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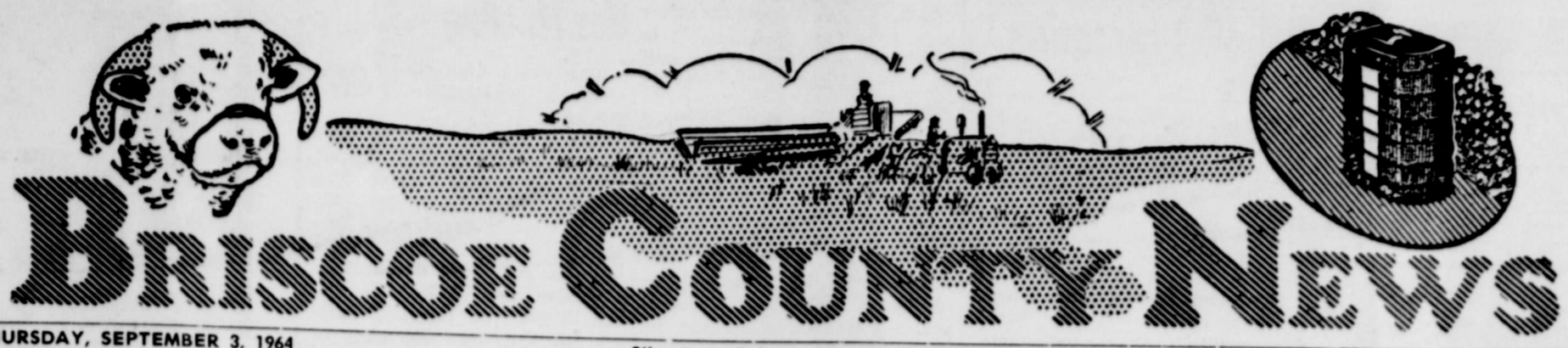
All Around the Town

I'd like to share the following letter I received from Ben Ezzell this week:
 Dear Mary Ann,
 I have often been referred to as "a Republican editor" in recent years, and I have rarely bothered to deny it, partly because the label has usually been applied in the context of "Ben Ezzell is a Republican, but..." to add a little weight to something appreciative I've said about the Democratic Party or Democratic candidates; and partly because I don't consider "Republican" a dirty word and don't consider it any major insult to be called one.
 But this year I'm not so sure. If being called "a Republican" puts me in a class with Barry Goldwater and his crew of John Birch supporters, I do resent it. However, there are a lot of honest-to-be Republicans who are in the same boat, so I shouldn't complain. Anyway, I'm not planning to sue anybody.
 I am, however, by tradition, by inclination, and by philosophy a Democrat... or at least a fellow-traveler with Democrats political-ly... and with a few notable exceptions, I have voted in Democratic party primaries and for Democratic party nominees for all my adult life. However, as an editor I make a sincere effort to be non-partisan, and I expect to continue to do so... an approach which is bound to have me in the bad grades, at one time or another, with both Democrats and Republicans, and so be it. I have friends in both camps, and I don't think my political aberrations have cost me any friendships in either which were of any merit.
 But I am also ardently pro-American... which compels me to be ardently anti-John Birch as well as ardently anti-Communist... and anti-Ku Klux and anti-White Citizens Councils... and anti-every other organization which seeks to run down my country and its government and to destroy either.
 I wouldn't object to your labeling me a Republican, except that I think that unfortunate party has enough troubles on its hands with Barry Goldwater without being afflicted with me as well... and I've sure got enough troubles without being afflicted with Barry, even by association.

Planning Session Held By Briscoe County G.S.P.A.

The Briscoe County Grain Sorghum Producers Association met Wednesday morning, August 26, at the "66" Restaurant for a planning session concerning this fall's harvest.
 Nolan Chandler, G.S.P.A. executive assistant, was present at the meeting along with area elevator operators and county officials.
 Matters discussed included collection of dues this fall, exports of grain to foreign countries and legislation affecting growing and marketing of grain sorghums. It was decided by elevator operators and county officials to go ahead with a program of collections as has been used in the past. Each grain sorghum farmer will be asked to give two pounds per thousand pounds of grain harvested to the Grain Sorghum Producers Association. Funds collected are used by G.S.P.A. to promote marketing of milo to domestic and foreign consumption, in the field of research and matters of legislation concerning grain sorghum.
 To get a better idea of just what the two pounds per 1,000 pounds dues amounts to, you can roughly figure that for each truckload delivered to the elevator the dues will amount to only 42c. This small investment on the part of sorghum producers has returned manifold benefits through research and market development programs.

