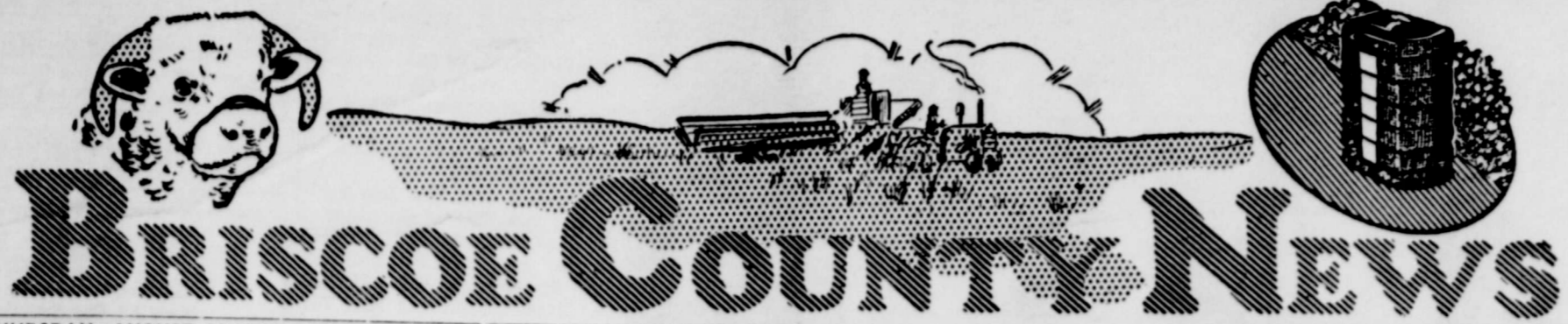

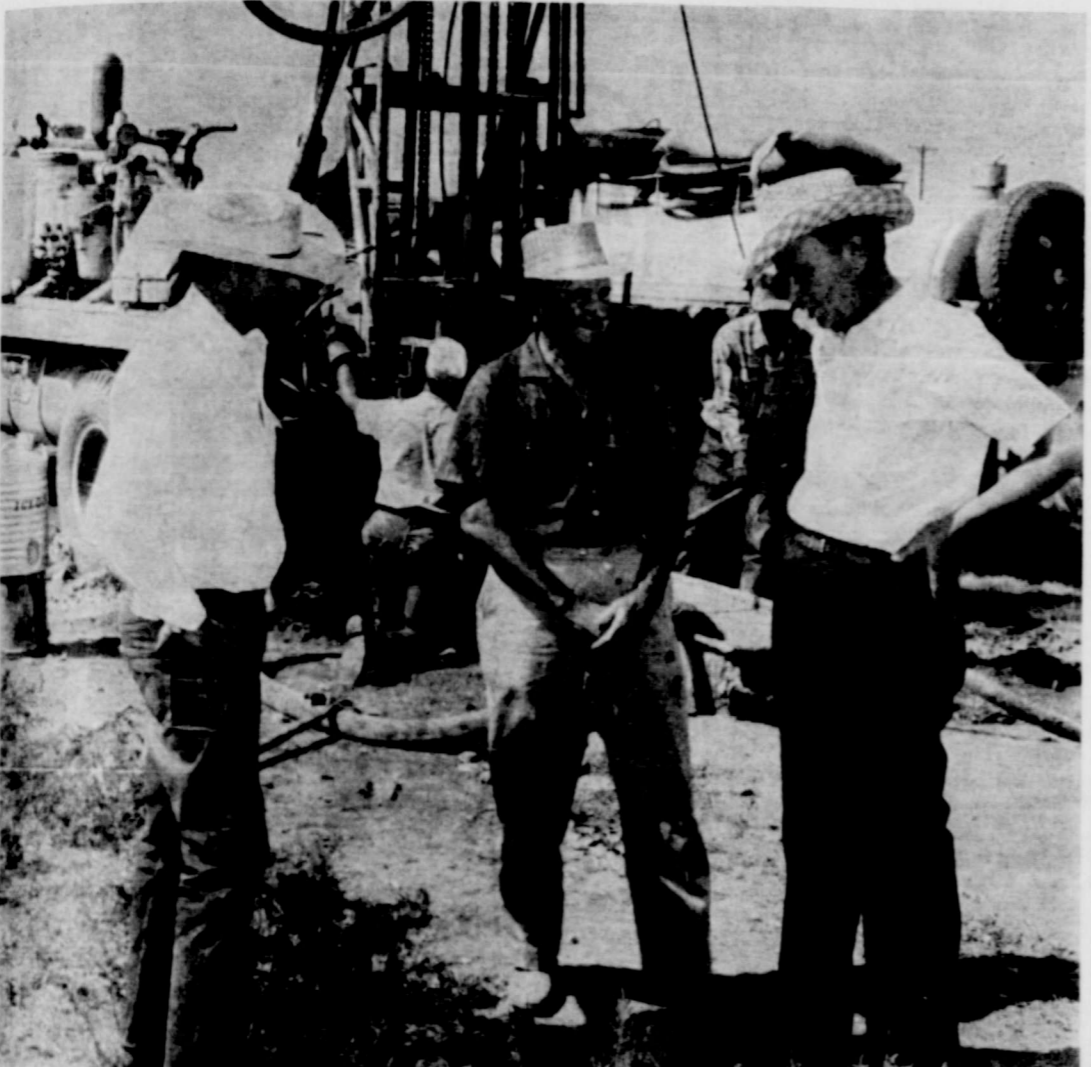

Silverton Schools To Open On August 31

The Silverton Schools will open for the 1964-1965 term on Monday, August 31, according to an announcement by Superintendent J. S. Hinds.

Freshmen will register from 9:00 until 11:00 a.m. Thursday, August 27; Sophomores will register from 1:00 until 3:00 p.m. Thursday, August 27; Juniors will register from 9:00 until 11:00 a.m. Friday, August 28; Seniors will register from 1:00 until 3:00 p.m. Friday, August 28.

Silverton High School will be integrated this fall, and colored children will ride the buses with the white and Latin American children. Beginning with the 1965-1966 school term, grades one through twelve will be integrated and the Carver Elementary School will be closed.

All students who have not already registered and who have not previously attended the Silverton Schools are to enroll on Friday, August 28. All others in grades one through eight will register Monday morning, August 31. Regular classes will begin on Monday, August 31, and lunch will be served in the new cafeteria.

A student must be six years of age before September 1, 1964, in order to enter school this fall. There will be no general assembly this year because the student body is getting too large to be seated in the school auditorium.

Baggary To Speak In Quitaque Auditorium

H. M. Baggary, publisher of the *Tulia Herald*, will be guest speaker for a meeting of the Briscoe County League of Democratic Women, according to an announcement made today by Mrs. W. E. Schott, jr., of Silverton, League president.

The meeting will be held at 8:00 p.m. Thursday, August 20, in the Quitaque High School auditorium. The public is invited to attend along with members of the League of Democratic Women and their husbands.

Baggary, whose editorial columns consistently win top area, state and national awards, attended West Texas State University, the University of Missouri, Harvard University, holds B.A. and M.A. degrees, and has done additional graduate work. Before becoming active in the field of newspaper publishing, he was a business teacher in the *Tulia* school system.

