

ASC Community Committee Election Deadline Nears

The approaching election of ASC community committees for the program administration in Briscoe County was announced today by Louie Kitchens, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The community committees assist the ASC county committee in administering the price support, acreage diversion, agricultural conservation, and other farm-accrual programs in the county; they are particularly responsible for keeping their neighbors informed about the program. The county committee supervises the ASCS county office and is responsible for the administration of the various programs.

Voting will be by mail, the chairman explained, and ballots have been sent to each known eligible voter. In case eligible voters fail to receive a ballot through the mail, please contact the Briscoe County office for a ballot. Generally, a farm owner, tenant, or sharecropper is eligible to vote if he is eligible to take part in one or more of the programs administered by the ASC committees. Eligibility to vote or hold office as a committeeman is not restricted by reason of race, color, creed, or national origin.

Envelopes containing marked ballots may be mailed or returned to the Briscoe ASCS County office anytime before September 8. Ballots will be tabulated publicly by the county committee September 9, at the ASCS office. The public is invited to witness the vote counting.

Spray Sign-Up Urged In Briscoe County

Cotton farmers in the High Plains boll weevil control zone who have not yet given permission for their fields to be sprayed are strongly urged by County Agent

Leon Grosdidier to sign-up for the spray program. He said that a 100 percent sign-up would greatly improve the effectiveness of the program and would help lessen the need for in-season control next year.

Grosdidier said there are nine farmers in infested areas of Briscoe County who have not yet signed spray permits.

The second year's spraying will start September 7, and program officials are trying to better last year's 99 percent sign-up. Although admitting that 99 per-

cent sign-up sounds like good participation, Grosdidier points out that enough overwintering weevils can be produced in the few untreated fields to re-infest the entire area unless preventative measures are taken.

Anything less than 100 percent sign-up this year will require more work, more expense, and will hamper the chances of success of the entire program, according to the agent.

Failure of some farmers to permit their cotton land to be sprayed last year cost their neighbors many dollars for in-season control that might not have been required.

The Texas Department of Agriculture says that quite a few of those who refused to sign spray permits last year have signed them this year after seeing that the low volume method of using malathion was highly effective against boll weevils but did not harm livestock, wildlife or feed and grain crops.

Mackenzie Group Hears Progress Report

Directors of the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority met in Tulsa Monday night to hear a progress report.

Proposed site of the dam is west of Highway 284 between Silverton and Vigo Park. The dam would be 1,000 feet long and the im-

pounded water would cover 800 acres, according to engineers' studies. Water would average 50' in depth and would be 150' deep at the deepest point when full.

Jim Nichols, engineer from Freeze, Nichols and Endress in Fort Worth, reported that the cap-

acity of the artificial lake would be 35,000 acre feet, and the June rains this year sent 26,000 acre feet of water down the Tule. Had the dam already been built, June rains would have filled the lake to two-thirds of capacity.

This project is similar to the White River Authority, which provides water for Ralls, Crosbyton, Post and Spur. The Mackenzie Project would cost about \$4 million, including land, dam, filter system and pipelines to the cities of Silverton, Floydada, Lockney and Tulsa.

School Enrollment Is Down This Year

School opened for the 1965-66 term Monday with a total enrollment of 552. The Silverton High School enrollment was 145, according to Superintendent J. S. Hinds. There are 31 teachers in the school system this year.

Elementary Principal Bill Verden reported a total of 62 enrol-

led in the two sections of the first grade. It is hoped that a teacher can be hired to teach a third section of the first grade until after harvest. Customarily, the first grade enrollment drops after that season of the year, and would be no more than enough for two sections.

Last year the local school enrollment totaled 588 the first day of school. Of that total, 38 were students at the Carver Elementary School. The high school enrollment last year was 151 as compared with 136 the previous year.

The Carver school is not in operation this year, and all students regardless of their race, are enrolled in the same classes in the Silverton School system.

No school holiday is planned on Labor Day.

