SILVERTON APPALOOSA OWNERS TAKE HONORS AT PLAINVIEW SHOW

Braving the blowing dust and sand, winners from 21 divisions and grand champions of halter and performance groups were named Sunday in the Seventh Annual Appaloosa Horse Show at Plainview.

The reserve champion gelding of the show was "Silverton," owned and showed by Steve Scott. The trophy was donated by Green Ma-

chinery of Plainview.

"Domino Rusty" shown by Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Fitzgerald took first place in the class for stallions foaled in 1963.

"Beau Quavo's Pepsi" shown by Steve Scott won first place among the 1962 stallions.

Steve Scott's "Silverton" took second place in the geldings division. "Dallas Doe" owned by Ray Hooper was the first place gelding and was the grand champion gelding of the show.

Voters Give Nod To Smith, Arnold, Cobb

Briscoe County voters went to the polls in record numbers Saturday to elect Vinson Smith as Sheriff. Incumbent Johnnie Lanham polled 562 votes as compared to 631 for Smith.

In Precinct 1, voters elected Orval Cobb to serve as their commissioner. Charles Gowin received

178 votes as compared with 187 for Cobb. There was no incumbent in this precinct due to the death earlier this year of Mort Hawkins. Mrs. Mort Hawkins was appointed to serve as county commissioner for the remainder of this year.

Incumbent A. D. Arnold retained his seat in the commissioner's court for another four years by defeating his opponent Roy Morris, 234-191. Arnold represents Precinct 3.

Joe Pool of Dallas received a majority of the Briscoe County votes in the race for U. S. Representative at Large over his opponent, Robert Baker of Houston. This trend carried over the state, and Pool was elected.

In the Republican Primary, Jack Cox received 9 and George Bush 7 Briscoe County votes for Senator. The Texas Republicans, however, gave Bush a lead of almost 20,000 votes.

Funeral Services Held For Bud Posey

Funeral services were conducted for Elbert (Bud) Posey on Saturday, June 6, at 3:00 p.m. in the First Methodist Church in Silverton. The Rev. H. Carl Nunn, pastor, Rev. Frank Story and Rev. C. R. Hankins, former pastors, officiated.

Mr. Posey died at 3:00 p.m. Thursday in the Plainview Hospital following surgery. He had lived northwest of Silverton since 1946, and was a farmer.

He was born April 6, 1896, in Stonewall County, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Posey.

He was married to Miss Lois Dennis at Aspermont on December 22, 1923.

A veteran of World War I, Mr. Posey served 13 months in France. He is survived by his wife, Lois, of the home; one daughter, Mrs. R. A. Edwards of Silverton; four brothers, Dave and Fant of Rotan, Bill of Abilene and Bun of Knippa; three sisters, Miss Mary Posey and Miss Louada Posey of Knippa, and Mrs. Raymond Dennis of Rotan; three grandchildren, Fred, Gary and Tommy Edwards of Silverton.

College Bound Grads Should Notify Board

The first official call directing the physical and mental examination of 18-year-old males by state draft boards is scheduled to be placed in the mail Wednesday, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said this morning.

The quota, effective in July, directs the examination of 1,816 Tex-

as 18-year-olds in that month. These youths will not be considered for armed forces service at this time, Colonel Schwartz pointed out. Normally, a man is not reached for draft induction until about age 22.

Instead, their examination is the result of President Johnson's action of January 5, announcing that he was ordering the Director of Selective Service and the Secretary of Defense to examine all newly-registered men who are out of school and otherwise available for service.

Men married at age 18 and those known to be continuing in school currently will not be examined under the program. Also, high school graduates whose draft files show they intend to enter college the

following semester will not be ordered for examination.

If a high school graduate plans to enter college this summer or fall, he should notify his draft board immediately.

The 18-year-olds who will be sent for examination in July and succeeding months, Colonel Schwartz said, "are those in class I-A, I-A-O, and I-O who became 18 years of age on or after January 1, 1964, the oldest first."

The examination of these 18-year-olds is a part of the President's actions on manpower conservation, generally referred to as the "war on poverty." The 18-year-olds who fail the mental examination in July and subsequent months will be referred by draft board letters to local offices of the Texas Employment Commission, where they will receive advice and counsel on jobs and preparation for jobs.

The youths who get these letters will be under no compulsion to visit the TE Offices, but may go if they feel the government's offer to help will benefit them.

