Plains Conservation Program Approved

The 1966 Great Plains Conservation Program has been approved, and cost sharing will be based on local average costs that have been approved by the Board of Supervisors of the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District and Briscoe County Great Plains Conservation Program committee. Cost sharing will be offered on the following practices:

- Diversion Terrace — 70% cost share
- Waterway—80% cost share
- Range Seeding—80% cost share
- Pasture Planting — 80% cost share
- Erosion Control Dams and Structures—70% cost share
- Ponds for Livestock Water — 50% cost share
- Wells for Livestock Water—50% cost share
- Pipelines for Livestock Water—50% cost share
- Water Storage Facilities —50% cost share
- Cross Fences to Improve Grazing Distribution—50% cost share
- Brush Control—50% cost share
- Cost sharing under the Great Plains Conservation Program is based on a conservation plan for the entire farm or ranch. A Great Plains Conservation Program contract assists landowners to apply all needed conservation practices on the land.
- G.P.C.P. participants who earn cost share on irrigation systems

Information Program Planned In 1966

As a service to farmers and ranchers, the Federal Land Bank Association of Floydada will join in a national program of public information keyed to the 50th anniversary of the Federal Land Bank System. The Floydada Association, along with some 700 other associations and the twelve Federal Land Banks, will carry out the program to make all Americans aware of the importance of agriculture.

J. T. Persons, the Quitaque Association Assistant Manager, stated that large segments of the country's population, such as city dwellers, factory workers and the like, are not aware of the vital part which agricultural people take in

adding to the basic strength of the nation.

With agriculture moving into a "challenging new era of development for rural America and of production for the world-wide battle against hunger," it becomes increasingly necessary that the true, complete story of agricultural progress and potentials be told, he said.

Mr. Persons noted that numerous meetings, commemorative activities and special anniversary events will get underway in the

coming months, leading up to the nation-wide 50th Anniversary in 1967. The twelve Federal Land Banks were established in 1917 under the Farm Loan Act.

The 50th Anniversary comes as a timely opportunity, Mr. Persons commented, to translate the accomplishments of agriculture into terms of interest for all people everywhere. He said the Federal Land Bank Association of Floydada, with offices in Floydada and Quitaque, welcomes the chance to take part in this effort.

Parallel Terraces Offer Advantages

Terraces are one of the most useful and most needed conservation practices. In past years, it is difficult to estimate the miles of terraces that were constructed within the county. However, with the increase in irrigation, terraces disappeared and were replaced by irrigation furrows, washing away the topsoil that had been held in place by the terraces that had been removed.

