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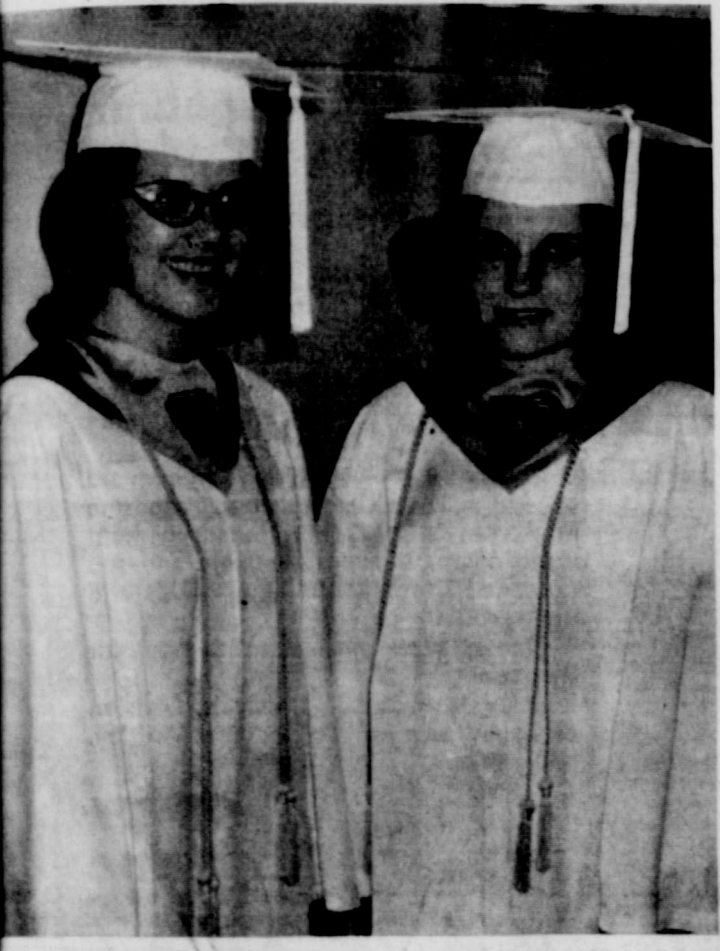

City Council Votes To Increase Water Rates

The City Council voted at its last regular meeting to increase the local summer water rates.

In the past, the minimum charge for the first 3,000 gallons used was \$2.50, and all water consumed over 3,000 gallons was charged out at the rate of .20 in summer and .30 in winter.

The new water rates which will be effective immediately will be \$2.50 for the first 3,000 gallons used and 30 per thousand gallons for all water consumed over 3,000 gallons.

The City Councilmen noted that even with the increase, the Silvert water rates are still lower than those in many cities. The City of Groom, for example, pays a \$2.50 charge for the first 2,000 gallons, .50 per thousand gallons for the next 8,000 gallons, and .35 per thousand for all water used over 10,000 gallons.

The City of Claude charges \$2.00 for the first 2,000 gallons and .35 per thousand for all over 2,000 gallons.

The City of Spur charges \$2.00 for the first 3,000 gallons, .60 per

thousand for the next 2,000 gallons used, and .25 per thousand for all water consumed over 5,000 gallons.

The City of Post charges \$2.50 for the first 3,000 gallons, .40 per thousand for the next 5,000 gal-

lons, .35 per thousand for the next 10,000 gallons, and .33 per thousand for all water used over 18,000 gallons.

In view of the summer water shortages, the Councilmen deemed this rate increase proper.

Mackenzie Water Measure Given Favorable Report

The Senate Committee on Water and Conservation recently heard opposing forces argue amicably over the proposed Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority and at the close voted to give a favorable report to a bill by Rep. Ralph Wayne of Plainview to create the conservation and reclamation district that is being sought by citizens from Silvert, Lockney, Tulia and Floydada.

Sen. Andy Rogers of Childress, whose district embraces all of the area, offered the motion to report the bill and with the motion voiced the hope that events would remove the fears of opponents from

the Quitaque area in Briscoe County.

The measure is being sought to set up the Authority for acquiring a badly-needed source of water for the four cities. It has been opposed by Quitaque out of fear that the town of about 600 residents would be deprived of a site that could provide water when a weakening well supply is exhausted.

In the brief hearing it was brought out that an engineering firm has indicated that a reservoir site that has been under consideration would not likely be suitable as a source adequate for the four

petitioning cities. It is that portion of the area that Quitaque wanted relinquished and which proponents of the bill did not want to detach from the bounds of the authority district.

There was agreement that available water supply is diminishing in all of the 330,000 acre area covered by the authority proposal. Quitaque has obtained easements from two land owners providing access into town.

Lon Davis, jr., of Floydada, the president of the Mackenzie tentative organization, and Don Book-out of Tulia presented pleas for the authority. Richard Reed of

Plainview presented the claim of Quitaque to have freedom to construct a smaller reservoir that would supply its needs and leave the remainder of the area of the watershed for the Mackenzie plan.

Chairman George Parkhouse wanted to know whether Quitaque might not purchase water from the Mackenzie authority and was told that they had not made an offer. Reed and O. R. Stark, jr., of Quitaque, who also appeared to protest the measure, described the plight of the residents of Quitaque as serious. Stark, a member of the Quitaque City Council, backed up Reed's argument with an ex-

planation that the town has been supplied by wells since 1927 and that these wells are growing weak while tests all over the town have failed to discover any new sources for water. He had no objection to the authority, he said, but added that the engineers believe there is not one chance in a hundred for building a reservoir where the town has procured easements.

The Briscoe County News was informed Tuesday morning that the Mackenzie Water Authority Bill has been passed by both the House and Senate, and is awaiting the Governor's signature.