CROP RESIDUE MANAGEMENT IMPORTANT IN SOIL CONSERVATION

Burning of wheat stubble (residues) will remove from \$5 to \$8 per acre from the farmer's pocket-book yearly in loss of plant food, depending upon his amount of residue produced. Research has shown that a 40-bushel wheat crop should yield approximately 5,000 pounds of air-dry residue. Plant food removed from the soil to produce the 5,000 pounds residue is approximately 33 pounds nitrogen, 8 1/2 pounds phosphorous, and 58 pounds of potash. It is a known fact that much of the potash is released in the burning of residues, yet much of it is swept away by wind and

water erosion brought about through the destruction of the residues. The most important management-type conservation practice in the High and Rolling Plains is proper management of crop residues. Most of the wheat land should have enough residue following harvest this year to protect the land from wind and serious water erosion until the following crop is planted. Most farmers have the equipment needed to work the land to maintain the residues on or near the soil surface. Residues left on or near the surface will break the force of the raindrops by providing a "cushion", thus preventing soil crusting and packing and therefore increasing moisture intake. Soil moisture evaporation will be reduced due to lower soil temperature in the summer; therefore, more moisture will be available for the next crop. Plowed-under residues are slow to decompose—much like ensilage. They "preserve" rather than "conserve." For "Land's Sake" leave the residue on or near the soil surface.

