





The first candle burned a total of six hours and the second burned a total of four hours. In two hours (8:30-10:30) the first candle burns as much as the second burns for England. Albion means white in 11/2 hours (8:30-10:00), that is, the two candles burn in the ratio of 4 to 3. Therefore, in six hours, the first burns as much as the second in 41/2 hours, so that the second candle must have required 1/2 hour to burn one inch. Therefore, the second candle must have been 8 inches long originally, and the first candle 9 inches long.