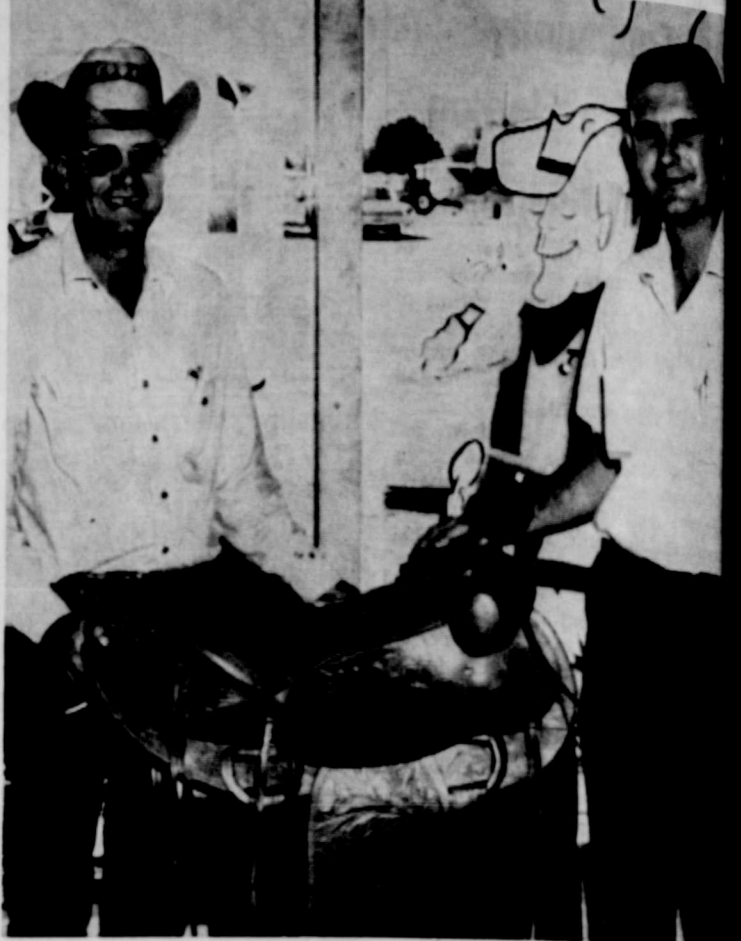

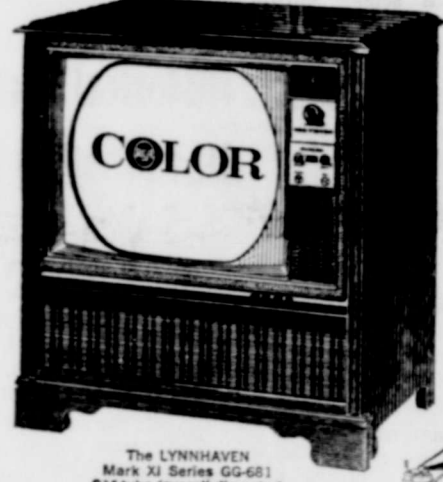

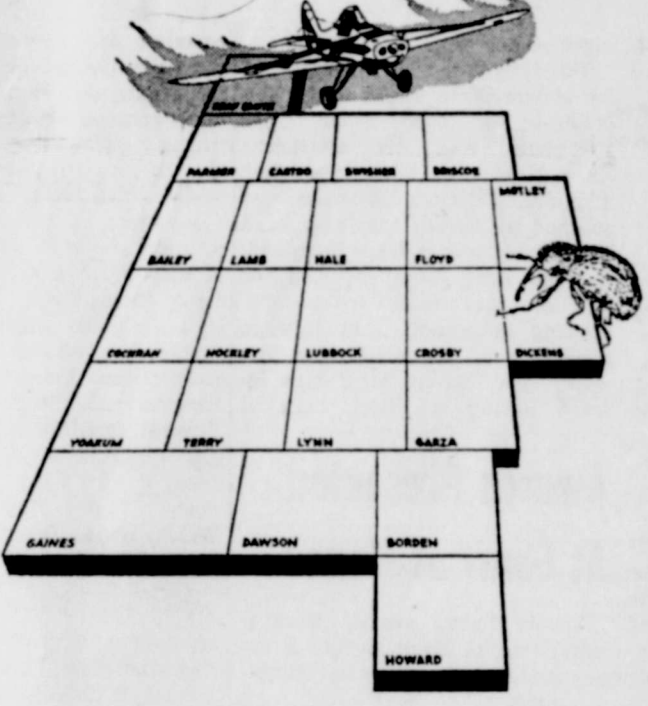
