Thirteen Sheep Killed During Season

Thirteen aoudad sheep were killed by trophy-conscious hunters in the Panhandle during the December 11-13 season, the Parks and Wildlife Department reports.

Wildlife workers reported two of the 13 barbary sheep harvested were in the 270 pound class.

The three-day hunt was the second ever held in Texas.

In the late 1950's, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department purchased 44 barbary sheep from a rancher in New Mexico and released them in the Palo Duro and Tule canyons. Until last year these sheep were permitted to reproduce and become firmly established in their new surroundings.

Forty-two hunting permits were distributed in 1963 among canyon landowners and nine sheep were harvested. This year 50 permits were distributed and six males and seven females were bagged.

Current estimate of the total number of the rare sheep now present in the canyons is between 400 and 600 head.

USDA Announces '65 Feed Grain Program

USDA announced major provisions of voluntary 1965 Feed Grain Program including decision to keep total price-support levels for cooperators the same as for 1964.

Changes within total price support rate were made to encourage greater participation in the program depends on level of participation sufficiently high to offset program costs by reduction in public investment in government feed grain inventories.

For 1965 program, a larger proportion of price support will be in payment form with some reduction in average loan rate for all three feed grains.

Department officials said 1965 program designed to maintain participants' incomes at least as high as current levels. They also stressed that program will help maintain overall feed grain income for producers at near current levels, or

about one billion dollars a year higher than with previous feed grain programs.

The greater reduction in the grain sorghum loan rate, which is offset by a higher payment rate, is needed to bring grain sorghum price-support loan values more in line with market prices of recent years.

Program participants, since they help cut government costs by diverting acreage to conserving use and thus reducing production, not only can get price support loan and purchases, but also price support payments, and acreage diversion payments.

Since yields have trended upward in recent years, moving five-year average (1959-63) being used for first time in 1965 generally will mean higher price support payments for normal production in major producing areas. This payment of 20 cents per bushel in case of corn and related payments for other feed crops will be paid on acreage seeded for harvest within permitted acreage, even though drought, or other adverse crop conditions seriously reduce production on any farm.

To participate in program, producers need to reduce their total acreage of corn, grain sorghum and barley in 1965 by at least 20 percent.

Diversion payments, if less than 40 percent of base is diverted, will be county support rate at one-fifth of normal production for first 20 percent diversion, and on one-half of normal for remaining percentage.

Payments in kind for diversion and price support payments again will be made in form of negotiable certificates with which producer may receive grain from CCC stocks or cash at county ASCS office if he wishes assistance of Commodity Credit Corporation in marketing certificates. As previously, major part of price support will be provided through loans.

Signup for feed grains and for spring wheat will be from February 8 through March 26. During the signup period, winter wheat producers who signed up in wheat program last fall may change their intentions.

For 1965 program, a larger proportion of price support will be in payment form with some reduction in average loan rate for all three feed grains.

Acreage substitution feature for wheat and feed grain acreage which is new to program for 1965 gives producers more flexible range of cropping opportunities and income possibilities.

Participation in both wheat and feed grain programs will bring more returns than non-participation, USDA officials said.

Public Service Company Outlines Future Plans

Southwestern Public Service Company's 1965 construction and improvement program calls for an investment of \$24,607,000 in new facilities, it has been announced by A. R. Watson, president and general manager of the electric company.

The company's construction plans for 1965 anticipate the second largest annual improvement program in the company's history, topped only by 1964's record investment of more than \$30,000,000. At the conclusion of the 1965 program, the electric company will have invested nearly \$120,000,000 in new equipment in the 1961-65 period.

"One year ago, when we announced a record single year construction budget, our forecast was for continued growth throughout our 45,000 square mile service area. Our optimistic outlook remains unchanged, as evidenced by the continued high level of new equipment investment we plan for 1965 and the years to follow. Inasmuch as we must begin our planning and construction to meet our customer's needs from three to five years in advance of their actual requirements, it is apparent that

we anticipate continued economic expansion in our service area," Watson said.

A major portion of the electric company's 1965 construction budget will go for additions to its interconnected generation and transmission system, which includes 11 base-load electric generating stations which are linked together by a 4,000 mile network of high voltage transmission lines.

