

## No Postal Money Order To Be Sold On Saturdays

Limited adjustments in some postal services were ordered in Washington recently by Postmaster General John A. Gronoski to save \$12.7 million. Postmaster Grady Martin said today.

Only one service change is planned locally. Postmaster Martin said Effective immediately there will be no postal money orders written on Saturdays. Rural carrier cannot pick up money on Saturdays, and for this reason it will not be wise to leave money in your rural box on Saturdays.

The Postmaster emphasized that no essential major services are affected under the orders. There

will be no changes in rural delivery or special delivery, for example. Letters and other first-class mail will be handled with the same priority as ever.

The economy step, Mr. Martin explained, is in line with President Johnson's programs under which the recent Federal income tax cut was provided.

# Let's Count The Cost!

That Swisher County Hospital lost \$40,000 on operations last year has been a widely-discussed fact. Scarcely anyone has asked how or why this deficit operation is so.

Following is a letter which Dr. Neville Muckleroy received last week from Jack Driskill, Swisher County Judge:

To confirm our telephone conversation dated the 15th of April, 1964, I would like to explain why our County Hospital has shown a considerable loss. The views expressed below are my personal views.

Our Hospital is a two story affair, which requires RNs on each floor for each of the three eight hour shifts as well as LVNs and nurses aides. This one factor probably costs us in payroll around \$3,000.00 monthly; whereas if we had a one story Hospital the help required would be considerably less.

The maintenance is quite high on an old building as well as electricity and other bills.

It is my opinion that with a new building properly built any County could expect to break even for a number of years and probably never lose over \$12,000.00 a year.

Hope this will be of some help and I would like to see Briscoe County establish a hospital. I certainly believe it is a definite asset to your community.

Experts in the field of hospital planning have done extensive research in the matter of the economics of hospital operation. The architects who have been working on a preliminary plan for the proposed Briscoe County Hospital have implemented in their plan ways to increase the economy of operation of a local hospital through the use of a one-story structure, one centrally-located nurses' station, etc. Physical design has a great deal to do with the economy of operation of a hospital.

In some cities old hospital buildings are actually being abandoned in favor of building new structures. It is more economical to build a modern hospital plant which can be operated with a smaller deficit than to continue absorbing tremendous financial losses.

Swisher County Hospital has been used as the classic example by those opposing hospitals because of its antiquated facilities which cause terrific and often unnecessary personnel expenses.

Judge Driskill pointed out that they have 49 on the hospital payroll

with salaries of \$10,700 per month. On Sunday evening of this week there were no patients on the first floor (maternity) and the receptionist, registered nurse, LVN and aides were on duty with no duties.

The exact cost of operation of the proposed Briscoe County Hospital would be impossible to determine because it will be directly proportionate to how much the people will use the entire hospital facility.

In a letter dated March 31, 1964, to Dr. Neville Muckleroy, the Texas State Department of Health advised: "The area in which Silvertown is located is an intermediate hospital service area, which has a relatively high priority for assistance under this (the Hill-Burton) program, since only 44.5% of the bed needs have been met." (This area referred to includes Memphis, Floydada, Tulia and Clarendon.)

The Texas Health Department figures hospital needs on the basis of four beds for every 1,000 residents. Briscoe County has approximately 4,000 residents, which indicates a need for a 16-bed hospital, the size being planned by architects.

It is generally agreed by people who have studied the situation that hospitals, as such, rarely show a profit; in fact, most hospitals operate at a loss of between \$1.50 and \$5.00 a year per capita in the area served. An accurate figure would be impossible to determine, but during the early stage of operation let's assume the proposed hospital would lose \$1,000.00 per month, for the sake of figuring individual tax rates.

The \$185,000 bond election set for May 9 would be for Briscoe County's share of the hospital (bonds must be approved by the voters before application can be made for the Hill-Burton matching funds). The following table was prepared by the First Southwest Bonding Corporation of Lubbock, showing how the \$185,000 with 4% interest could be retired in 20 years.

**All Around the Town**

Several local people have expressed an interest in knowing why the former Silvertown hospital building was sold, for how much it was sold, what has been done with the money received and what has been done with the hospital supplies which were on hand at the time of the sale.

First of all, it should be noted that a representative of the State Health Department was in Silvertown in 1960, and made it clear that no hospital could be operated in the barracks building which had formerly served as a hospital. It could neither be licensed as a hospital nor insured as a hospital.

