

Two champions make him big Wheeler at County show

By the time the grand drive rolled around Saturday at the Bailey County Junior Market Steer Show, Jeffrey Wheeler's odds were excellent.

Jeffrey, son of Carl and Jackie Wheeler of Muleshoe, had two of the three champions in the grand drive, as well as a reserve champion waiting in the wings. Jeffrey's 1,234-pound Exotic cross was the champion of his breed, while his Hereford steer, also a 1,234-pounder, was the champion British entry.

Jeffrey also had the reserve champion British steer, the lightweight class winner.

Lynsie Black, daughter of Rex and Brenda Black, was the third exhibitor in the grand drive with her champion American breed steer.

Judge David Lust of Lazbuddie selected Jeffrey's champion Exotic as the grand champion, moving the second-

place steer from the same class, exhibited by Ky Kennedy, into the drive.

After a re-examination of the field, Lust chose Ky's steer as reserve grand champion. Ky is the son of Steve Kennedy of Muleshoe and Sheri Kennedy of Lubbock.

The steer show featured 50 entries. In addition, one beef heifer and three dairy heifers were exhibited.

The champion beef heifer was shown by Myndi Heathington, daughter of Don and Dani Heathington.

In the dairy heifers, it was a Hancock family sweep, as Lela Hancock had the first place and grand champion. James Hancock had the second place and reserve grand champion. Erin Hancock had the third-place dairy heifer. All three are the children of Larry and Pam

Kennedys make clean sweep in swine show

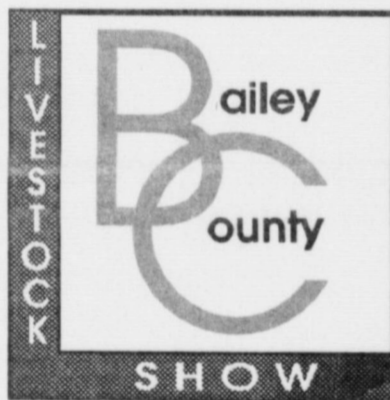
The Kennedys swept the Bailey County Junior Market Swine Show last Friday, as Keila exhibited the grand champion and brother Ky the reserve grand champion.

• Tatom Heathington with the champion Yorkshire. Meredith Potts had the reserve champion.

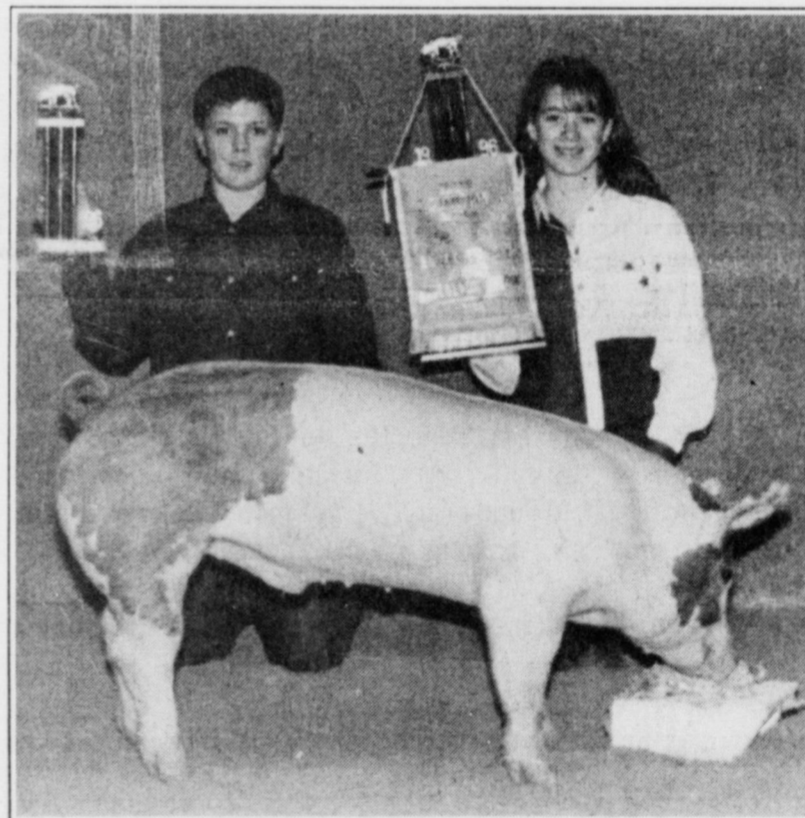

MHS frolics in easy 68-54 non-district win

Muleshoe remembered basketball is supposed fun.