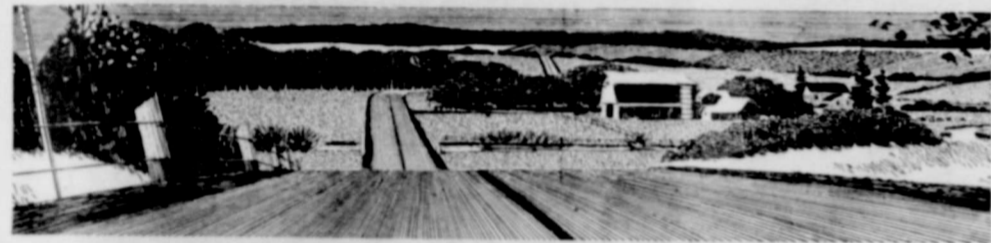

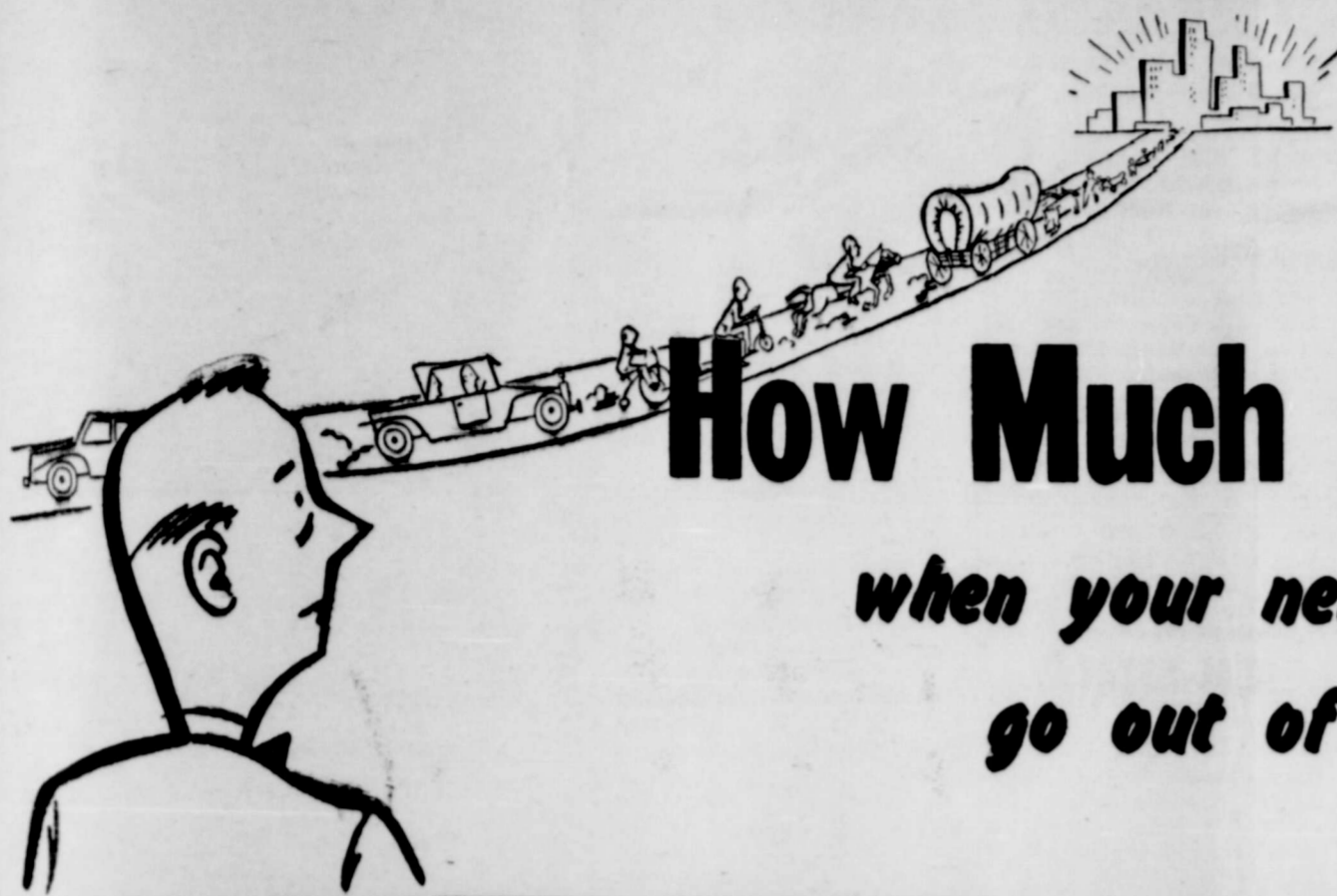

Slime Molds Do Little Damage

Slime molds often cause concern to many home gardeners. They occur suddenly in warm weather after heavy rains or prolonged periods of high humidity and may be found on lawn grasses, bedded flowers, mulches, ground cover, around the bases of trees and other plants, says Wendell Horne, plant pathologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Slime mold, explains Horne, is caused by a low form of fungus which lives on and obtains its food from decaying organic matter in the soil. This organic matter is usually an accumulation of grass clippings and leaf mulch. During favorable periods, the slime mold grows up onto the grass leaves or other garden plants, sporulates, and the result is a discoloration of the turf.

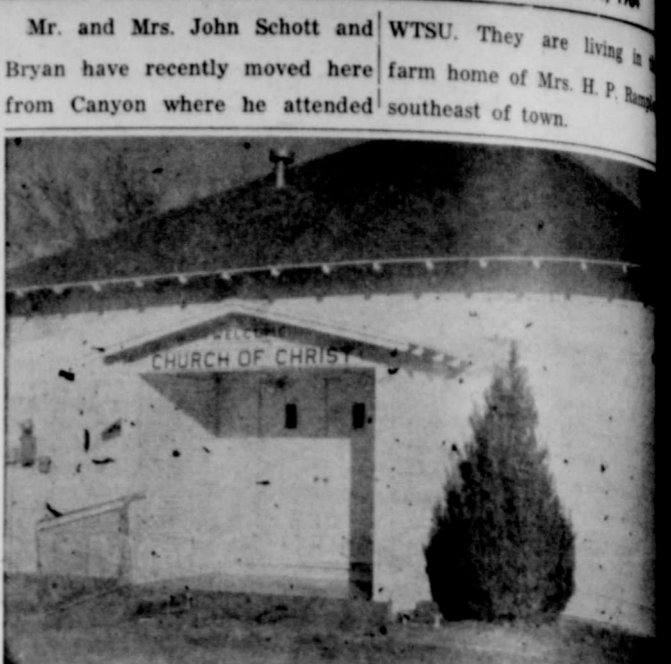
The discoloring is due to the spore-forming masses of the organism. At first, these masses are gray in color but later become black. At this stage, says Horne, the grass has the appearance of having been dusted with soot or carbon-black. Some molds, he adds, appear as thin, white, yellow or gray layers of slimy paste-like material that covers the grass blades. These masses later dry to form a bluish-gray, black or white powdery growths on the leaves.

Horne points out that the slime molds are nonparasitic and technically do not cause disease. They use the plant leaves and stems as a means of support for their reproductive structures.

The specialist says slime molds can be removed from the turf or other plants by washing with a stream of water from a hose under pressure. Slight damage to the affected plants may occur when the leaves are smothered or shaded for several days by the slime, says Horne. The hissing-off process is usually sufficient to prevent damage, he says.
