

## Rentfro Services Held In Amarillo

Funeral services for William L. (Bill) Rentfro, 84, of Amarillo were conducted Monday morning in the Schooler-Gordon Colonial Chapel there.

Graveside rites were conducted at 1:00 p.m. Monday in Rose Hill Cemetery in Tulia.

Mr. Rentfro died at 11:15 a.m. Saturday at Thurman's Convalescent Home in Amarillo.

He was born October 27, 1879, in Mineral Wells and had been a resident of Amarillo for 30 years. He was a retired real estate dealer with offices in Amarillo and Clayton, New Mexico, and a rancher with holdings near Clayton and Springer in New Mexico. A member of the Presbyterian Church, he was a former Tulia resident.

## Irrigation Pipelines Aid Conservation

Many irrigation farmers have found that irrigation pipelines pay for themselves in a few years through savings in labor and maintenance costs alone. Additional benefits are received from water conservation, erosion control, and preventing salty land.

Irrigation pipeline prevents objectionable weed growth in ditches. Fields can be irrigated in less time due to increased water carrying capacity of the pipeline and the elimination of seepage losses.

Although irrigation has been practiced for many centuries, most of the very early irrigation projects no longer exist. Some of them came to an end because water supplies failed. Many, however, had to be abandoned because the land became too salty to grow crops successfully. Poor drainage, over-irrigation and seepage all contributed to the failure of these projects. Today, these same factors are causing much irrigated land to become too salty for profitable farming. The part that seepage from unlined canals and ditches plays in producing these effects makes it a serious agricultural problem, especially in areas which have plenty of low cost irrigation water that is high in soluble salts.

Seepage losses vary in unlined ditches depending primarily on soil permeability, the depth of water in the ditch and the depth to the water table in the soil.

How does this invisible waste called seepage affect cropland? Seepage water percolates down through the soil until it reaches an impervious layer. Over a period of time, seepage accumulation causes the water table to rise. When the soil becomes waterlogged, the water replaces oxygen, and cools the soil. Soil organisms cannot live and produce organic matter without warmth and oxygen. Without organic matter plant life cannot survive. When plant life is gone the bare soil lies exposed directly to the sun. The hot

# Crop Residue Is Vital Practice In Conservation

Crop residue use is defined as utilizing plant residues left in cultivated fields by incorporating them into the soil or leaving them on the soil surface through the critical erosion periods (about April 1, when followed by spring planted crops and July 15 when followed by fall planted crops.)

The purpose of crop residue use is to conserve moisture, increase infiltrations, reduce soil losses, and improve soil tilth. It is applicable on cropland when seasonal soil protection is not provided by other practices and where the physical condition of the soil needs to be improved and maintained. Pounds of residues required on the surface for soil protection at the end of the critical erosion period depends upon the type of soil. 750 pounds drilled residues or 1000 pounds row residue is sufficient for most soils on the

High Plains. The loamy sand, loamy fine sands, silty clay, clay and clay loams below the Cap require 1250 to 1750 pounds drilled residues or 1750 to 2500 pounds row residue for best results.

Some of the crops that will produce the desired quantity of residue are Sudan, small grains, high residue producing varieties of sorghums or other crops that will produce sufficient amounts of residue to be managed.

The tillage operations are very important to insure the amount of residue to be left for different soils. Residues may be left undisturbed, shredded, mowed, or knocked down with a stalk cutter. Normally loose residues need to be "tucked in" by tillage to prevent blowing away.

The March winds will continue to blow, but with the practice of crop residue use through the critical erosion periods we can conserve moisture, increase water infiltration, improve soil tilth and help to reduce soil losses.

# Car Inspection Deadline Near

The time is almost here—April 15 is the deadline for having your 1964 Motor Vehicle Inspection sticker displayed in the lower right hand corner of your windshield. Only 50% of the 604,369 registered vehicles in Region 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety have visited safety inspection stations and obtained their 1964 safety inspection sticker, according to Captain Alan Johnson, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service of the D.P.S.

