Miss Masako Nakabe, who lived with Mr. and Mrs. Carman G. Rhode in Silvertown during the past school term, boarded a Japan Air Lines jetliner in San Francisco Wednesday for her return flight to Japan.

The flight was arranged by the American Field Service for 134 Japanese high school students whom the AFS selected to live for 10 months in the homes of American families while attending local high schools. The group arrived in the United States on August 24, 1963.

Scholarships for foreign students to visit the U. S. are arranged each year by the AFS, a private non-profit educational organization which promotes international good will.

AFS has selection boards in 60 countries and also arranges for American high school students to live abroad.

Each student is selected because of scholastic, psychological, physical and language abilities.

AFS officials desire that the 2,814 students visiting in the U. S. during 1964 will impart their native cultures to local communities and return home with true impressions of American cultures.

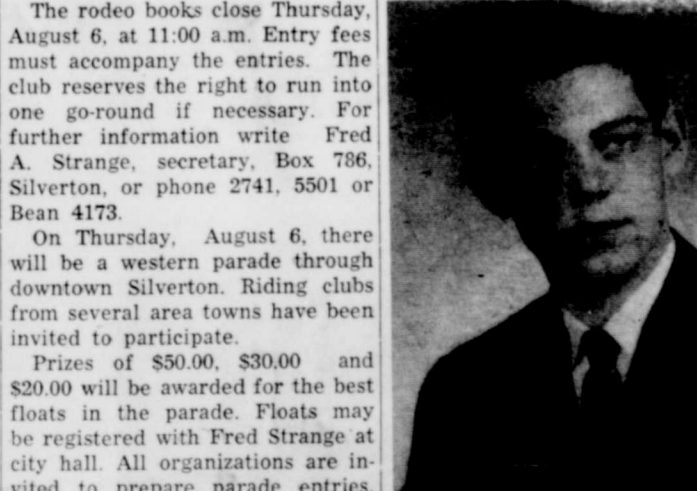

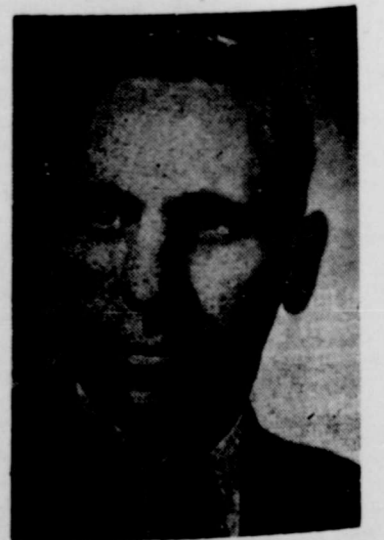

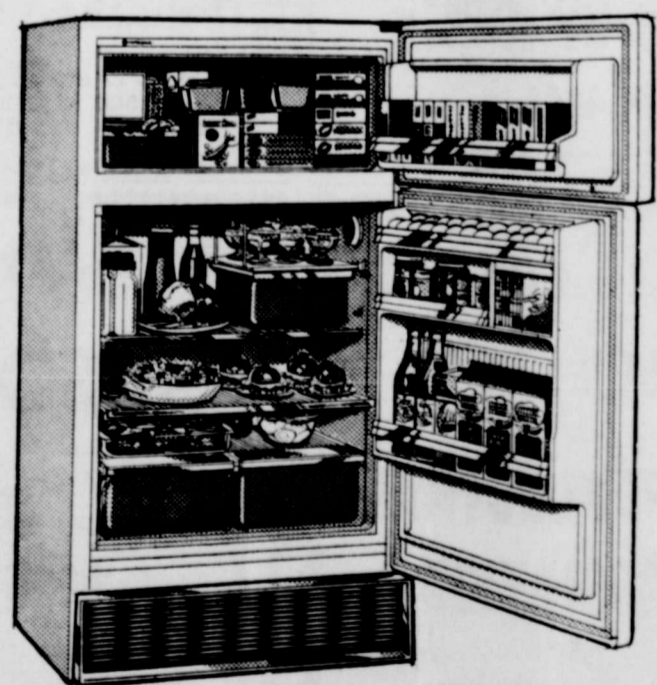
