don Black of Tulla was the investigating Highway Patrolman. Ivory is employed by farmers in the Silverton area and his daughter is employed at Redin's "66" Restaurant. They were going home from work at the time of the accident.

Mrs. Wayne Hamilton and Rex Tiffin both were traveling in the area at the time of the crash and witnessed the accident. Four ambulances from Silverton, Quitaque and Turkey were rushed to the scene.

Dr. R. N. Mueckleroy told the Briscoe County News that when he arrived at the scene a segment of a U. S. Army convoy traveling to Fort Wingate, New Mexico, was stopped east of the wreckage. Mrs. King was trapped in the crumpled wreckage and two of the big army trucks from the 4th Missile Battalion, 41st Artillery, from Fort Sill, Oklahoma, were used to pull the cars apart to get her out. "We just couldn't have done it without their help," the doctor said.

Mrs. King died a few minutes after being placed in the ambulance, according to Dr. Mueckleroy, who was riding with her to the hospital.

The body remained at Roberts Funeral Home here until 6:00 a.m. Tuesday when a Snyder funeral home came overland to return her home.

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Some 60,000 Texans soon will be getting invitations to dine with the President—for \$100 a plate—at Austin's Municipal Auditorium.

Presidential aides now are in Austin making arrangements with top Texas Democrats for a November 22 "Texas Welcome Dinner" for Pres. John F. Kennedy and Vice Pres. Lyndon B. Johnson.

Speakers list so far has been limited to the President, the Vice President and Go. John Connally. To assure a capacity crowd, local party officials are being called on to help. Quotas are being assigned to districts over the state. Funds raised are to be divided between the National and State Democratic organizations.

Most of Texas' 21 congressmen are expected to attend the dinner and all members of the Legislature will be invited. Early announcements indicate Sen. Ralph Yarborough will be with the Presidential party.

President Kennedy is due to arrive in Houston on November 21, where he will attend an appreciation dinner for Congressman Albert Thomas. Cities all over the State are bidding for the rest of his time.

### Draft Goldwater Campaign

Meanwhile, Republicans are not standing still on the eve of an election year.

State GOP Chairman Peter O'Donnell of Dallas came to Austin to announce the heads of the drive to draft U. S. Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona as a presidential candidate . . . and to map plans for other races.

State Rep. Dick Morgan of Dallas and Mrs. J. C. Man, jr., a Wichita Falls housewife, were designated co-chairmen of the campaign.

O'Donnell said 2,462 elective offices in Texas "will be up for grabs" next year and Republicans intend to reap a fair share.

He said the Republican timetable calls for a Draft-Goldwater chairman in each congressional district by December 1. County chairmen will be appointed by January 1 and precinct chairmen by January 15.

Many of the local draft movements will tie in with GOP county executive committees and with election campaigns for precinct, city, county and state, as well as national elections for public office.

Two things mold character. One of them is mental attitude and the other is the use of time. Neither one alone is sufficient; both are equal in importance. Together they determine the strength of character.

Mental attitude must be positive. There must be a firm belief that life is a gift and an opportunity. Since it is a gift we must take it as it is; we cannot dictate its terms. Since it is an opportunity, it is our responsibility to make the most of it. We may admit that there is a certain amount of luck in life, and that there may be a certain amount of "pull" in advancement. But with the right mental attitude we will be prepared to take advantage of any luck that comes our way, and we will think of "pull" simply the help of someone higher up. ### November 9 Election

Coke R. Stevenson, jr., administrator of the State Liquor Control Board, announced that Saturday's special election will not be a "dry day."

Stevenson said, "All types of alcoholic beverages may be sold during legal hours of sale on that day in wet areas."

### Legislative Redistricting

Pre-trial hearings will be held Friday on a suit to declare current state legislative districting laws unconstitutional.

State Sens. Don Kennard of Fort Worth and Franklin Speers of San Antonio; Reps. Bob Eckhardt of Houston and Jake Johnson of San Antonio; and Harris County Democratic chairman Bill Kilgartin filed the suit. They are objecting to the law which limits a county to no more than one senator and redistricts a county with more than 700,000 persons to one additional state representative per 100,000 population.

Several state elected officials who represent small-population

districts are intervening in the suit.

### Credit Insurance Rates

State Board of Insurance set new rates, rules, and regulations for credit insurance to become effective November 21.

A rate of 70 cents per \$100 a year was assigned group life coverage of the type used in 75 per cent of insured indebtedness. Board called it one of the lowest yet adopted. Maximum individual life policy rates were set at 80 cents per \$100 on loans exceeding \$700 and 90 cents on those up to \$700. Health and accident coverage rates compare closely with those under the model bill in other States, the Board maintained.

### Farm-Road Improvements

State Highway Commission approved one of the most extensive farm-to-market construction and improvement programs in many years.