Playing relaxed for the first time in weeks, Muleshoe beat Plains, 68-54, in what amounted to a mid-district snack for the Lady Mules.

"It was kind of fun for me," said senior MHS Michelle Williams with a big smile after scoring a season-high 13 points. "We came out relaxed and just played."

Muleshoe was coming off a 22-point home loss to District 2-3A leader Friona.

"We talked about how we can't lose any more games the rest of the year if we want to make the state tournament," Williams said. "Even if it was a non-district game."

The final score was deceiving. The Lady Mules pretty much had their way when their starters were on the floor.

Muleshoe (18-7) hit its first five shots, taking a 18-5 lead four minutes into the game, with Williams scoring seven points.

The catalysts were a three-quarter-court press and good passing. Muleshoe forced 14 first-half turnovers (25 for the game).

Class 1A Plains (14-10) pulled within 29-25 midway through the second quarter when Muleshoe coach Jim Gruhlkey went six deep into his bench.

But the starters returned, and Muleshoe ripped off a 10-0 run before a 3-pointer by Tessa St. Romain (12 points) made it 39-28 at the half.

Eight of Muleshoe's 10 points in the run were assisted.

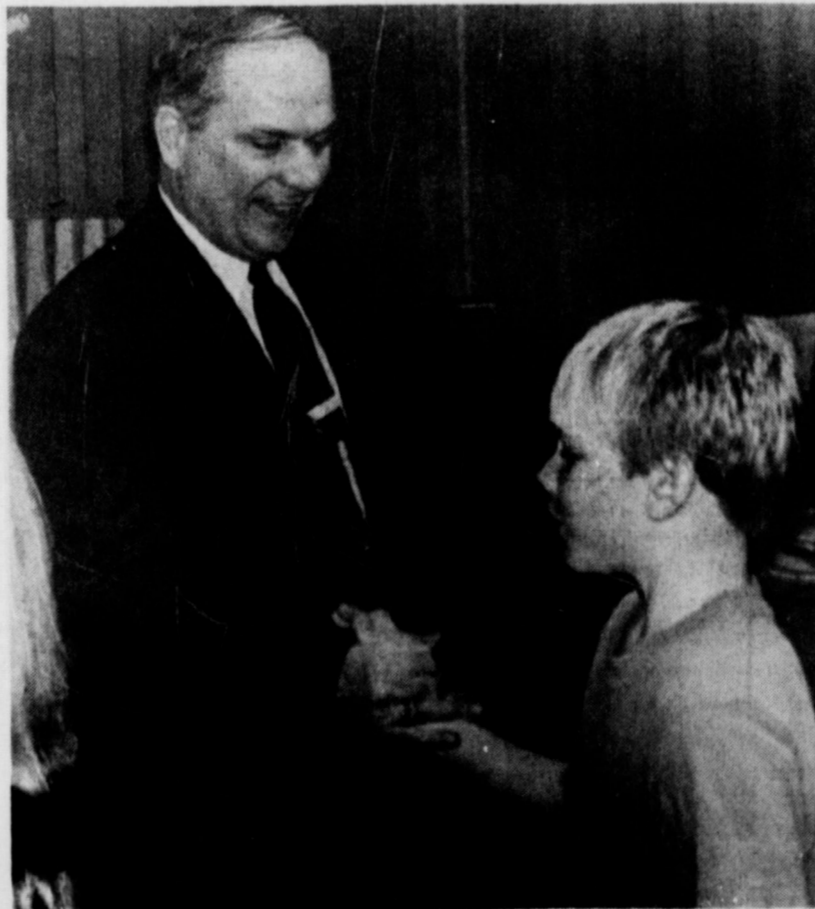

Texas plan calls for restocking herds

AUSTIN — Discussions underway between the U.S. and Mexican governments to institute a loan guaranty program for Mexican cattle raisers to buy U.S. cattle for restocking depleted herds.

