# Commodity Credit Ruling Explained

Because of a technical situation between the commercial grain warehouse industry and the government's Commodity Credit Corporation, grain producers of Texas are being advised by directors of the Texas Grain and Feed Association that some Texas grain warehousemen, through no fault of their own, may be unable to accept 1966 grain under the CCC support program.

The Kansas City office of CCC-USA has for some months warned grain warehousemen that it will suspend from its approved list any warehouse which fails within 90 days to comply with orders to load out CCC grain. In the meantime a nation-wide shortage of boxcars has become critical of service orders and has made it virtually impossible for some warehousemen to comply fully with the loading orders. Thus it is technically possible that some warehouses may be suspended from the government's approved list at harvest time, in spite of any efforts the warehouseman may make in the meantime to comply. Seven Texas grain warehouses are now under this technical suspension.

Directors of the Texas Grain and Feed Association point out that suspension under the above conditions would not necessarily imply any physical, financial or ethical weakness on the part of the warehouseman and should not be considered by his customers as any form of discredit.

The Texas Association's Board of Directors considered a proposal that they consider court action in the case of any Texas warehouse which, at harvest time, is suspended from normal competition by this action of CCC-USA, and where good faith of the warehouseman has been established. The action was held up pending other representations to be made by the trade group to government officials, in the hope that a reconciliation could be effected well ahead of harvest time.

### Home Demonstration Agent

How do you compare with the average shopper? The "Seventh Study" by DuPont Film Department has recently been released and some interesting things came to light about our shopping habits in the supermarkets.

The family shopper, most often the homemaker, is spending an average of 26 minutes shopping at her local supermarket which is larger and has more items than five years ago. Most shoppers are not carrying shopping lists but are relying instead on what they see in the supermarket for suggestions. Almost 50 percent of the items bought are unplanned. This means that almost one-half of all shopping is completely impulse buying. This is why some of our result demonstrators are able to save from \$5 to \$10 per week when they shop by a planned list. Some of the highest "impulse" purchase rating items were: chewing gum; convenience foods, such as macaroni, noodles and spaghetti in prepared dinners; heat-and-serve frozen foods; frozen soups. Among the other individual products with high rank were: chocolate candy; small individual packages; corn chips; donuts; and snacks other than pretzels and potato chips.

To get the most nutrition for the least number of dollars takes time and careful planning.

Some aids that are available to you for the asking are the following bulletins: "Eat Well for Less," "Good Meals Every Day," "Quick Meals," and "Food for Fitness." Call our office at 4271 and we will mail copies to you, or stop by and see them. There may be other bulletins that you can use that we've failed to mention.

Would you like to know another way to S-T-R-E-T-C-H your dollars? Measure soap! Why? Most women use too much. This: waste money, yellows clothes, makes them stiff, makes clothes wear faster. Use a measuring cup and peanut butter jar marked with 1/4, 1/2, and 3/4 cup measure. The amount you use depends on the type of soap or detergent you use. If you use soap, it takes 1/2 cups per full load. It takes 1/4 cup of low sudsing synthetic detergent and 1/4 cups sudsing synthetic detergent. The concentrated liquid synthetic detergent requires 1/8 cup per standard load.

If you have had problems with your cotton and synthetic blend blouses turning yellow, try the procedure that Mrs. Gladys Mould found worked for her. Last, she ran them through another cycle with Rit nylon whitener and brightener. She was very pleased with her results. White cotton lingerie also responds well to this treatment.

Destroyed in addition to the building and equipment were a truck, a Caterpillar loader and a tractor with loader. The office, which is housed in a separate building, was saved.

Mrs. Fisch preceded her husband in death several years ago.

Mr. Fisch was a retired farmer. Survivors include a son, Berle, of Silverton; a daughter, Mrs. Bood Myers, of Silverton; four grandchildren; two brothers, Bill of Keeswick, Iowa, and Merrell of Blairstown, Iowa; and one sister, Mrs. Rose Cheney, of Deep River, Iowa.



## Donny Anderson To Speak At Banquet

Donny Anderson, three year varsity football player for the Texas Tech Red Raiders, has accepted an invitation to be guest speaker for the annual Silverton High School Athletic Banquet.

Anderson has signed a contract to play professional football for the Green Bay Packers after being the first round draft choice in the National Football League in 1964 and the first round future choice of the American Football League in 1964.

Anderson was Player of the Year (with Jim Grabowski), Sporting News; Southwest Conference Sportsmanship Award, Fort Worth Kiwanis Club; Southwest Conference Back of the Year; All Southwest Conference for the third year; All America first team by Football Writers Association-Look Magazine; Hula Bowl All Star (setting reception record); Outstanding Player, losing team, Gator Bowl; Texas Tech Co-captain.

In his football career at Tech, Anderson rushed 526 times for 2376 gross yards, lost 96, for 2280 net (4.3 average); passed five times for one interception; had 531 total plays for 2280 yards total offense; caught 105 passes for 1327 yards and 12 touchdowns. He also intercepted three passes for 78 yards; punted 149 times for 5687 yards (38.2 average), returned nine punts for 97 yards, returned 56 kickoffs 1309 yards and scored 28 touchdowns for 168 points.

His longest rushing play was 90 yards against T.C.U. in 1964. His longest kickoff return was 100 yards against Oklahoma State in 1965. His longest pass play was 64 yards from Tom Wilson against Mississippi State in 1964. His longest punt was 68 yards against S.M.U. in 1964, and his longest interception return was 43 yards against Washington State in 1963. Anderson's longest punt return was 37 yards against Oklahoma State in 1965.

Anderson is a 6'3", 210-pounder whose hometown is Stinnett. Of his All American player, Coach J. T. King has said, "Anderson could start at anywhere from one to four positions for any team in the nation." Teammate Tom Wilson said of Anderson, "He's the greatest thing I've ever been around. He has moves I've never seen, and he has a lot of football sense. He's always looking for things on his own even when he's deceiving."

In high school Anderson was an all-around athlete, making All State in football and basketball, placing in state meet in hurdles and on the relay team. He put the shot, high jumped, ran the 120 and 180 hurdles and played amateur baseball after high school graduation.

Anderson recalls, "In Class AA high school ball I was big enough to run over a lot of people. But I soon learned that if I was going to carry the ball in college I would have to learn to go around the bigger ones."

Tickets to the banquet are on sale this week by members of the Quarterback Club. The banquet will begin at 7:30 p.m. on Saturday, April 23, in the school cafeteria. Guests will be the boys and girls who have played on the school athletic teams this year.

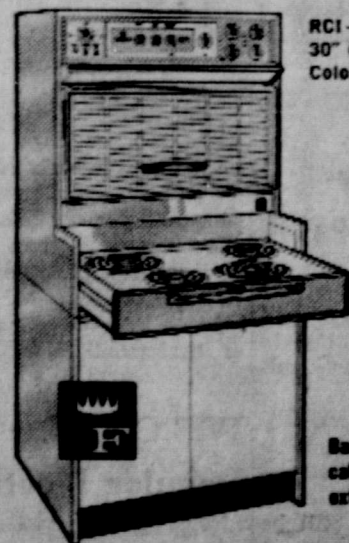