He was a Naval lieutenant during World War II and served as an aide to Admiral Chester W. Nimitz. He participated in an NBC panel during the Little Rock crisis and in 1960 travelled with President Lyndon Johnson as a member of his staff.

In addition to writing several columns and the news stories for the *Tulia Herald*, he has weekly commentaries on radio stations in Texas and New Mexico, including KIXZ, Amarillo; KPND, Pampa; KHUZ, Borger; KTUE, *Tulia*; KBIM, Roswell; KENM, Portales; KSPV, Artesia; KHSU, Abilene; and KLMX, Clayton.

Baggary, a dedicated Democrat, travelled to New York recently to receive a National Editorial Association award. While on the trip he conducted a poll of the Republicans with whom he came in contact—cab drivers, the man on the street, fellow newspapermen. Some had been Republicans all their lives and some had been delegates to national conventions in past years. The trip was made before the 1964 Republican National Convention, but he was able to receive first-hand information from the "grassroots" voters in the East regarding the Goldwater nomination.

All residents of this area, regardless of their political party affiliation, are invited to hear Mr. Baggary in Quitaque on August 20. There will be no admission charged, and refreshments will be served.

Permit Signing For Boll Weevil Pushed

"Permits to spray, signed by every farmer with cotton in these seven counties, is a must if the Boll Weevil Control Program is to get underway on schedule." Bill Gunter, Area Extension Agronomist who is serving as Extension coordinator for the program, continued by saying the seven counties where permits must be signed are Motley, Briscoe, Floyd, Dickens, Crosby, Kent and Garza.

For those farmers who haven't attended a permit signing meeting in their county, several places have been designated where permits can be obtained and signed. These include the local county agricultural agents office and the county ASCS office. In addition, permits can be obtained from the county and community chairmen of the Area-wide Boll Weevil Control Program Committee.

Thornton, Sunray minister, and Richard Williams, Big Spring minister, both of whom are former ministers of the Silverton Church of Christ, officiated.

