Born September 1, 1874, in Leeds, England, she lived in Silverton when her husband was pastor of the Presbyterian Church here in the late 1930's. Mrs. Thorns is remembered as a moving spirit behind some of the Silverton Cemetery improvements, including the arch at the entrance of the cemetery.

When her husband died in the late 1950's, Mrs. Thorns moved to Iowa.

Survivors, beside the son, include a daughter, Mrs. Olive Powell, of Texas.

The funeral was at 3:00 p.m. May 5 at the United Presbyterian Church in Sylvan Grove, and burial was in the Sylvan Grove cemetery.

Farmers Union Hears Washington Report

Briscoe County Farmers Union met in the Production Credit community room on May 4 at 7:30 p.m., with a large crowd on hand to hear Beryl Long report on his recent trip to Washington D. C. as a delegate of the Farmers Union.

Long, along with other delegates from surrounding counties, met with the House Committee on Agriculture to discuss a farm program on wheat and grain sorghum. This committee was made up of several Congressmen, including Walter Rogers, Purcell, Ellender, Poage and others.

The local delegate took with him several letters from businessmen which explained the downward trend in business due to the slump in farm prices. He also had a letter drafted by Louie Kitchens, ASC County Committeeman, explaining the general farming conditions in this county and the high percentage that participated in the last wheat, cotton and grain sorghums program, and recommending a simplification of all farm programs. The letter was read with great interest and the committee was so impressed with it that it was read into the Congressional Record.

Farmers Union members were well pleased with Long's report. Another delegate will go to Wash-

ington from this county, with delegates from cotton-growing counties in the state, to push for a better cotton program. This is expected in June.

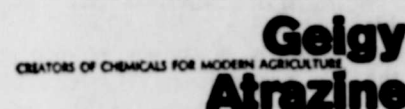

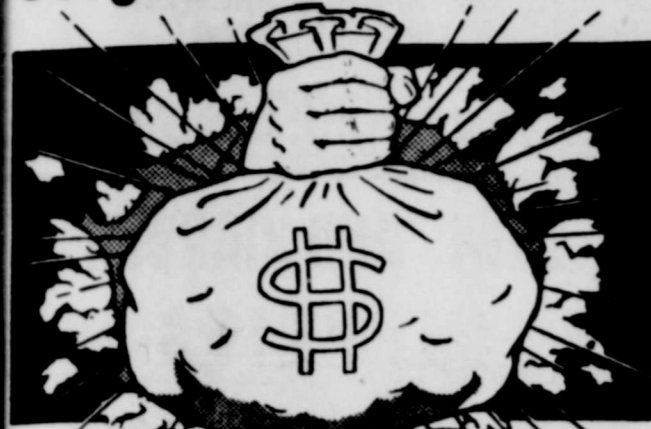

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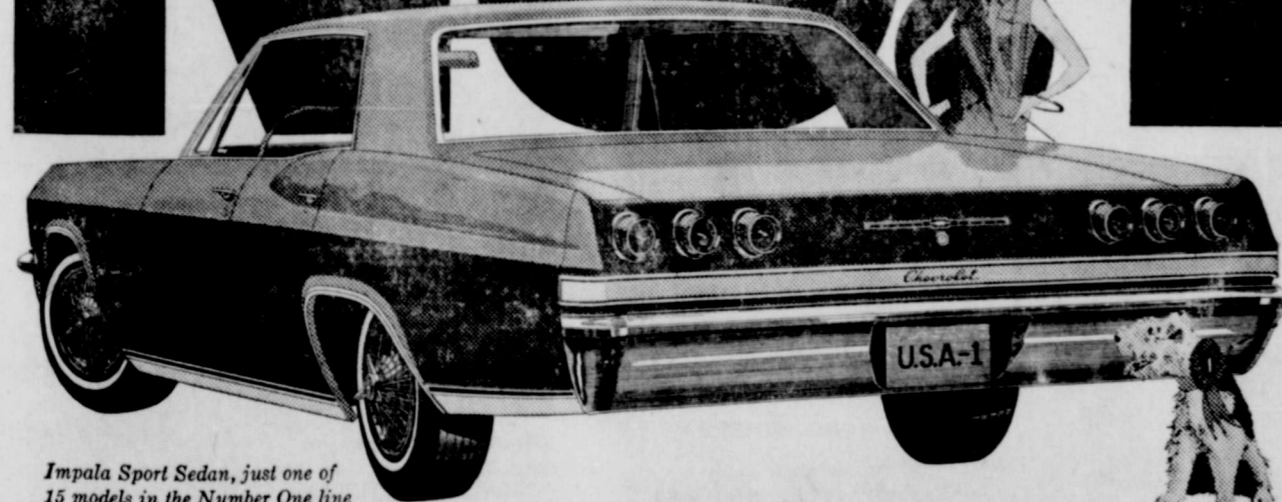
