

With this evidence we want to urge all women that it is important never to take medicine, not even aspirin, while pregnant, without your doctor's approval. This is a fact of which all women are not aware. When a woman is pregnant, nothing-vitamin pills, medicines for upset stomach, headache prescriptions - should be taken without your doctor's consent.

If you want flowers in bloom from early spring until fall, plant some early blooming annuals and some that bloom later in the season up until frost. Most annuals are grown for cut flowers, although some may be for garden display or for drying for indoor use during winter.

As a general rule, sow seeds outside after the last killing frost. Seeds may rot before they germinate if planted while the soil is too cold (below 60 degrees F.). Exceptions, which can be planted in early spring are: babysbreath, cornflower, poppy, phlox, stock, strawflower, sweet alyssum and sweetpea.

Start seed indoors no sooner than 8 weeks before the danger of killing frost is over, otherwise plants may get too big for successful transplanting. Instead of growing your own plants indoors you may wish to buy seedlings from a nursery. When seedlings have developed two true leaves, it's time to transplant. Dig deeply under