The additions to the generating capability include a 210,000 kilowatt unit to be installed at Cunningham Station, west of Hobbs, New Mexico. The Cunningham addition will be the second 210,000 kilowatt machine to go into service within the period of a year. Plant X, near Earth, houses the first of these giant generators, the largest single unit in service on the company's system.

The other generating additions to be completed in 1965 are gas turbine units to be installed at Borger and Pampa. These units will be located at industrial plants in each case, with the fuel to be provided by the customer.

At the Borger location, where natural gas will be purchased from the customer for fuel, the exhaust

gases will be returned to the customer for use in his plant.

At Pampa, hot pressurized gases which are a by-product of the customer's manufacturing process will serve as the fuel for the new turbine.

"These 'tailored' installations of generating equipment are indicative of our responsibility to conserve the natural resources of the area we serve. In each case, there will be total utilization of the heat energy present in the gases, and all waste will be eliminated.

"This, of course, introduces economies for us as well as the customer, and is the type of program we must carry on to keep the customer's price down by keeping our type of planning goes to all of our customers," Watson said.

The year 1965 will see a continuation of a program started last year to convert the main arteries of the company's transmission network to 230,000 volt lines. The major voltage was 115,000 volts until this year.

Scheduled for completion this year are 230,000 volt lines running from Plant X to Cunningham Station and from Plant X to Nichols

Station, northeast of Amarillo.

The 230,000 volt lines have four times the carrying capacity of the 115,000 volt circuits and their increased transmission capability ties in with the larger, more efficient generating units such as the two new 210,000 kilowatt machines to both improve service and keep it economical.

A 115,000 volt line is being constructed from Amarillo to Borger to provide the electric power for pumping the water through the aqueduct system associated with the Canadian River Dam.

Load growth in the Hereford-Dimmitt area will bring the construction of another 115,000 volt circuit from Plant X to Hereford. This will "firm up" for many years the power supply in this growing region.

"There is great satisfaction in being able to say to our customers once again as a new year starts that their electric service dollar is buying more than ever before. Three things make this record possible. First of all are the customers themselves, who are using more electric power than ever before. They make it possible for de-

icated employees working with the most modern and efficient

equipment to keep down the price of our service in the face of rising costs for fuel, equipment and labor," Watson concluded.

SIX FLAGS CLOSES FOR SEASON BUT WORK GOES ON



Six year old Rhett Davis of Dallas arrived at Six Flags Over Texas just a little too late as "Indian maiden" Sharon Fulmer sadly explains that the popular tourist park, located midway between Dallas and Fort Worth, has closed for the season. It will be open again April 16, 1965.

Six Flags Over Texas closed out its 1964 season today. The stagecoach made its last run, the fires on the old narrow-gauge steam engine were banked, the cannons are now silent on the Spanish Fort guarding the river against French explorers.

For all intents and purposes Six Flags Over Texas is closed for another year. But behind the locked gates of the 115-acre historical theme park, a monumental job awaits a corps of engineers, landscape architects, painters, carpenters, artists, electricians and designers.

The long winter months are just too short as far as these dedicated men are concerned for they are charged with presenting to the public a fresh and beautiful park with bold new adventures and plenty of exciting entertainment for the 1965 season which begins next April 16.

1964 stands out as the third consecutive year that Six Flags racked up a new attendance

record. Over 1,613,000 people from every state in the Union visited the park. This compares with 1,436,000 in 1963; 1,272,000 in 1962 and 564,000 in 1961.

Perhaps the saddest group of individuals who witnessed Six Flags seasonal closing were the 1,400 college hosts and hostesses who operated all the rides, played all the roles and gave a unique atmosphere of enthusiasm, charm and wholesomeness for the popular tourist attraction located midway between Dallas and Fort Worth.

There's a little matter of nearly \$2,000,000 which is earned by these young men and women each season, and that money goes a long way towards furthering their college educations.

The Six Flags personnel office reported it had already received over 500 applications for host and hostess jobs next year and expects 20,000 more before the 1965 season rolls around just four months from now.

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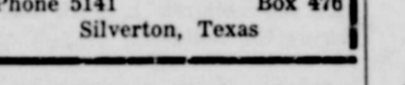
