PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10 proposing an Amendment to Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Subsection to be known as 51a-2; giving the Legislature the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such medical payments; providing that the amounts paid out of state funds shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds for such purposes; providing that certain means relating to the correction or remedying of abnormalities of vision shall be included within such medical care service or assistance; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection to be known as Subsection 51a-2, which shall read as follows:

"Subsection 51a-2. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Laws and to make payment for same, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for

needed medical services. The payments for such medical assistance on behalf of such needy individuals shall be in such amounts as provided by the Legislature; provided, however, that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds for such purposes; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States, such financial aid in the form of medical assistance on behalf of the needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services, as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age and over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such medical assistance; and pro-

viding that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age and over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such medical assistance; and providing that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows:

"(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker

of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a particular conservation and reclamation district if such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

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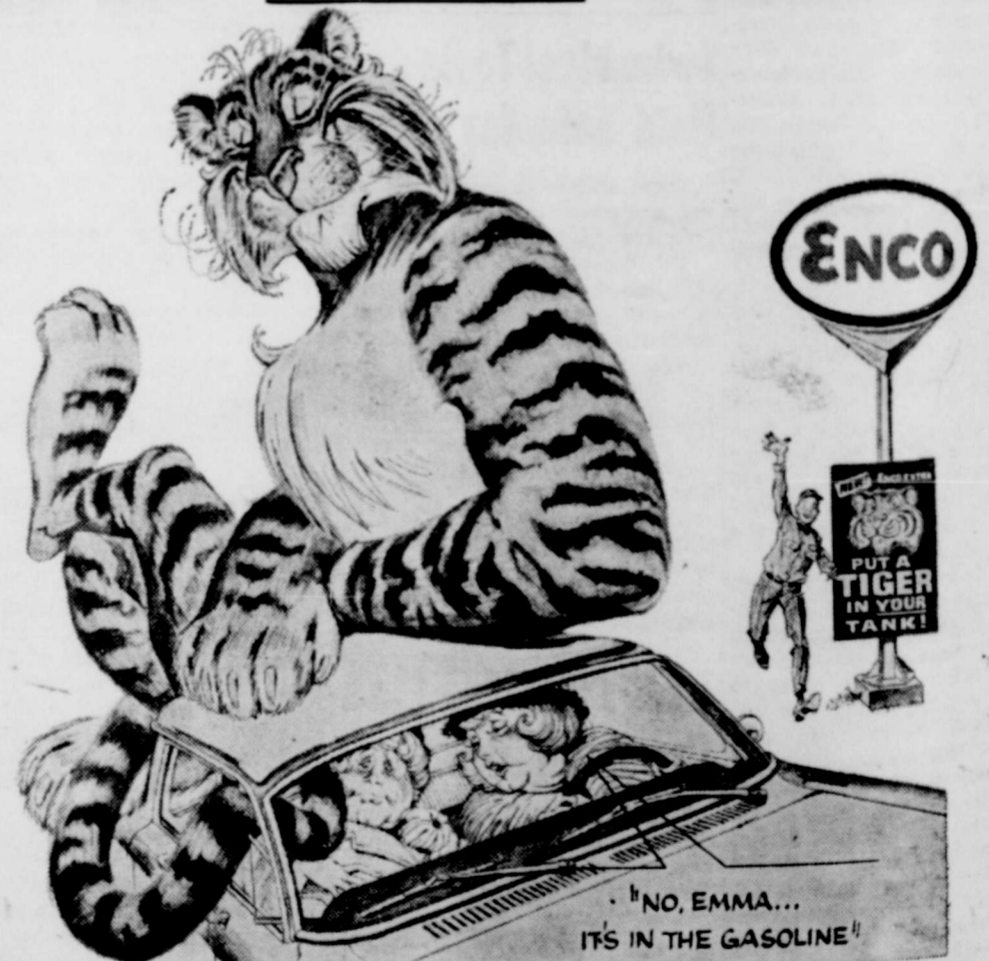

Wheat Certificate Plan Described

Additional provisions have been announced concerning the 1964 Wheat Program, particularly as it concerns processors. The new program which went into effect July 1 is designed to bolster the na-

tional income from wheat and at the same time maintain the cost of wheat used for food at about the same level consistent with recent years.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced details on how and when processors acquire marketing certificates, methods of reporting the amount of wheat used for food products, and the dura-



FARM NOTES

Reports of processing are due not later than 15 days after the close of each reporting period. Processors have the option of reporting under one of three reporting periods: by the calendar month; a combination of four-and-five-week periods; or each four weeks. These reports to be on a plant-by-plant basis, unless previous approval has been obtained to combine two or more plants in one report.