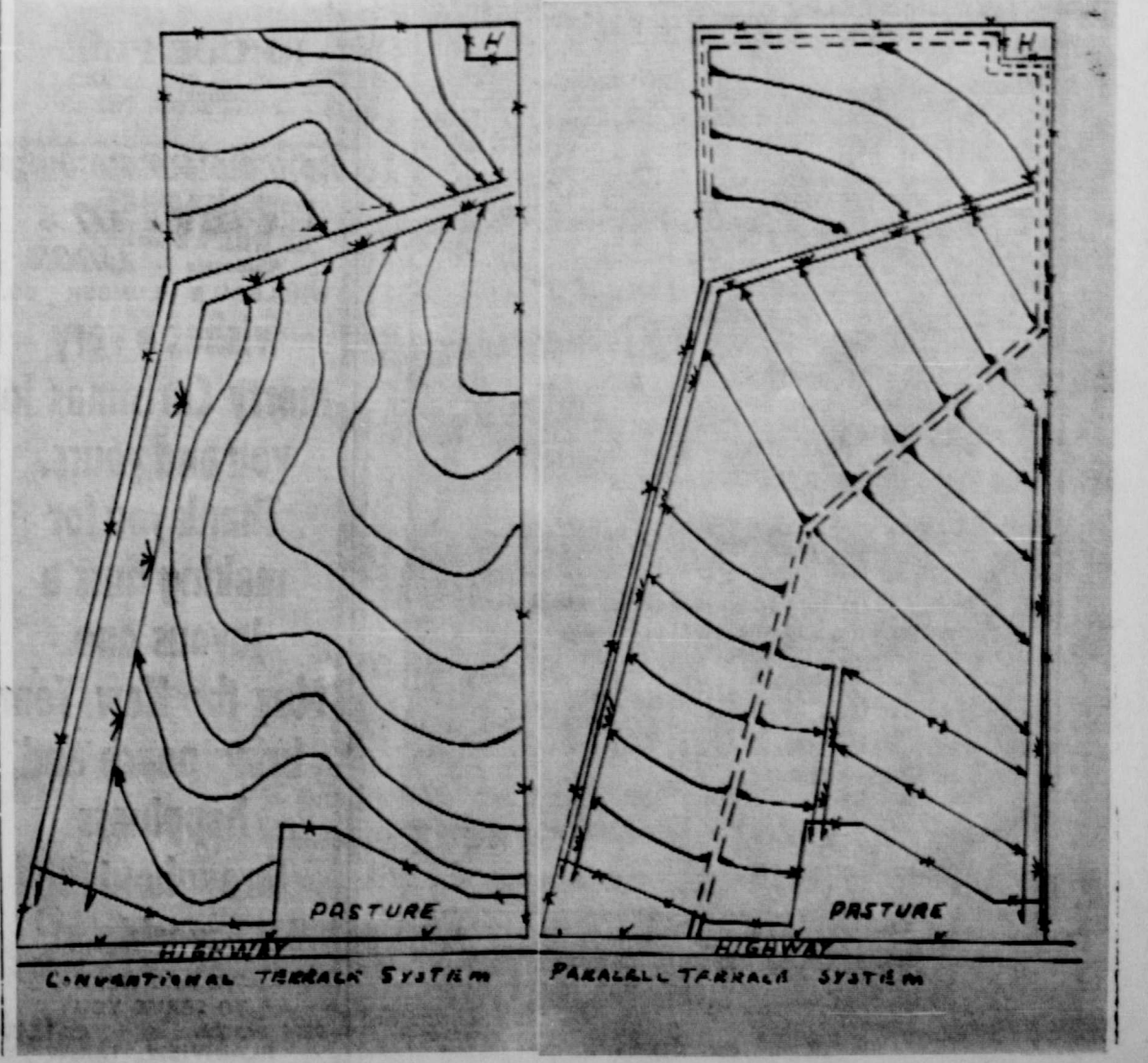
Even on land that was not under irrigation, terraces began to disappear. The reason for the disappearance of the terraces was simple. It is impossible to irrigate properly in terraces when con-

fronted by point rows, and in most cases the terraces were constructed on a level grade and the water would not run. A problem for the dryland farmer is that you cannot use modern four and six row equipment on the terraced areas that are irregular in size and shape.

Today, the conventional terrace system is being replaced by a system of uniform parallel terraces that keep the soil in place while providing drainage to keep down wet spots that are prevalent with conventional terrace systems. As

can be seen in the pictures below the parallel terraces offer a uniform horizontal spacing that can be laid out to fit modern equipment, thereby making possible faster and easier cultivation without the inconvenience of point rows.

Cost share assistance for the construction of parallel terraces is available through the Great Plains Conservation Program. If you are interested in the construction of terraces for your farm, or desire more details about parallel terraces, contact your local Soil Conservation Service office. They will be happy to be of service.