It okayed an \$18,144,500 program to protect state investment

in 3,086 miles of F. M. roads. About 67 per cent of the money will go for reconstruction and reconditioning of existing roads and upgrading the safety factors. Work is proposed on more than 500 projects, covering in excess of a thousand miles of F. M. highways.

## Possible Strike Looms With Phone Company

Preparations for a possible strike against General Telephone Company of the Southwest have been made in Ralls, according to C. D. Guthrie, unit steward of the Communications Workers of America, Local 6180.

Guthrie reported last week that negotiations for a new contract have been going on since June 20 in San Angelo, headquarters for General. The Union is seeking improvements in wages, vacations, pensions, insurance coverage and other working conditions. Reductions on many of the original proposals have been made, Guthrie said.

Some offers on improvements sought have been made by the Company but are viewed as inadequate by the Union. Major Union-Company disagreements center around health insurance for employees and their dependents; vacations; pensions and certain Contract benefits the company is seeking to reduce.

Threat of a strike came a few days before some 9,000 CWA employees walked off their jobs in General Telephone Company of California at midnight Friday, July 18, 1963. The possibility of a strike date being established soon became apparent when the Union Negotiating Committee received a request from its International President, Joseph A. Beirne of Washington, D. C., to confer with him in Dallas Friday, October 25.

The Contract between C. W. A. and General of the Southwest covers some 2,700 employees in Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Louisiana and Arkansas; and had a primary anniversary date of July 21, 1963. All but five of the employees in the Ralls District are members of the Union.

At present there is no indication when the strike might come in Ralls, Guthrie said. "We are watching the strike in California at present before anything is done here."

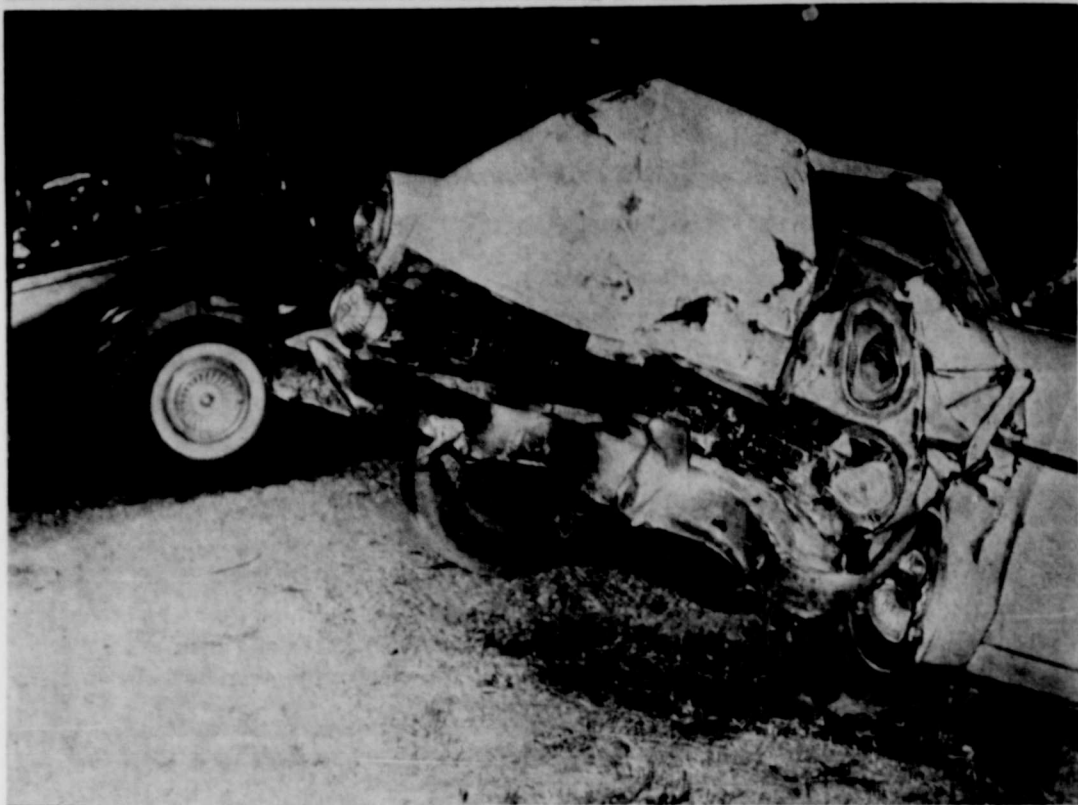

The Silverton Owls narrowly missed taking a win from the Crosbyton Chiefs here last Friday evening. The distance may have been measured by the decision of the referees that Dennis Tomlin did not catch a pass in the end zone for two conversion points which would have won the game for the Owls.

