### Three New Council Members Elected

Seventy voters turned out Tuesday to cast ballots in the City of Silvertown election to fill three vacancies on the city council.

Incumbent Jimmie House was re-elected to serve as Mayor of the City of Silvertown. He had no opponent listed on the ballot.

The incumbents were Ray Thompson and Charles Sarchet. Jack Stafford chose not to seek re-election.

The three city council seats were filled in a three way tie between Manley Wood, Troy Jones and H. A. Cagle. Each received 39 votes.

Sarchet received 37 votes; Thompson polled 33, and Bill Wristen got 26 votes.

### Voters Elect Two School Trustees

With two places vacant on the Board of the Silvertown Independent School District, voters elected Floyd Williams to his first term and re-elected Sam Lewis.

Lewis polled 123 votes and Williams received 65.

Other candidates were Beryl Long, 61; Don Garrison, 53; Jack Sutton, 41; and J. W. Reid, jr., 52. County Trustee-at-Large H. A. Cagle was unopposed and polled 202 votes. Gilbert Elms was unopposed as County Trustee from the Northwest Precinct, and received 183 votes.

In the maintenance tax election for a tax increase to \$1.50, the issue was passed with 155 voting for the issue and 47 against.

In 1939, Mr. Farley was a professional ball player, who became interested in "kids." He investigated the Maverick Club and Kids Incorporated. In the beginning, Julian Bivens gave the old Tascosa courthouse and 12 acres of land which was the beginning of Boys Ranch. The program of the ranch is affectionate discipline (family type of life). Today there are 345 boys at the ranch and applications reach 2,000 a day. No orphans are taken.

The boys are from all of the states and six foreign countries. If a boy graduates and is college material with a desire to go on, the ranch helps them and scholarships are given by a number of colleges. The success of the ranch and staff is 97% correctional.

Mr. Harriman read a recent letter from an ex-Boys Rancher stationed in Vietnam, expressing his appreciation for what the "home" had done for his brother and himself.

Hearing Mr. Harriman was an inspiration to club members. A check was presented to Mr. Harriman to be given to Boys Ranch, for which he expressed appreciation. He stated that many contributions are made from this area. An invitation was extended to each member to visit Boys Ranch and have lunch with the group of boys and their dorm parents.

**Venereal Disease A Serious National Problem, Says AMA**

Venereal disease is spreading so rapidly that it now represents this nation's most urgent communicable disease problem.

VD is hitting particularly hard among teenagers and young adults, according to the American Medical Association.

The venereal diseases are infecting about two Americans a minute—3,000 a day, or 1,100,000 a year. Cases of infectious syphilis have almost tripled in this country in the past five years. More than a million

new cases of gonorrhea are developing annually. VD can blind, cripple, and even kill.

The ravages of venereal diseases are all needless tragedy, says the AMA, because both syphilis and gonorrhea can be avoided. If contracted, they can be cured by prompt medical treatment.

The cure for both diseases—penicillin—has been available since 1943. Any family physician or public health clinic can administer

prompt treatment.

Venereal disease is caused by intimate personal contact.

Complacency, ignorance, and a free-and-easy attitude toward moral standards are partly responsible for the spread of VD; the increasing use of alcohol, especially among young people, also plays a role.

Authorities believe, however, that thousands of young people simply aren't aware of the dangers of VD. Once infected, they are complacent about treatment.

One of the first signs of syphilis may be a painless, ulcerating sore. Gonorrhea produces inflammation of the genital and urinary tracts, and a discharge of pus.

A person may contract syphilis and be unaware that he has the disease. After the first symptoms, the germs may remain hidden in the body for as long as 20 years before any damage is discovered. Then the person may become crippled, develop heart disease, blood vessel disease, blindness, or show mental symptoms. Even death may result from this hidden stage of syphilis.

If left untreated, gonorrhea may be responsible for arthritis, endocarditis, sterility, and blindness.

If a person suspects he may have contracted venereal disease, he should go to a physician immediately.



VD should be treated promptly by a physician.

**Marcia's Orange Ham Loaf**

- 6 Tablespoons brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
- 6 thin, unpeeled orange slices
- 2 cups ground cooked ham
- 1 pound ground beef
- 1 small onion, minced
- 1/2 cup fresh bread crumbs
- 1 egg
- 1/2 cup orange juice
- 1/2 teaspoon paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire Sauce
- pinch of ground cloves

In each of 6 custard cups (3 1/2 inches in diameter) place 1 Tablespoon brown sugar, sprinkle with a little dry mustard and 1 orange

slice. Combine rest of ingredients and pack lightly in custard cups. Bake uncovered 45 minutes at 350 degrees. Let stand five minutes. Pour off drippings, then invert onto serving platter. It may also be baked in a 9x5x3 loaf pan for 1 1/2 hours using 3 or 4 orange slices.

**Sauce for Ham Loaf**

- 1 package sour cream
- 1 teaspoon prepared horse radish
- 1 Tablespoon chopped onion
- Serve over ham or pork roast.

Cream butter and sugar. Add eggs one at a time, beating after each. Melt chocolate bars in double boiler and add chocolate

to egg mixture. Add soda to buttermilk and fold in flour alternately. Stir in vanilla, salt and nuts. Pour into 10" stem pan and bake 90 minutes at 325 degrees in greased and floured pan.

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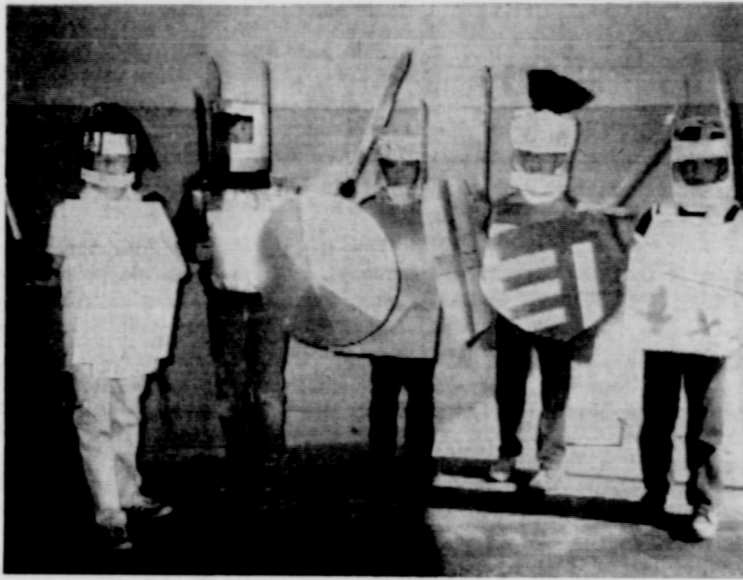
