Soybean Producers Advised On "Penta" As Desiccant

Some growers are using the chemical pentachlorophenol as a desiccant on soybeans intended for food, feed, or oil purposes. Such use could result in illegal residues being found in the soybeans, and consequent crop seizures, says Dr. Homer Brady, Extension weed specialist at Texas A & M University.

Dr. Brady said that pentachlorophenol is registered with the USDA as a desiccant on a number of crops grown for seed only, including soybeans. The registered use for this crop carries the following limitations: Apply two to four days before harvest; do not graze treated areas or feed treated forage or threshings to livestock; and do not use seed from treated crops for food, feed, or oil purposes.

There is no pesticidal product registered with USDA for pre-harvest desiccation of commercial soybeans grown for food, feed, or oil purposes.

Dr. Brady pointed out that federal regulations require that all pesticide products, including desiccants and defoliants, moving in interstate commerce be registered with the Secretary of Agriculture. These products must be formulated and labeled so they meet Federal standards of effectiveness and safety when used for the purposes approved in the registration. The regulations are administered by USDA's Agricultural Research Service under the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act.

Bill Cushing, who ranches in the Antelope Flat community in north-eastern Briscoe County, was elected as a member of the board of supervisors of the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District at an election held in the Bill Thornberry home Tuesday night.

The board of supervisors governs the district. Other supervisors now serving are W. E. Autry and Aubrey Rowell, Silverton, James Bailey, Quitaque, and Joe Edd Burnett of the San Jacinto community.

Mr. Cushing will represent Zone 2 of the district, which includes the ranching area of Briscoe County below the caprock. Mr. Cushing has previously served as a supervisor. He has been an active conservationist for many years.

**Step Up Search for Former 4-H'ers
 Who Qualify for Alumni Awards**

The Federal Extension Service estimates that there are 23 million former 4-H Club members in the United States today. So it is safe to say that in each of the nearly 3,100 counties and districts within the 50 states reside thousands of men and women who were 4-H'ers.

It is these people whom the national 4-H alumni program seeks to honor locally and nationally through its recognition awards. The program is conducted by the Extension Service and supported by the Olin Mathieson Chemical Corporation. Participants sought are persons who have demonstrated leadership, service to youth, adherence to 4-H principles and success in their occupation or profession.

Businessmen, homemakers, farmers, teachers, public officials and others have received alumni awards during the 13 years they have been offered. The main task, according to the National 4-H Service Committee which cooperates in the program, is to make a concentrated effort to keep in touch with former 4-H members. Names of persons can be sent to the National 4-H Service Committee.

If every county from coast to coast named four persons to receive the county alumni recognition pin, more than 12,000 could be honored in a single year. And 200 could be cited for the state plaque award.

Then there are eight national key award recipients to be selected from among the state winners. These eight are guests of Olin during the National 4-H Club Congress at Chicago. An elaborate alumni banquet and other recognition events spotlight the national winners.

"With so much good being done by so many who have shared a common philosophy of service to others and who attained success in life," observed Mr. Kenneth Anderson, associate director of the National 4-H Service Committee, "it's important that these responsible Americans be honored."

He urges residents to check childhood affiliations of prominent neighbors to ascertain if they have a 4-H background. "If so, make him or her your 1966 candidate," he added. "Ways to locate 4-H alumni are at large meetings, local affairs, clubs, church and by just asking around."
