11/2 cup sifted all purpose flour

13/4 tsp. baking powder

1/2 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. ground nutmeg

1/2 cup sugar

1/3 cup shortening 1 egg, beaten

margarine

1/4 cup milk

apple

1/3 cup sugar 1 tsp. cinnamon

1 cup grated raw

1/2 cup melted butter or

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt, nutmeg and 1/2 cup sugar. Cut in shortening until mixture is fine. Mix together egg, milk and apple; add all at once to dry ingredients and mix quickly but thoroughly. Fill greased 21/2 x 11/4 inch muffin tins 3/3 full. Bake in 350 degree moderate oven 20 or 30 minutes or until golden brown. Remove from pans; immediately roll donuts in melted butter and then in cinnamon and sugar that have been mixed together. Serve warm.