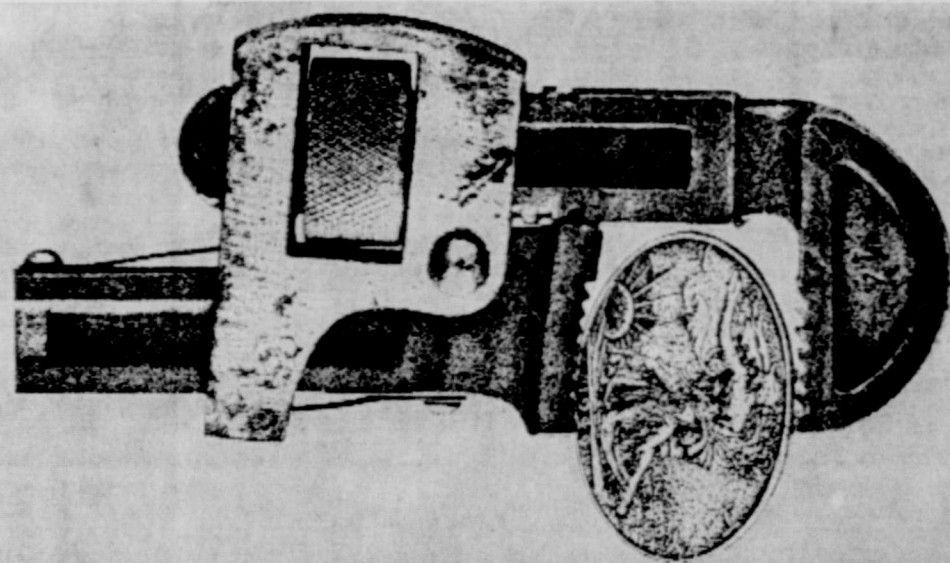

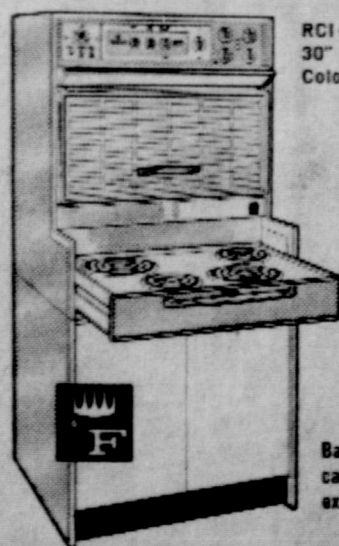

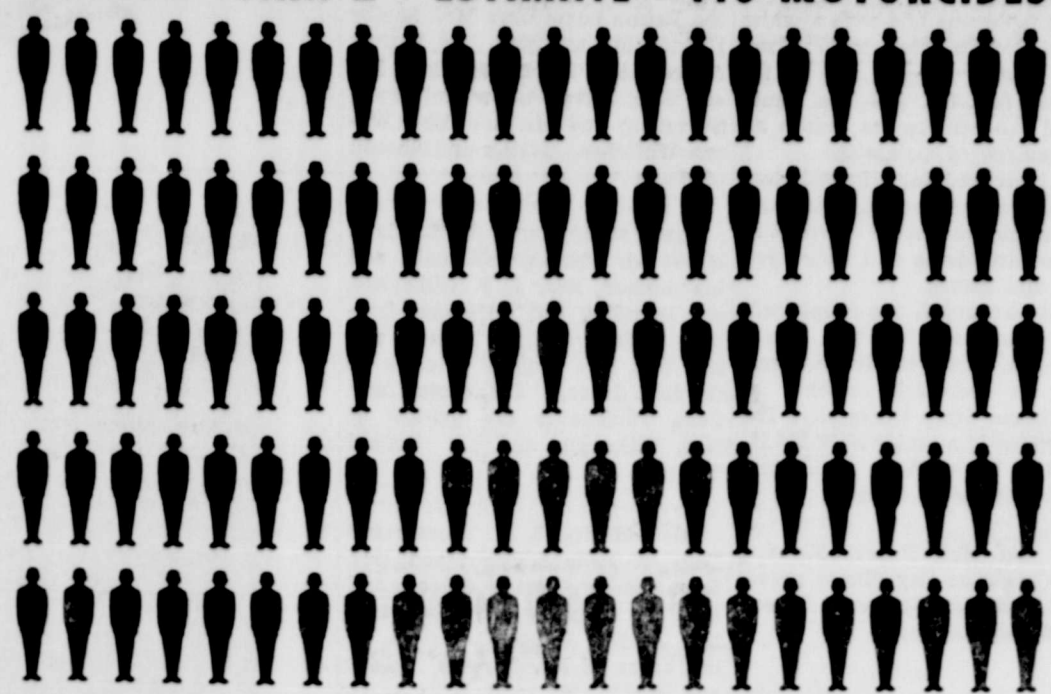
