Governor Proclaims 4-H Week In Texas

Governor John Connally has proclaimed the week of September 25-October 2, 1965, as 4-H Club Week in Texas.

In his official memorandum, the Governor said, "The development of responsible citizens and leaders for America is a high purpose in 4-H Club work.

"The 4-H program stresses the four-fold development of youth: their head, heart, hands and health. Members of 4-H Clubs learn by conducting projects and participating in 4-H activities. By putting into action what they learn, club members improve their homes and communities.

"Since the 4-H program was inaugurated by the United States government in 1914, the 4-H movement has spread across our nation and to 76 foreign countries.

"More than 18,000 voluntary adult leaders work with club members in Texas and contribute to the success of 4-H. Parents and friends of 4-H give support and encouragement to club members. The 4-H Club program is directed by the staff of the Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A & M University.

"The opportunities offered to 4-H Club members to grow in citizenship, leadership and practical skills are especially valuable to them, the State of Texas and the nation. The 4-H Clubs are a proving ground for future leaders."

Hereford was the scene of the fifth annual convention of Young Farmers on September 11, 1965. During the convention, G. W. Chappell, an outstanding Young Farmer in the Silverton chapter, who is presently serving as its president, was elected to serve Area I as reporter.

Other officers elected were Delton Stone, Abernathy, president; Ben Holcomb, Dimmitt, vice president; James Hale, Floydada, secretary; Kenneth Means, Ropesville, treasurer; Truman Dunavant, Floydada, state officer for two-year term.

The three voting delegates from the Silverton Young Farmers chapter were Joe Brannon, Guinn Fitzgerald and Charles Mayfield. The Young Farmer-Young Homemaker Awards Banquet was held that evening for approximately 500 members and guests. Rev. Kenneth Wyatt, of First Methodist Church in Paducah, gave the address.

Truman Dunavant, Floydada, was selected as the 1965 Outstanding Young Farmer for Area I.

Farm experts traveled thousands of miles visiting farms of Outstanding Young Farmer nominees throughout ten vocational agriculture areas comprising the State Association of Young Farmers of Texas. On October 4, a state-wide committee will select the 1965 Outstanding Young Farmer of Texas from among the ten area winners. Main sponsor of this awards program is the Sears-Roebuck Foundation. The state winner will receive \$1,100. Each Area winner gets \$100. Each Area runner-up receives \$50.

In addition to bonds, each Area winner receives an engraved plaque from the Sears-Roebuck Foundation.

A slow, soaking rain shower began Friday and continued off and on until early Monday morning when the bottom fell out, measurements up to three inches were recorded. The skies cleared and the sun shone brightly about noon Monday, and soon afternoon the skies darkened and another heavy shower fell.

"Behold, I have set before thee an open door . . ." Rev. 3:8

Statistics are usually boring and sometimes meaningless; however, I want to give you some as stated by Tom Bland of Fort Worth in a recent speech on gambling.

"Gambling is the biggest business in America, with more than \$50 billion gambled away every year. This is twice the amount

spent on medical care in the entire nation. The \$10 billion profit that goes to professional gamblers is twice the total expenditure for all religious and welfare work, twice the amount spent for all private education and research, and 20 per cent more than the combined net profits of the 100 largest manufacturing concerns in the nation. An estimated \$4.5 billion is passed on in bribes and pay-offs from illegal gamblers to public officials. This is more than

\$500,000 an hour! While \$3½ billion is gambled legally each year on horse and dog races—the biggest form of gambling, an estimated \$12 to \$15 billion, is bet illegally with bookies.

MRS. KIDD'S RECIPE FOR BAKED APPLE DONUTS

1½ cup sifted all purpose flour	¼ cup milk
1¾ tsp. baking powder	1 cup grated raw apple
½ tsp. salt	½ cup melted butter or margarine
½ tsp. ground nutmeg	½ cup sugar
½ cup sugar	1 tsp. cinnamon
½ cup shortening	
1 egg, beaten	

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt, nutmeg and ½ cup sugar. Cut in shortening until mixture is fine. Mix together egg, milk and apple; add all at once to dry ingredients and mix quickly but thoroughly. Fill greased 2½ x 1¼ inch muffin tins ¾ full. Bake in 350 degree moderate oven 20 or 30 minutes or until golden brown. Remove from pans; immediately roll donuts in melted butter and then in cinnamon and sugar that have been mixed together. Serve warm.