For this reason, the hospital association voted to sell the barracks portion and use the money received from the sale to remodel the clinic portion.

When Dr. Neville Muckleroy moved to Silvertown on September 21, 1960, the hospital association had \$151.55 on hand in the bank. Receipts included: \$1,040.00 for the barracks; \$70.00 insurance rebate; \$35.00 for sale of old equipment; and \$22.50 for bed rentals.

The hospital board offered to pay the moving expenses to encourage a doctor to move here, and when the Muckleroy family moved to Silvertown \$262.52 was paid for their moving expenses. Approximately \$498.77 was spent for labor of repairing and preparing the clinic, moving equipment from storage to the clinic and new plumbing; \$225.00 for new floor tile; \$160.00 for air conditioning; \$65.00 for insurance.

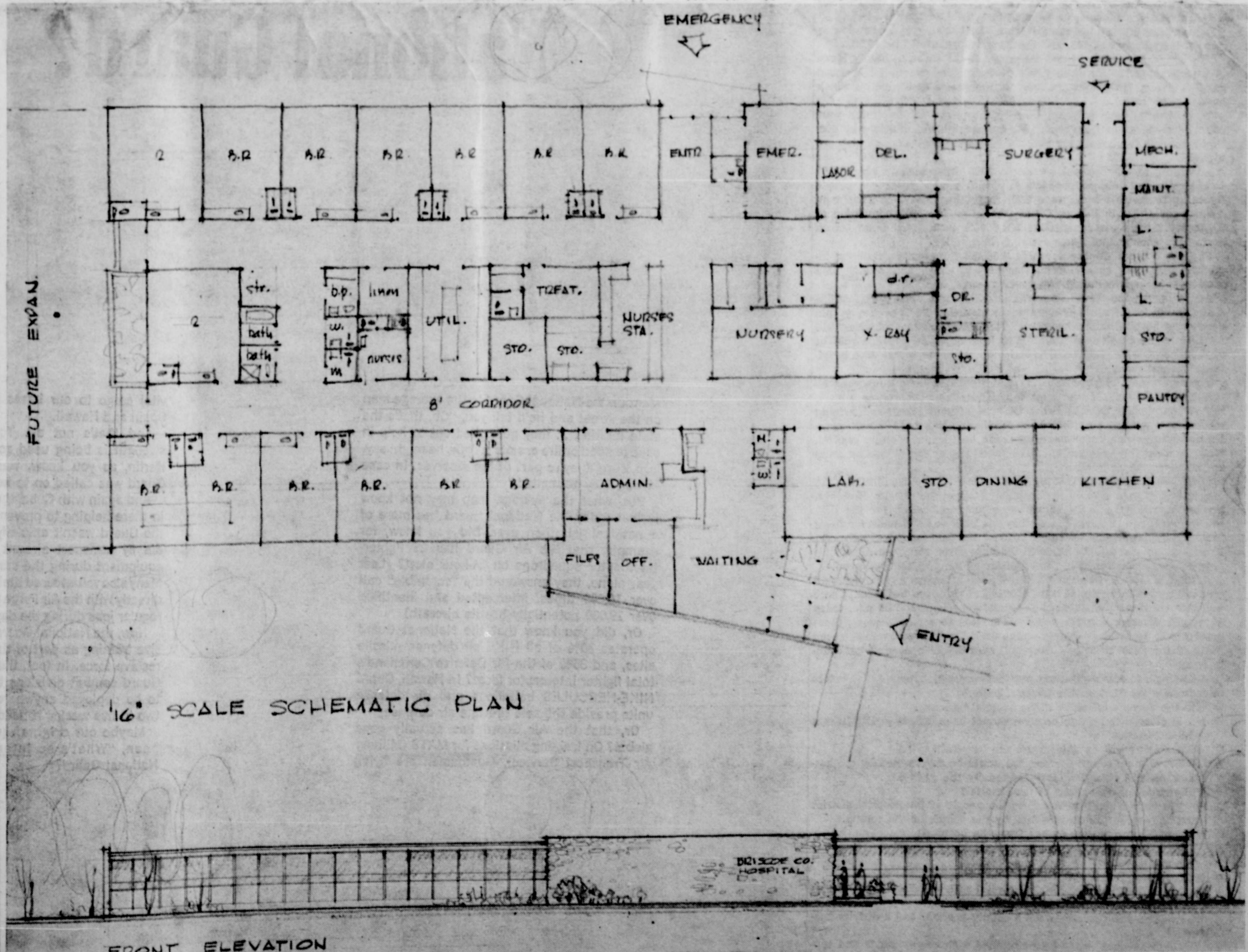
A balance of \$107.76 remains in the hospital association account.