Processors may report the wheat they use for food products by weight, or by using a conversion factor. The program requires domestic marketing certificates, valued at 70¢ per bushel, equal to the amount of wheat processed into food products.

If processors wish to buy and pay for certificates after processing, it is necessary to fill out and submit to the Kansas City Commodity Office a Food Processor Certificate undertaking. This is Form CCC-147. This is an agreement that the processor will acquire from and surrender to CCC domestic marketing certificates for his production.

Wheat used in non-food products is not subject to domestic marketing certificates. However, wheat processed into flour, regardless of its end use, is subject to domestic marketing certificates. Wheat used in flour that might be exported is subject to domestic marketing certificates.

Operating procedures announced by USDA are printed in the Federal Register. Copies of the procedure have been mailed to the trade. Additional copies and other information are available from the Procurement and Sales Division, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250.

Boll Weevil Threat Is Increasing

Light boll weevil infestations exist in at least two areas above the Caprock.

During the last ten days punctured squares have been found above the Caprock in Dickens County about 14 miles east of Crosbyton and also approximately seven miles south of Crosbyton in Crosby County. It is likely other infestations may show up soon, says Leon Grosdidier, Briscoe County Agent.

These light weevil populations now appearing above the Caprock should be controlled at once in order to prevent a buildup and spread of the weevils. Most of the early populations above the Caprock are confined to small areas and can be controlled without spraying the entire field.

Light boll weevil populations are present in Garza, Wilbarger, Jones, Fisher, Nolan, Motley and Dickens counties below the Caprock. Punctured square counts are increasing in these counties. Producers below the Caprock should begin weevil control programs when the punctured square count reaches 10-15%. More difficulty and expense will be encountered if populations are allowed to build-up to high levels before control is started.

In order to avoid the heavy populations and late season migration which occurred last year, good control measures must be carried out above and below the Caprock. The success of the diapause control program this fall may depend on how well boll weevil infestations are contained during the season, says Grosdidier.

Bermuda mites are starting their destructive invasion of bermuda grass lawns. In past years, these tiny, eight-legged pests have caused lawns considerable damage, reports County Agent Leon Grosdidier.

Infested lawns take on an unhealthy appearance and make slow growth. Stunted internodes are a noticeable symptom of injury. Individual mites are difficult to see without magnification, the agent points out.

Spraying with Diazinon, Ethion or Trithion will provide control. Two applications 10-14 days apart may be necessary for effective control. Use five gallons of spray mixture per 1,000 square feet of lawn area. Grosdidier says 1 1/2 to 2 ounces of the above chemicals should be added to five gallons of water.

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Grain Sorghum Irrigation Time Here

It's grain sorghum watering time. Some grain sorghum is already showing signs of moisture stress and should be watered immediately.

Extension Agronomist Bill Gunter says grain sorghum uses very little water up to the seven-leaf stage. However, some grain sorghum is past this stage. He also stresses grain sorghum requires the most water at boot and bloom stage. No benefit is gained from irrigation when grain is past the soft dough stage.

Gunter says grain sorghum at the seven-leaf stage uses about one-tenth inch water daily. From this stage through blooming, water use rises rapidly. At booting stage, the crop is using over four-tenths inches water daily. Water use drops sharply after blooming is completed.

Water stress at any time during the growing season through soft dough stage will reduce yields. Examine soil for moisture conditions often, says Gunter. Keep moisture at least to the 50% available moisture level, especially during boot and bloom stages. Most plant roots are in the top two feet so this area must have the moisture replenished.

Water stress at the boot stage can easily cut production 25%. Stress at bloom stage can cut yields as much as 50%. But, Gunter warns, excessive moisture after soft dough stage delays harvest and causes tillering or suckering, which complicates harvest and lowers quality.

Plain soils will hold from one to 2.5 inches of moisture per foot of depth, depending on soil types. The more clay and organic matter

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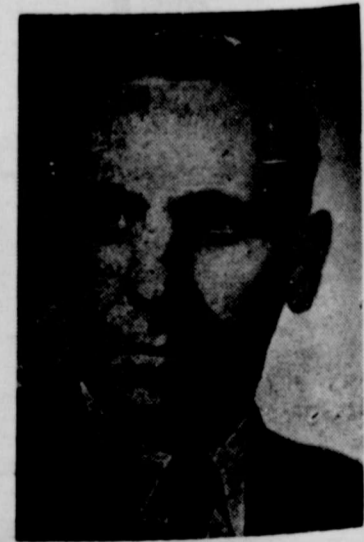

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