Pallbearers were J. L. Self, Don Burson, Obra Watson, Onar Cornett, J. D. McGavock, and O. C. Rampley. Burial was in the Silverton Cemetery with arrangements under the direction of Roberts Funeral Home.

Mrs. Anderson died at 2:10 a.m. Sunday in Swisher County Hospital where she had been a patient for four weeks. She had been a resident of Silverton for 71 years. Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Ruby Elliston and Miss Anna Lee Anderson, both of Silverton; two sons, T. H. Anderson of San Antonio and C. W. Anderson of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; three sisters, Mrs. Emma Waller of Kress, Mrs. Linnie Campbell of Hereford and Mrs. Carrie Arthur of Mariocopa, California; five grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Anderson was born Elizabeth Ann Cooper, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. L. H. Cooper, on February 28, 1876. She came to Briscoe County in 1893 from Thorp Spring, Texas.

On December 10, 1893, Miss Cooper married T. L. Anderson in a double wedding ceremony at *Tulia*. The other couple was Elmer Ayers and Willie Waller.

Mr. Anderson had been one of the organizers of Briscoe County. He carried the chain for the man who surveyed the county.

In 1891 Mr. Anderson had been elected a trustee of the Townsite Company which was organizing the City of Silverton. Mr. Anderson drove the cedar pins at the corner of each block in July of that year when the town was surveyed. Soon after the company sent proof that twenty houses were being built and received a patent for the town.

Briscoe County was then attached to Donley County, and Mr. Anderson and a group of other pioneers petitioned the Commissioners Court of Donley County for an election for the purpose of organizing Briscoe County; for the purpose of choosing a county seat; and for the purpose of electing officers. The towns of Silverton and Linguish were in the running for county seat, and the election was held March 15, 1892. Silverton won by a good majority and the first officers were elected, including T. L. Anderson as the County Clerk.

Mr. Anderson was Briscoe County Sheriff for almost seven years, and was elected Sheriff. After term as Sheriff the Anderson family moved to Quitaque in July, 1904. Mr. Anderson put in a general merchandise store there. In 1907 he traded part of his business for a half interest in the land on which the City of Quitaque is built. They hired a surveyor, had it plotted and sold lots. While living at Quitaque, Mr. Anderson was again elected County Clerk in 1908. They moved back to Silverton in October, and Mr. Anderson served as Clerk more than 18 years before retiring in January, 1927.

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT**

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10 proposing an Amendment to Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Subsection to be known as 51a-2; giving the Legislature the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such medical payments; providing that the amounts paid out of state funds shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds for such purposes; providing that certain means relating to the correction or remedying of abnormalities of vision shall be included within such medical care service or assistance; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection to be known as Subsection 51a-2, which shall read as follows:

"Subsection 51a-2. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Laws and to make payment for same, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for

needed medical services. The payments for such medical assistance on behalf of such needy individuals shall be in such amounts as provided by the Legislature; provided, however, that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds for such purposes; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States, such financial aid in the form of medical assistance on behalf of the needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services, as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age and over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such medical assistance; and pro-

viding that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age and over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such medical assistance; and providing that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows:

"(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district if such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

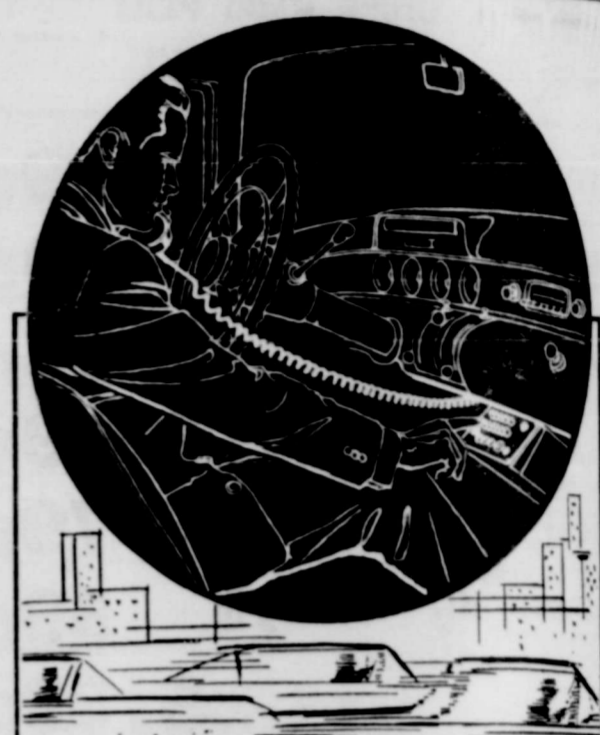
