In Glenn Shelton's "Hired Hand" column in the Wichita Falls Record-News are found many bits of wisdom, but rarely have any appeared which contained more wisdom than the "The 'Easy' Parents Will Fail" column in Tuesday's paper.

I'd like to pass some of this along to those who may not read the Wichita Falls paper.

A jokester quipped: "I once had four theories about raising children; now I have four children and no theories!" And that's about the way it goes. Nobody knows so much about rearing children as the guy who has none, but often a person who rears four or five will admit that the so-called rules have many exceptions—almost as many as there are kids. But I long have maintained that "easy" parents spoil their children, and that parents who maintain strict discipline usually rear happy, well-adjusted offspring. What's more, the disciplinarians are called upon to enforce very little discipline, while the converse is true of the permissive parents.

Holding that theory, I was happy to see that it was sanctioned by a study sponsored recently by the National Institute of Mental Health. The study shows that parents who establish and enforce rules of conduct with respect and affection rear more successful and happier children.

The happy irony of this theory is that the strict parent rarely finds it necessary to punish his child—simply because the child KNOWS he will be punished if he goes astray. The parent who isn't strict, whose child rarely obeys, soon becomes exasperated and administers a sound thrashing. His child doesn't know how far he can go and is thus unsure of himself, insecure, and determined to find out how far he can go.

The successful parents didn't necessarily spend more time with their children, the study showed, but were firm, fair, respected their children's rights, and showed them affection. The easy or permissive parent always found it necessary eventually to lower the boom on his child. Neither he nor his child was ever happy.

I've always held the opinion that a child won't respect a parent who doesn't exercise his authority over him. It is also my belief that a parent should give his child the same consideration, honesty and respect that he would give a friend or business associate. Some parents, I think, fail to realize what "little mirrors" their children are. If they see honesty and fair play, they will usually reflect the same. And they will likely reflect the undesirable traits which they see in their parents.

I've always felt that environment had a greater effect on a child than heredity.

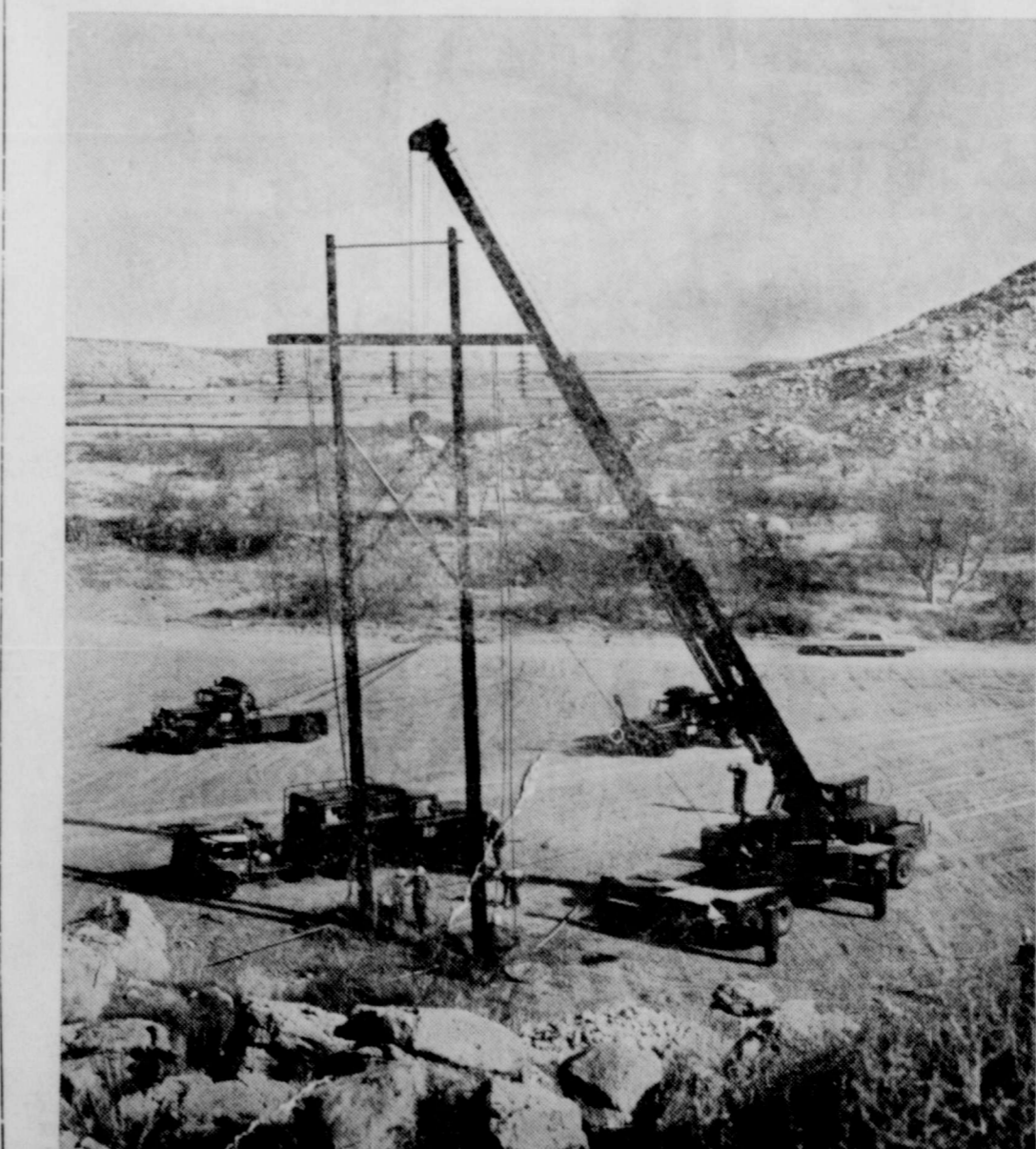
Area Officer Visits Jaycee-Ettes