In addition to this, Dr. Muckleroy has made a number of improvements and repairs to the clinic building himself, and has paid the insurance premiums each year as they have come due.

The linens which belonged to the hospital association were put into use at the clinic by the Nichols group before Dr. Muckleroy came here. These, needless to say, have worn out, and have been replaced by Dr. Muckleroy.

Other equipment that was in workable condition also has been put into service at the clinic. The hospital beds have been in service in the homes of local people who needed them, as well as other hospital equipment which was loaned to those who needed it. Nothing has been charged these people for the use of the hospital equipment, and the receipts for use of hospital equipment were donated to the association in appreciation for the use of the equipment.

The checks, deposit slips, bank statements and minutes of hospital association meetings are open for inspection at any time. If anyone cares to go through them they may do so by contacting Gene Morris at Morris Pharmacy.

Table with 4 columns: Year, 8,000, 5,360, 13,360. Rows for years 1973 through 1985.

The table shows \$13,672 for bond and interest payments, and allowing \$12,000 a year for operating losses, the total necessary is \$25,672 a year total increase in county tax receipts needed to finance and operate the proposed hospital.

The increase in taxes of 1/4 section of irrigated land located south of Silverton which recently sold for \$600 an acre which has a tax valuation of \$3,210.00 would be \$12.84 a year.

Hospital taxes on a section of land north of Quitaque in the breaks which has a county tax valuation of \$1,250.00 would be \$5.00 a year.

Increase in taxes on a cultivated dryland section with house (that owner lives in) north of Silverton which has a county tax valuation of \$6,090.00 would be \$24.36 a year.

A dry section without a house valued at \$5,885.00 would be taxed \$23.54 a year.

A section of flat grassland above the Caprock which has a tax value of \$5,500.00 would be taxed \$22.00.

The taxes on 1/2 section irrigated land with three 8" wells, new house for hired hand and gas line with a tax valuation of \$5,265 would amount to \$21.06 a year.

Taxes on 200 acres cultivated land with owner's house located one mile south of Quitaque on pavement with a value of \$2,490 would be \$9.96 a year.

Increase in the taxes of 158 acres irrigated land about a mile south of the Midway Drive in which recently sold which has a county tax valuation of \$1,640 would be \$6.56.

A new brick home in north Silverton (about 2100 square feet) with a tax value of \$2,450.00 would be taxed \$9.30.

A nice frame house in the west part of Silverton (1300 square feet) is valued at \$1,110.00, and the hospital tax would amount to \$4.44.

A new brick home in south Silverton (2100 square feet plus double garage) is valued at \$2,395, and the hospital tax would be \$9.58.

The building, equipment and inventory of the Briscoe County News is valued at \$2,370 for county tax purposes, and would be assessed \$9.48 per year. (This does not include publisher's residence on which he also pays taxes.)

To determine your personal share of hospital tax, determine your county tax valuation from your 1963 tax receipt and multiply by 40c. (Don't confuse the county tax with the city and school taxes, which are higher.)

According to the Texas Almanac, in 1962 Texas took in \$94,686,951 in cigarette and tobacco products tax; with almost 10,000,000 people living in Texas, this averages a little more than \$9.47 for each man, woman and child. In Briscoe County, based on the 1960 population of 3,660, local residents contributed \$34,660.20 in tobacco taxes—much more than enough to finance a county hospital!

In 1962, Briscoe County spent \$124,596.52 for county expenses, including jury, jail, general fund (includes salaries), and county road maintenance (not including any paved roads.)

According to the Texas Almanac in 1960 there were 954 families living in Briscoe County. According to statistics, 75% of the people now carry hospitalization insurance. This would mean that about 716 families living in Briscoe County are insured at an average rate of \$200.00 per family (\$143,200.00), and have no place to use this hospitalization insurance.

Figure the cost of your trips to visit friends in out-of-county hospitals. Figure the cost of your trips to the hospital when you or a member of your family is sick; figure the cost of your meals and lodging while you are at the hospital with a relative. To figure your car expenses accurately, including the depreciation on the automobile, gas, oil, etc., you must figure 10c a mile. Are you really saving money by using an out-of-county hospital?