In a thrilling fourth quarter the Owls lighted the after burners and narrowed the 27-12 margin held by the Chiefs to a one-point lead. Silverton scored twice in the last four minutes of the game and was only one point away from a tie with the Chiefs with a conversion try remaining. A handoff to Greg Towe and around-end sweep failed to net the two necessary points.

The Owls attempted to steal the ball on an onside kick with scant seconds remaining, but the Owl with his hands on the ball couldn't bring it under control before it went out of bounds. Thus the Chiefs retained possession of the ball and their one-point lead. The final score was 27-26.

It was a big evening for Emmett Tomlin and his senior twin, Dennis. During pregame ceremonies Dennis had the privilege of crowning the 1963 Football Queen, Sandi House, and the customary kiss was bestowed by the queen's escort, Emmett Tomlin.

It was one of the first games of the season for Emmett, as he was injured in a pre-season scrimmage with Memphis. He showed his talent by running a total of 79 yards from the line of scrimmage. Max Garrison, another of the Owl's capable runners, gained a total of 75 yards rushing. Greg Towe ran 15 yards on three carries and Fred Stafford carried the pighide 44 yards. Dennis Tomlin received five passes and gained a total of 111 yards.

Max Garrison received the award for Offensive Player of the

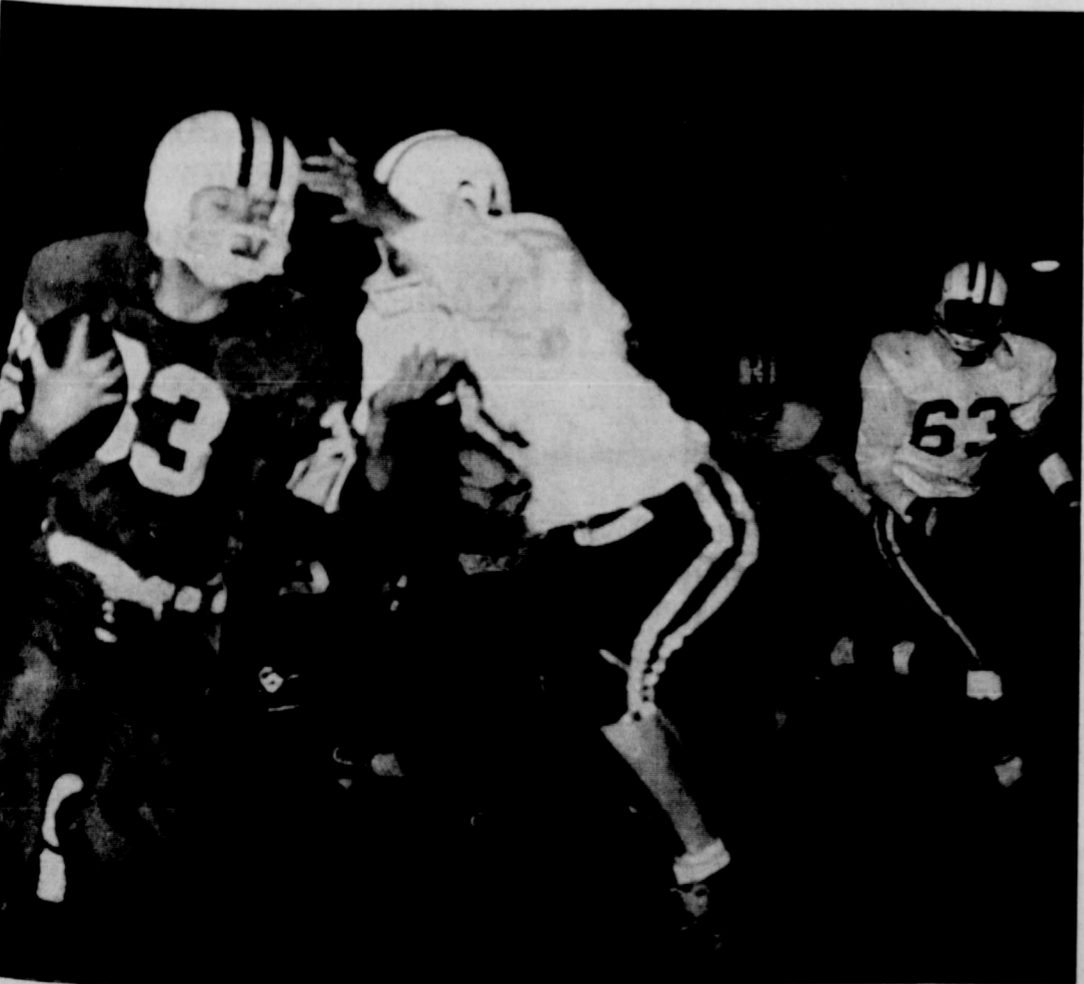