The Texas Department of Agriculture is working to ensure that Texas cattle producers are ready to take advantage of the massive sale.

"Whether or not a loan guaranty program is finalized between Mexico and the United States, Mexican cattlemen are replenishing their herds, and I want them to buy as many of those cattle from Texas as they can," Texas agriculture commissioner Rick Perry said. "Australia and New Zealand are also seeking to restock Mexican herds. But I expect the Mexicans will want to buy from us because we have superior genetics, and, as their next-

door neighbor, we can offer the best deal on hauling expenses."

To facilitate sales to Mexican buyers, TDA is working with cattle organizations and producer associations throughout the state, including Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers, Texas Cattle Feeders, the Texas Beef Council, Independent Cattlemen, the Pure Bred cattle Alliance and the Texas Farm Bureau.

Because Mexican ranchers are expected to buy commercial heifers, TDA is establishing a 1-800 hotline that will allow ranchers across the state to call in and be part of a computer information database, Perry said. Ranches listed on the database will be provided to Mexican buyers who request this information.

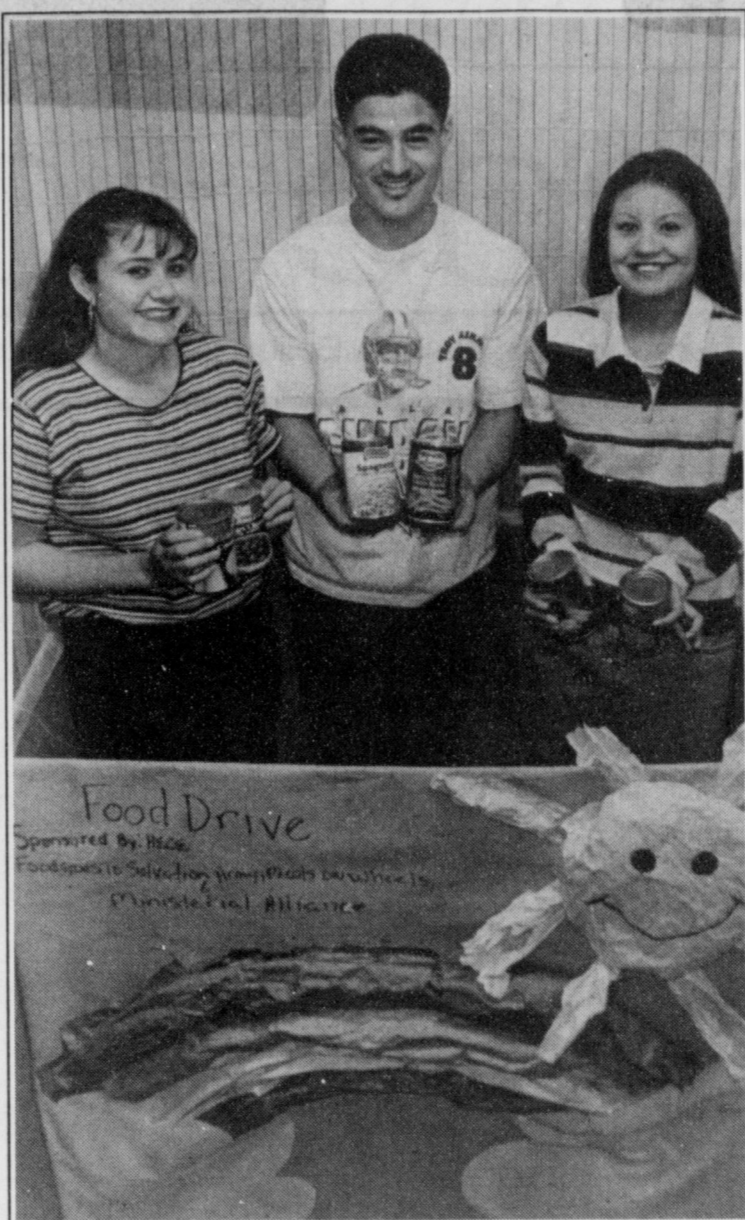

EPA approves fungicide's use for controlling potato blight

AUSTIN — The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has approved the use of Tattoo C Suspension Concentrate Fungicide, which will allow farmers to control late blight in potatoes.