After the legislature gives us permission to have an election, the people will have to vote on the creation of a hospital district. However, the bonds will have to be approved so that application for the Hill-Burton funds can be made before May 31, 1964, to be eligible for fiscal year 1965 appropriations. A vote against the hospital issue may cost Briscoe County residents \$185,000, because after this year the funds may no longer be available for hospitals of the size that we need.

A total of 252 certified property-owning taxpayers signed the petition calling for the hospital bond election in two days last week. There will be a community meeting at the Quitaque school at 7:30 p.m. today (April 23). Everyone in the county is invited to attend. Among those present will be Swisher County Judge Jack Driskill, who served seven years on the Swisher County Hospital board before becoming the county judge.

Following are some questions and answers which may assist voters in making a decision on the hospital issue.

- Q. Will the doctor's office be in the hospital building?
A. No. Doctors with private practice cannot have offices in Hill-Burton aided hospitals.
Q. What doctors will be able to use the hospital?
A. Doctors eligible to use the hospital would be determined by the hospital district commissioners elected by the people.
Q. Will any doctor own a part of the hospital?
A. No. The hospital will be owned by the people of the hospital district just as the courthouse is owned by the people of the county.
Q. Will any doctor receive money from the hospital?
A. No. The hospital will be operated completely separate from any doctor's clinic.
Q. Will the proposed hospital be a county hospital?
A. No. It will be a hospital district hospital with the district boundaries the same as the boundaries of Briscoe County.
Q. What is the difference between a county hospital and a district hospital?
A. A county hospital would be maintained with county funds and supervised through the Commissioners' Court. A district hospital would be maintained with hospital district funds and supervised by hospital district commissioners elected by the people of the district.
Q. Will the county be responsible for the financial operation of the

- hospital?
A. No. By law the county cannot support a district hospital in any way.
Q. Will the Commissioners' Court continue to pay for charity patients?
A. No. By law a hospital district assumes the responsibility of the indigent (charity) patients.
Q. Where will the hospital district get its money?
A. A special hospital district tax is levied on the county valuation not to exceed 75c per \$100.00 valuation.
Q. Will a hospital district tax change my state, county or school taxes?
A. No. A hospital district tax will not affect other taxes.
Q. Who collects hospital district taxes?
A. By law the county tax collector assesses and collects the tax.
Q. Does a part of the hospital district tax go to the county or state?
A. No. All hospital district tax money goes to the hospital district.
Q. Will the hospital be built with Federal funds?
A. Yes. Hill-Burton funds match all other funds dollar for dollar, including private donations.
Q. What are Hill-Burton funds?
A. Hill-Burton funds are state administered federal funds used to build non-profit medical facilities.
Q. Will there be any Federal controls on the operations of the hospital.
A. No. Hill-Burton participates in a building and equipping program only, and has nothing to do with operation.
The ONLY times Hill-Burton re-enters the local picture are when the hospital needs to be enlarged or in the event the hospital is sold. If the hospital district sells the hospital to a private concern or individual, Hill-Burton demands their half of the proceeds. There would be no government control of the hospital—the hospital would be 100 per cent controlled by the elected commissioners of the hospital district.
Q. Does Hill-Burton help on hospital fixtures and equipment?
A. Yes. Hill-Burton participates on a 50-50 basis on the complete unit, including all fixtures, equipment, supplies and the medicine needed to open the hospital.
Q. Are Hill-Burton funds available for operation of the hospital?
A. No. Hill-Burton funds are for construction and equipping only.

