T.F.&R. Bees In AAU Tourney

The T.F.&R. Queen Bees of Silverton buzzed to a 78-20 win over the Catholic Indian Center Falcons of Gallup, New Mexico, Tuesday morning. The Bees bounced back from their defeat at the hands of Garvin's Grill of Washington, D. C. in the first round of the National AAU Tournament being played in St. Joseph, Missouri, this week.

Alvin Redin, Mr. and Mrs. Shellie Tomlin of T.F.&R. Fertilizer Company, sponsor of the Bees, were on hand as the Flying Queens also downed their opponent, Ouachita College of Arkadelphia, Arkansas, 62-31. The Queens, coached by Harley Redin, went into the tournament as the second-rated team to the powerful Nashville Business College.

Cheryl Cuiwell of Tulia fanned her scoring average with 21 points while Mary Finley, the schoolgirl from Claude, flipped in 14. Gail Nicholas and Darlene Rainey each scored 12 points.

The candidate who is elected Sweetheart of the Silverton Lions Club will represent the local group at the District Convention this spring, and will compete with other club sweethearts in the district for the title of District Sweetheart.

The Bees were favored to win the Consolation title on the basis of their strong showing Tuesday. Mrs. Alvin Redin plans to fly to St. Joseph today to join the other Silverton sponsors for the final games of the tournament.

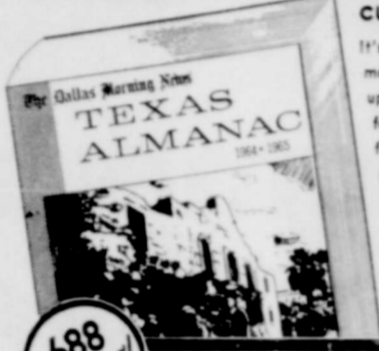

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For a tasty casserole, combine mild mannered hominy grits with pretty red pimientos and a sharp cheese. Serve with scrambled eggs and sausage as the star attraction at breakfast, brunch, lunch or supper.

- Pimiento-Cheese Baked Hominy Grits**
- 2 cups cooked hominy grits*
 - 1 cup milk
 - 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
 - 2 eggs, beaten
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 cup grated sharp cheese
 - 1 can or jar (4 oz.) pimientos, chopped

Heat milk together with butter or margarine and blend in hominy grits until mixture is smooth. Add remaining ingredients and pour into a buttered baking dish. Bake at 350° until firm and lightly brown on top—about 30 to 40 minutes. Casserole will have an almost custard-like consistency.
 (*Follow directions on hominy grits package for cooking grits and then allow to cool, or use left-over grits from a previous meal.)

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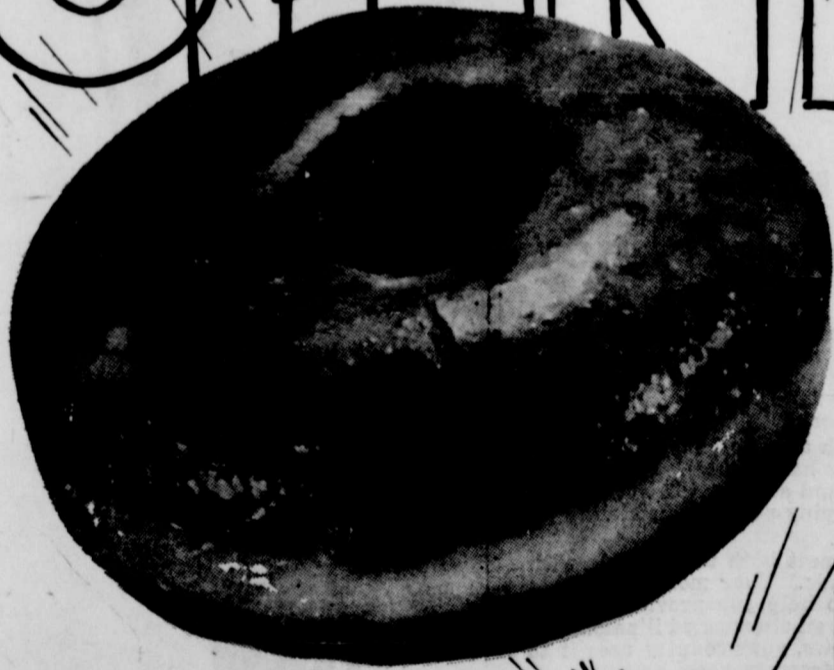
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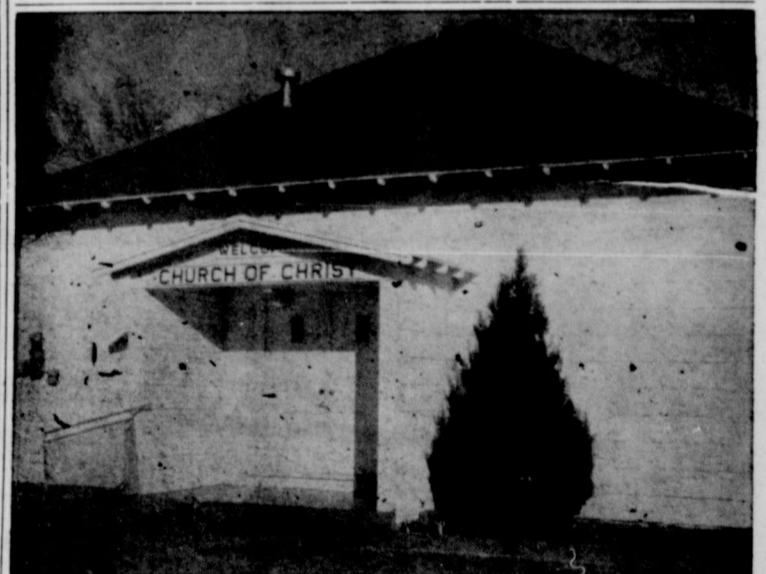

Dash of salt
1 cup evaporated milk
2 1/4 cups sifted confectioners' sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Prepare cake mix as directed on package. Bake in two 8-inch layer pans. Cool.