Residents of Briscoe County own 1,760 registered vehicles, and 890 of them have not been inspected yet," Johnson said.

"Under the law there can be no extension of the deadline, and motorists who fail to display the new sticker on and after April 16 are subject to arrest," he said. Authority for the enforcement of the provisions of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Act is vested in any Sheriff or Deputy Sheriff and City Policeman as well as the enforcement officers of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Applicant seeks a permit to amend Permit No. 2075 so as to provide recreational use of the waters stored in a 132 acre-foot reservoir located on Cottonwood Creek, Red River Watershed, in Briscoe County, Texas, all being more fully set out in said application.

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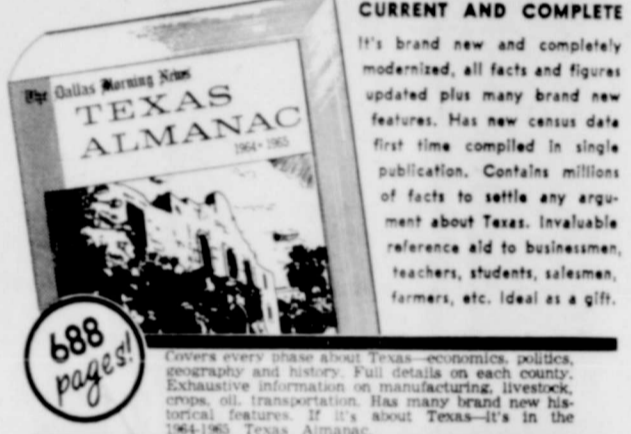

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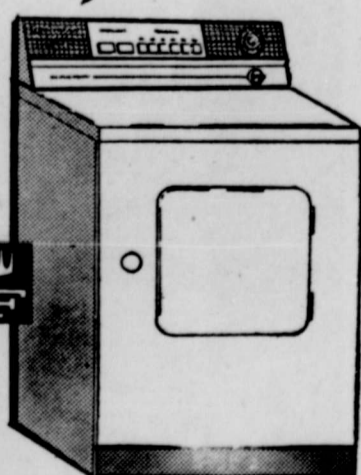
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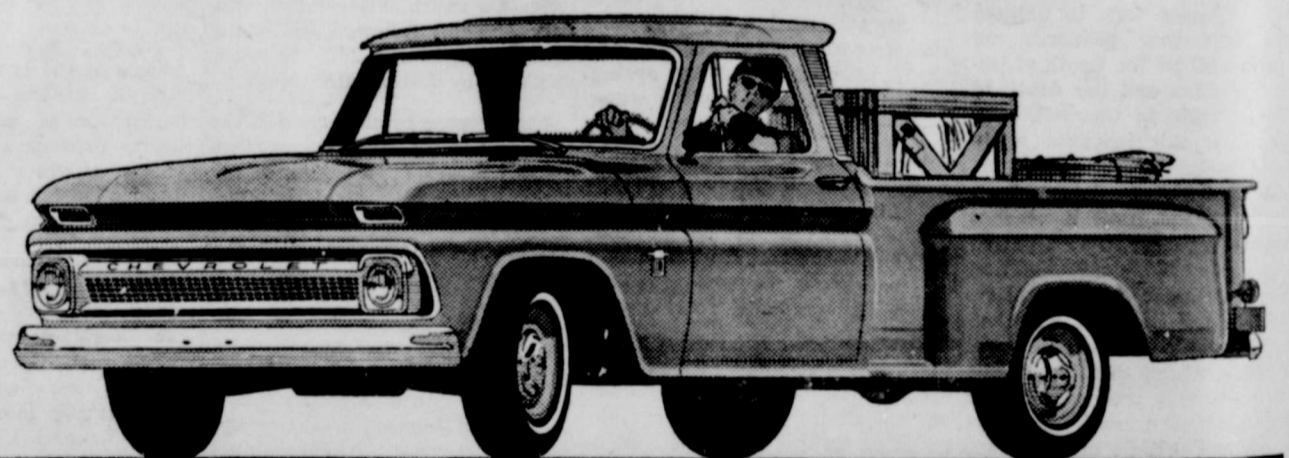