Farmers in Bailey and Parmer counties are allowed to use the fungicide until Oct. 31.

Without the use of the fungicide, the state's potato crop could face a potential loss of \$21 million, according to TDA estimates.

An estimated 20,000 acres of potatoes are predicted to be

harvested this year in the state. This is up from 13,000 harvested acres in 1994.

Because of the increase in production, seedlings have been imported from other states for planting and some seedlings have come from states known to have the late potato blight, which is resistant to all fungicides on the market.

Before applying the pesticide, farmers should contact their local county extension agents or dealers for information on proper application methods and restrictions.

Several local companies, individuals and organizations have adopted Bailey County Meals on Wheels recipients for one year.

Sponsoring one to three recipients' meals are Five Area Telephone Cooperative, Inc., Muleshoe Kiwanis Club, West Plains Telcommunications, Inc., Lowe's Marketplace, Wheelabrator Coal Services, a WMX Technologies Company, Sain Irrigation & Machine, and Bamert Seed Co.

"I think it's wonderful," said Berta Combs, director of Bailey County Aging Services. "One person adopted five recipients anonymously, and several others have sponsored one person's meals for a year."

Combs said she thinks more responsibility soon will fall locally for this kind of program.

"With the government trying to balance its budget, federal programs are being cut," Combs said. "We don't know what's going to happen to funds coming from the Older Americans Act implemented during the Kennedy Era."

Meals on Wheels volunteers deliver lunch to 40 recipients' homes five days a week except for County holidays. The program is "an essential part of enabling the elderly to stay in their own homes as long as possible," Combs said.

All the funds go directly for the meals and containers, Combs said. No administrative costs are taken from the donations people make.

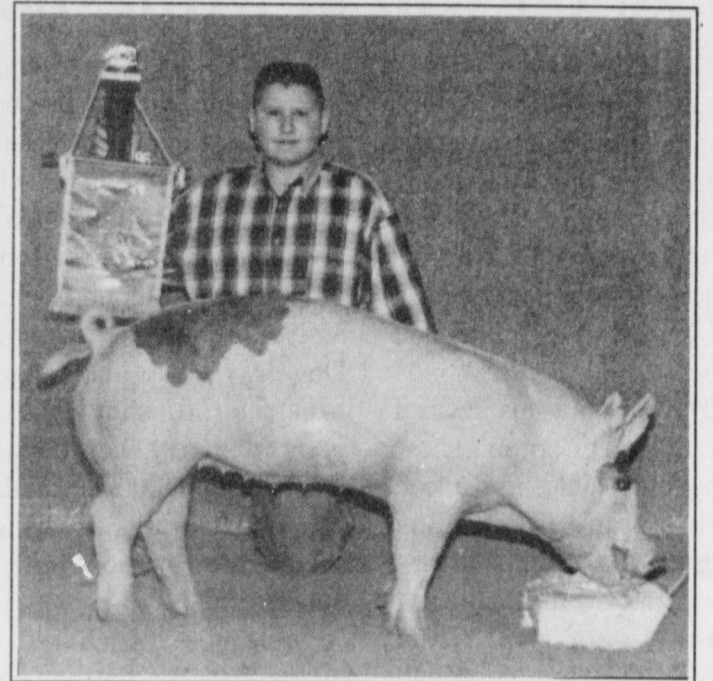

Cowboys ride big 2nd half to 96-60 win at Muleshoe

Muleshoe was as flat as the Plains team that beat them, 96-60, Tuesday at WJHS gym.

The Cowboys (14-7) turned the non-district game into a rout with a 62-point second half.