ASC Community Committee Election Deadline Nears

Generally, a farm owner, tenant, or sharecropper is eligible to vote if he is taking part or is eligible to take part in one or more of the programs administered by the ASC committees.

Envelopes containing marked ballots may be mailed or returned to the ASCS County Office anytime before September 8. Ballots will be tabulated publicly by the county committee on September 9, 1964, at the ASCS County Office.

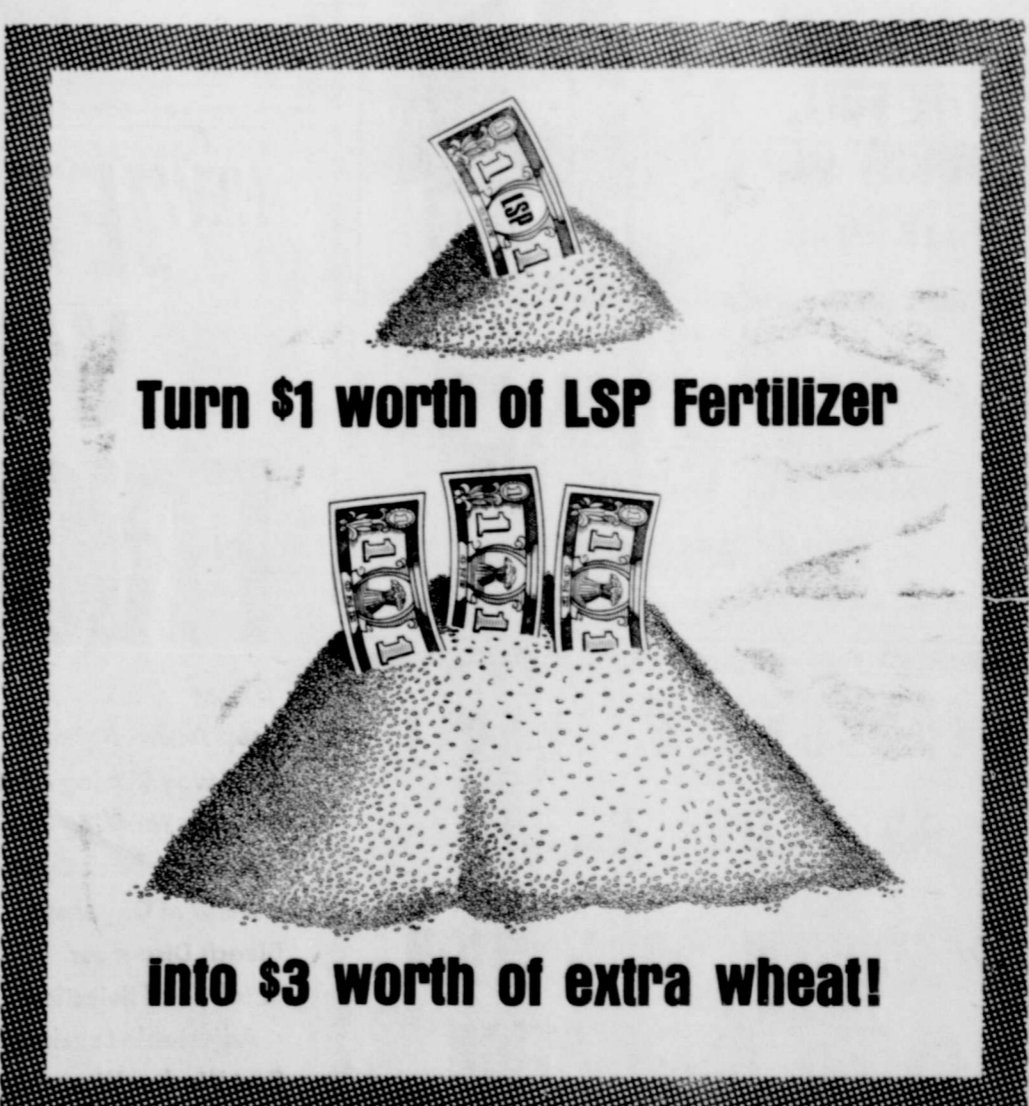