Trim excess fat from steak and lightly score the steak on both sides. Place in a shallow baking dish with the dressing; cover and marinate for 2 hours. Remove meat from marinade. Broil 1 1/2 to 2 inches from heat for 5 minutes. Turn and broil an additional 5 minutes. Remove meat to a heated platter, reserving meat juices for mushroom gravy. While steak broils, melt the butter or margarine in a saucepan. Sauté mushrooms 3 minutes. Add marinade and saute another 3 minutes. Stir in parsley and the meat juices. To serve: Slice the steak diagonally across the grain in very thin slices. Serve with mushroom gravy. Makes 6-8 servings.

\* Boneless, beef steak about 12-14 inches long, 4-6 inches wide and 1 inch thick.

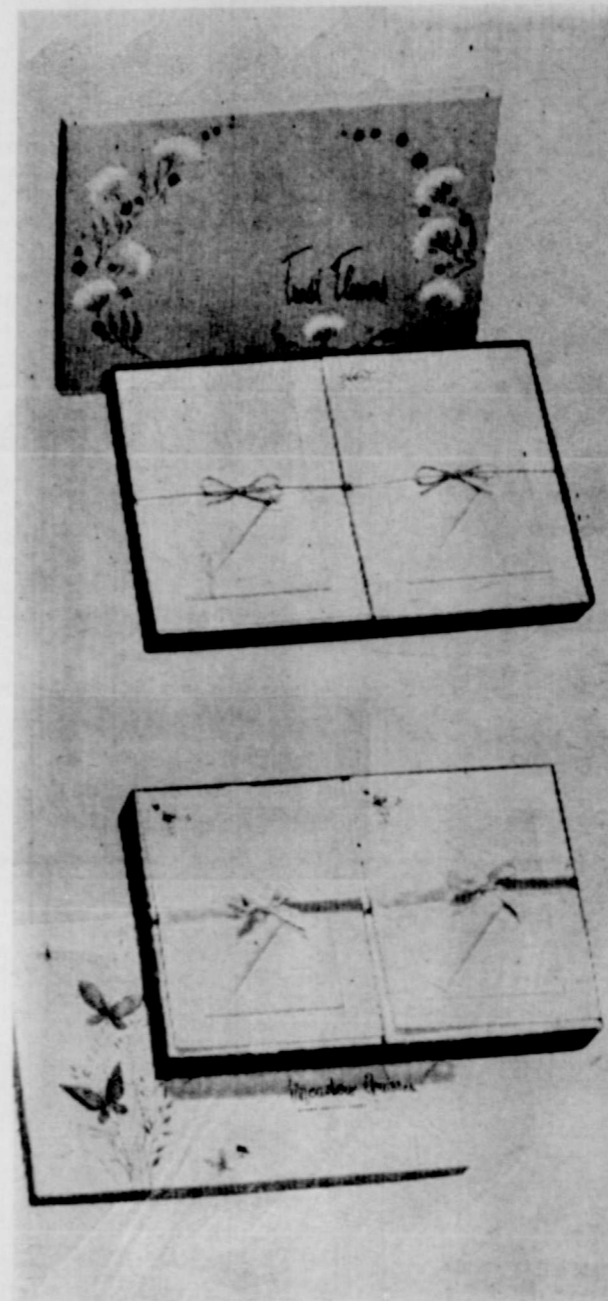

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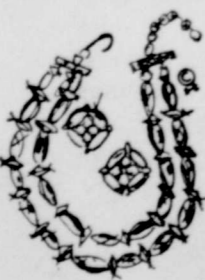