"They just out-hustled us. I hope this team doesn't show up again," Muleshoe coach Ralph Mason said, nodding his head toward his team's locker room. "But that doesn't take anything away from (Plains). They're a good ball club."

Muleshoe (4-19), which never led in the game, pulled within 38-34 early in the second half on a long 3-pointer by Matt Mason and a three-point play by freshman Dustin Cleavinger (19 points).

That was as close as Muleshoe would get.

Plains closed the third quarter with a 22-6 run, then ran wild in a 36-point fourth quarter.

Muleshoe pressed the whole game. But the press failed to create the tempo or turnovers expected. Instead, it led to more than a dozen easy baskets.

When the break wasn't there, Plains pulled the ball

out and ran its offense, most of the time getting the ball into the hands of Chase Clanahan. Clanahan, who looked like he might make a good linebacker, finished with 26 points, 12 rebounds and 8 assists. Fellow post Johnny Don Davis was the biggest benefactor, finishing with 26 points with few shots beyond five feet. Ralph Rameriz added 25 points for Plains, which shot 69.5 percent from the field (41-59).

Muleshoe, which fell in love with the 3-pointer against the Cowboys' 2-3 and 1-3-1 zones, shot 41 percent (21-51). The Mules were 2 of 17 from 3-point range in the first half and 5 of 27 for the game.

Alfonzo Mendoza and Chris Shelburne added eight points for Muleshoe, which hosts Shallowater Friday.

District 8-1A preview

LHS looking to end long drought

It's been 25 years since Lazbuddie won a district basketball title. It might have been another 25 years if realignment hadn't moved Lazbuddie to a more state-tournament-friendly district a few years ago.

Year after year, Nazareth, Sudan and Happy where District 7-1A powers, leaving little hope for Lazbuddie.

Lazbuddie still isn't totally free of its former tormentors. Lazbuddie was district runnerup the last four years, and each year the Longhorns would draw the 7-1A champion in the bi-district.

"It's monstrous, major," Lazbuddie coach Gary Grahn said about the importance of winning the district title. "We need to stay away from Nazareth. They're look like they're the best team in the region."

Nazareth is ranked fifth in the state. By winning the district, the Longhorns (17-6) would avoid the 7-1A champion until the Region I finals (final 8 teams in the state).

Two teams with distinctly different styles figure to stand in the Longhorns' way.

Boys

Defending 8-1A champion Amherst (6-6) is physical while Spade (19-2) pushes the ball up floor for 32 minutes.

Cotton Center, the third team in the four-team district, is 10-9.

"You can't let Amherst dominate the paint," Grahn said. "And against Spade, you have to get back and play defense and make them set up their offense. You can't let them run up and down the floor and shoot layups."

Lazbuddie offense revolves around getting the ball inside to 6-6 post Jason Thomas. Thomas is averaging 15 points and 8 rebounds a game. Versatile junior Justin St. Clair averages 14 points and 7 rebounds, and sophomore Chris Smith (37 3-pointers) helps keep defenses honest.

"We wear people down inside, and that eventually takes its toll in the fourth quarter," Grahn said.

His biggest concerns: "We have a tendency to go three or four minutes without scoring. And we get lackadaisical on defense."

Lady Horns' in wide-open race

It's a six-game season, and there's no clear-cut favorite as all four teams in District 8-1A enter league play below .500.

"It's pretty much anybody's ballgame," Lazbuddie coach Carey Sudduth said. "It's going to be whoever plays well for six games. I hope we can be consistent."

Girls

Sudduth hopes a tough non-district schedule pays off for Lazbuddie (9-16).

"At this point, I'm glad we did it this way. I think we're pretty prepared for what we'll see in district."

Sudduth admits the Lady Longhorns were in over their heads some nights, the victim of an upgraded schedule designed in part for the Lazbuddie boys, who are a few years ahead in building their program.

The Lady Longhorns are saddled with two problems — lack of size and experience.

"I've been pleased with our maturity," Sudduth said. "We just let the size take care of itself."