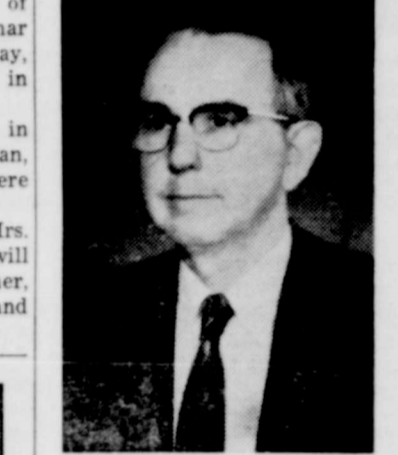

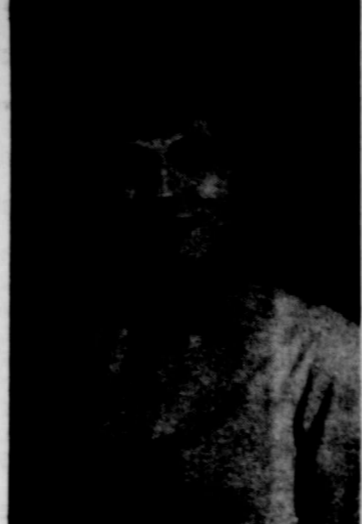



WHEREAS, a petition has been duly presented to the Commissioners' Court of Briscoe County, Texas, wherein the petitioners, alleging themselves to represent more than ten per cent (10%) of the resident qualified property tax-paying voters of Briscoe County, Texas, who have duly rendered their property for taxation, and praying this Court to order that an election be held in said County to determine whether or not bonds of said County shall be issued in the total principal sum of ONE HUNDRED EIGHTY FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$185,000) bearing interest at a rate not to exceed FOUR AND ONE-HALF PER CENTUM (4½%) per annum,

and to mature serially within any given number of years not to exceed TWENTY-FIVE (25) years from their date, for the purpose of establishing and equipping a county hospital to be located in or near the City of Silvertown, Texas, and for all necessary permanent improvements and buildings in connection therewith, pursuant to authority conferred by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Section 9, Article 8 of the Constitution, and Chapter 1, Title 22, and Chapter 5, Title 71, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended; and whether or not a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal thereof at maturity shall be levied on all taxable property within said County; and

WHEREAS, this Court, upon due advice and investigation, has ascertained and determined that said petition is signed by more than ten per cent (10%) of the resident qualified property tax-paying voters of Briscoe County, Texas, who have duly rendered their property for taxation, and that such petition should be granted, and that the election as prayed for in such petition should be ordered; therefore

BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF BRISCOE COUNTY, TEXAS:

That an election be held in said County on the 9th day of May, 1964, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified voters who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

"SHALL the Commissioners' Court of Briscoe County, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said County in the total principal sum of ONE HUNDRED EIGHTY FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$185,000) to mature serially within any given number of years not to exceed TWENTY FIVE (25) years from the date thereof, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed FOUR AND ONE HALF PER CENTUM (4½%) per annum, for the purpose of establishing and equipping a county hospital to be located in or near the City of Silvertown, Texas, and for all necessary permanent improvements and buildings in connection therewith, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and to create a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal thereof at maturity, pursuant to authority conferred by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Section 9, Article 8 of the Constitution, and Chapter 1, Title 22, and Chapter 5, Title 71, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended?"

## Mrs. Fred Mercer Shows Films of Africa

On Wednesday, April 15, Mrs. Fred Mercer showed the student body films of Africa she and her husband had made on their recent world tour which was organized by Cotton John.  
 She began by explaining that their trip consisted of thirty flights, most of which were by jet. There were 34 people who traveled with the group, which posed a problem when getting to the airports on time for each flight.  
 They had been able to converse with the people in Asia and the Orient because these people knew English well. When they visited Italy and Spain, however, they had great difficulty in trying to carry on a conversation with the people. Mrs. Mercer reported that the people didn't bother with you if you didn't speak their language. She asked the guide why the people didn't know English. He explained that it was because their seaports were not open to trade from all countries and because the people of Spain and Italy had not yet realized the importance of knowing other languages.  
 Mrs. Mercer described how the Boy Scouts in Thailand were selling articles to raise money for a trip to the World Jamboree. She also commented on how thrifty, clean and industrious the people of Portugal and Tokyo were.  
 She said that Africa, with its warm climate, was as beautiful as a garden and after having seen the film, one could see that it truly was. Some of the crops grown in Africa are corn, maize, wheat and sugar cane. The film showed that the people of Africa dress as Americans do except on religious holidays, during which they wear their native dress.  
 A custom of one of the African tribes of placing their dead in baskets set in trees was described. Later, Mrs. Mercer explained that after a dead man's body was placed in a basket and the buzzards had finished, his wife would come and take his bones home to bury them. If, however, a woman dies, her body is put in the basket and forgotten about. Their ways of living are, however, becoming more like Americans. They live off the land and raise some cattle. In this same tribe most of the men are seven feet tall and the women are usually six feet and over.  
 One African game preserve Mr. and Mrs. Mercer visited was one hundred twenty miles square. On the safari they saw in three days what would normally have taken seven days. They were on the move constantly.  
 When asked about the food they ate on the tour, she said that most of the food was like what she eats at home. She didn't care for the meat dishes in India but said that the fruit they ate on the tour was the best she had ever eaten.