Melt chocolate chips and butter in saucepan. Remove from heat. Add salt, milk, and 1 cup of the sugar and mix well. Place over medium heat and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Then cook and stir 8 minutes. Remove from heat and add vanilla; blend well. Cool to room temperature. Add remaining 1 1/4 cups sugar, a small amount at a time, blending well after each addition. Spread over tops and sides of cake layers.

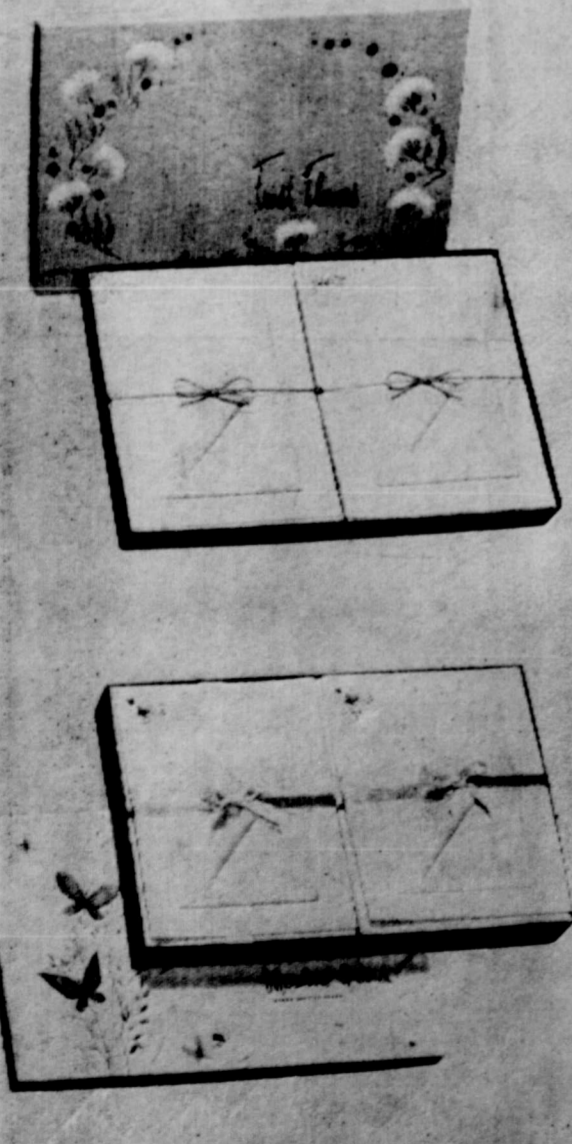

HOW TO FRY FISH TO PERFECTION



By Jane Ashley

There is nothing better than crisp and crunchy perfect fried fish. Follow the basic rules: Use fresh oil for frying, and since the fat in all fish is unsaturated, then by all means use an unsaturated fat such as Mazola which is 100% corn oil. Fill the fry pan no more than 1/2 full. Dip the fish in flour or corn meal, or in a batter if you prefer. Fry at 375 degrees on deep fat thermometer or as indicated on the electric fryer or fry pan. Fry small quantities at a time. Always bring the fat back to the 375 degrees temperature before adding more fish. Fry two to three minutes or until golden. Drain on paper toweling and serve hot.

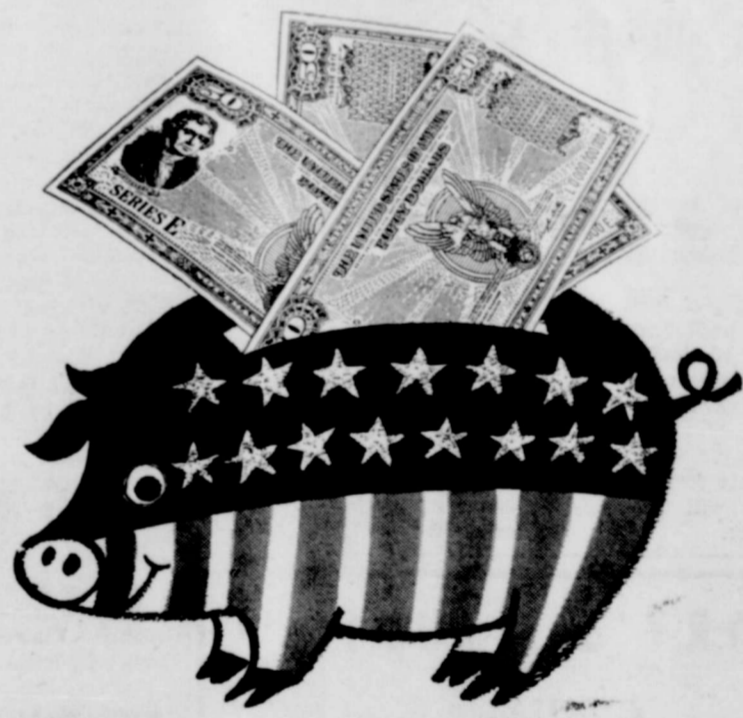