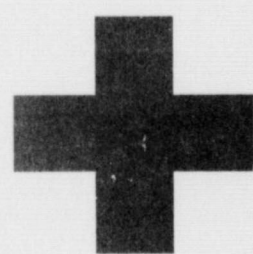
Junior Mandy Magby and freshman Holly Engelking average 12 points a game, with Engelking adding 6 rebounds. Sophomore Roxanne Warren (11 points, 8 rebounds) is the Lady 'Horns' lone inside threat. But Warren is questionable for the rest of the season after injuring a shoulder in an car accident over the weekend.

Amherst (6-13) is the defending champion, but lost almost everyone while Cotton Center (7-12) is a veteran club with size. Spade (2-18) will be regulated to a spoiler's role.

"We'll have to use our quickness and get after them with the press and try to get some easy buckets."

In the semifinals, Clements scored 18 points and WJHS pulled away in the fourth quarter of a 53-42 win over Dimmitt.

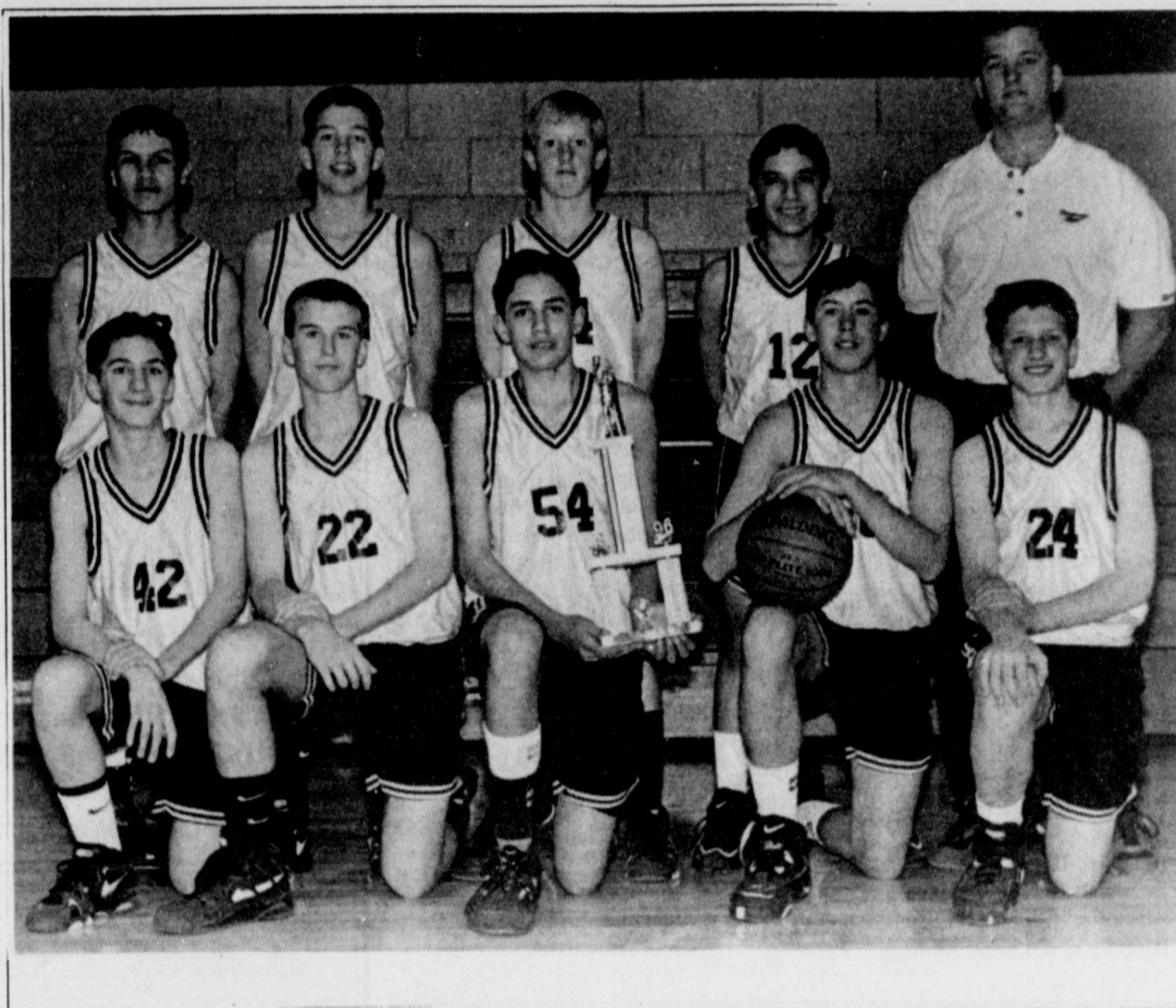
Black added 12 points for the Mules and Mason finished with 10. WJHS outscored Dimmitt, 11-3, in the fourth quarter.

social studies programs of World Lab, which has been implemented at both elementary campuses.

stock specialists who have worked extensively with buyers from Mexico.

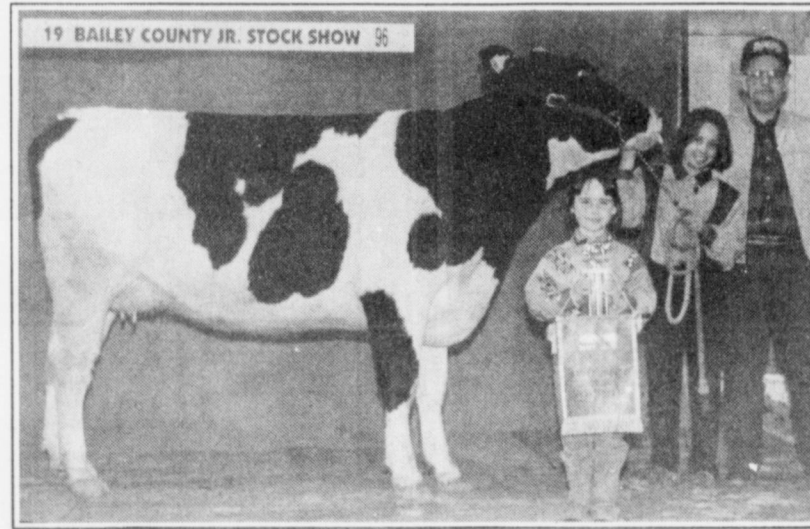

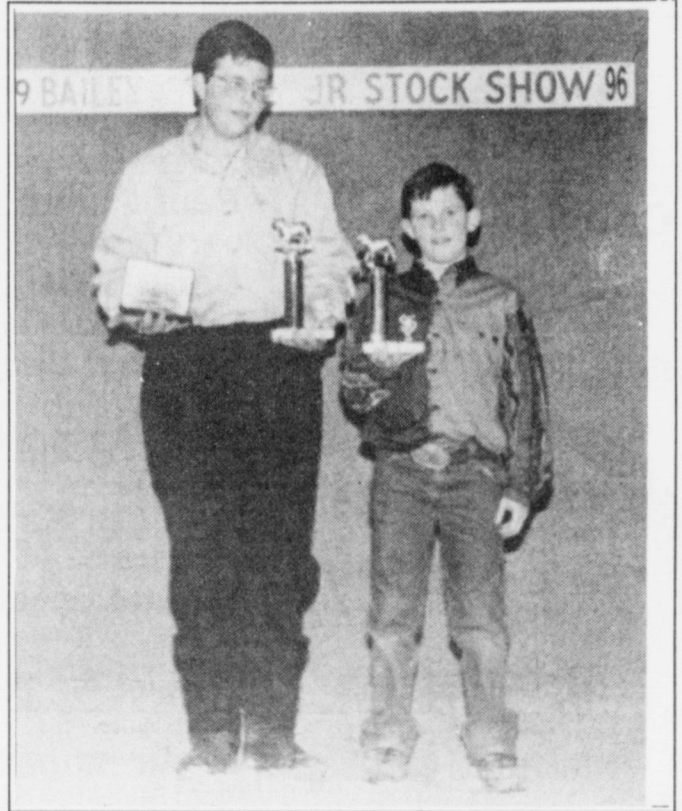
