4-H Members Win Ribbons



4-H Soil, Water and Range Conservation team from Briscoe County will be competing June 7-8 at Texas A and M University during 4-H Roundup. The team qualified to attend the State event in District 4-H contest held in Lubbock Saturday, April 23, on the Texas Tech Campus. Leland Campsey coached this team. Their mother Mrs. J. L. Self plans to accompany them to Roundup.

South Plains 4-H'ers from sixteen of the twenty counties in Extension District II qualified Saturday, April 23, to compete in the State 4-H Roundup by taking prizes at the District contests on the Texas Tech campus. A total of 430 4-H members competed in the District event.

To qualify for the State contest, a team or individual must have a first or second place win in the Senior Division which is for the 4-H'ers who are 14 years old and older.

District Agents Billy C. Gunter and Mrs. Aubrey W. Russell, both of Lubbock, estimated that 800 adult leaders and 4-H'ers attended the contests at Texas Tech.

Briscoe County had seven 4-H boys and girls competing for top honors at the District II 4-H Eliminations Contest.

Larry Comer won second place in the Tractor Operator Contest and was awarded a red ribbon.

Joni Self and Kathy Self won second and received a red ribbon in the Soil, Water and Range Conservation Demonstration team contest. The girls are daughters of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Self.

Barbara Davis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Davis, won third and a white ribbon in the Senior Foods and Nutrition Educational Demonstration contest.

Rhonda Sutton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Sutton, placed third in the Junior Foods and Nutrition Education Demonstration contest. She received a white ribbon.

Others competing were Pat Jarrett, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Claude E. Jarrett. She entered the Senior Clothing Educational Demonstration. Lynette Martin was Briscoe County's representative in the Junior Clothing Educational Demonstration. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Grady Martin.

Some who attended the Elimination Activities from this county were Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Self and their son, Marvin. Marvin represented the county as one of the District II 4-H Hosts. Mr. and Mrs. Grady Martin were there with Lynette. Mrs. Don Garrison and her daughters, Roy Dale, a 4-H member, and Raye, a student at Texas Tech were observing contests. Cynthia Sutton accompanied the Home Demonstration Agent, Mrs. Becky Hall, with some of the contestants. County Agent Leon Grosdidier's two sons, Rene and Andre, accompanied their father and Larry Comer. Joe Bob Watson was there to congratulate Larry for being a winner.

The Silverton High School Baseball team won the district title by defeating Farwell High School 10 to 8 in a game played last week at Nazareth.

Leland Wood was the winning pitcher. Much of the Owl scoring power came off the bats of Bailey Loyd, who went to bat five times, got one two-base hit and scored two runs; Jimmy Burson, who was at bat four times, hit two two-base hits, and scored three runs; and Ira Gallington, who hit a triple

in four times at the plate and scored two runs.

Charlie Baker scored one run on no hits in four times at bat; Lynn Frizzell scored one run on one hit in three times at bat; Buddy Comer scored two runs on one hit in four times at bat; Roy Dale Wood and Danny Vaughan each scored two runs on two hits in four times at bat; Leland Wood and Randy Hughes were held scoreless.

The team advances to the regional playoffs, which is as far as Class A teams can go. The regional game will be with Fabens at some approximately equi-distant point to be determined, and will be played before June 5.

Beneficial Rains Fall On County

Beneficial rains have come to Briscoe County, brightening crop prospects and giving assistance to irrigation farmers who were in the process of pre-plant watering.

Range prospects should be greatly improved also, and should be in the process of greening at this time.

Rainfall was scattered over several days, with official daily measurements being .87, .29, .16 and .98 inches. The heaviest rains fell on Monday, and the total count for the period is a big 2.30 inches in the City of Silverton.

Most of the rural areas received upwards of 1.50 inches, and some reports reached as high as three inches.

More rain could be in sight, with a cold frontal passage expected to bring new moisture prospects.

Wayland Editor Due University Post

Jerry Williamson, editor of the literary magazine at Wayland Baptist College in Plainview, has been offered a graduate assistantship to a university, according to a recent announcement.

Williamson has been notified by the University of Utah at Salt Lake City that he has been accepted as a graduate assistant in English. The Wayland senior is an alternate for the National Defense Education Act there also. His \$2,300 stipend would include teaching two classes of freshman composition.

Farm Roads To Be Designated As A State Highway

Last January 25, a delegation representing the Panhandle-South Plains State Highway Committee went to Austin and met with the State Highway Commission to ask that the several highways from the Texas-Oklahoma state line to Post, Texas, be made a one number highway and be designated as a State Highway.

Bill Long, Bud House and County Judge M. G. Moreland represented Briscoe County at that meeting.

September 25, Judge Moreland received notification that the request was granted but that right-of-way would have to be widened to 120 feet where it was not already at least 100 feet. This meant that two sections of the Farm-to-Market Highway 284 Northwest of Silverton would have to be widened. These were from the intersection of FM 284 and State Highway 86, four miles west of Silverton, to Tule Canyon, thence North of the canyon to San Jacinto. The part through the canyon is wide enough. There is a total of nine miles to be widened.

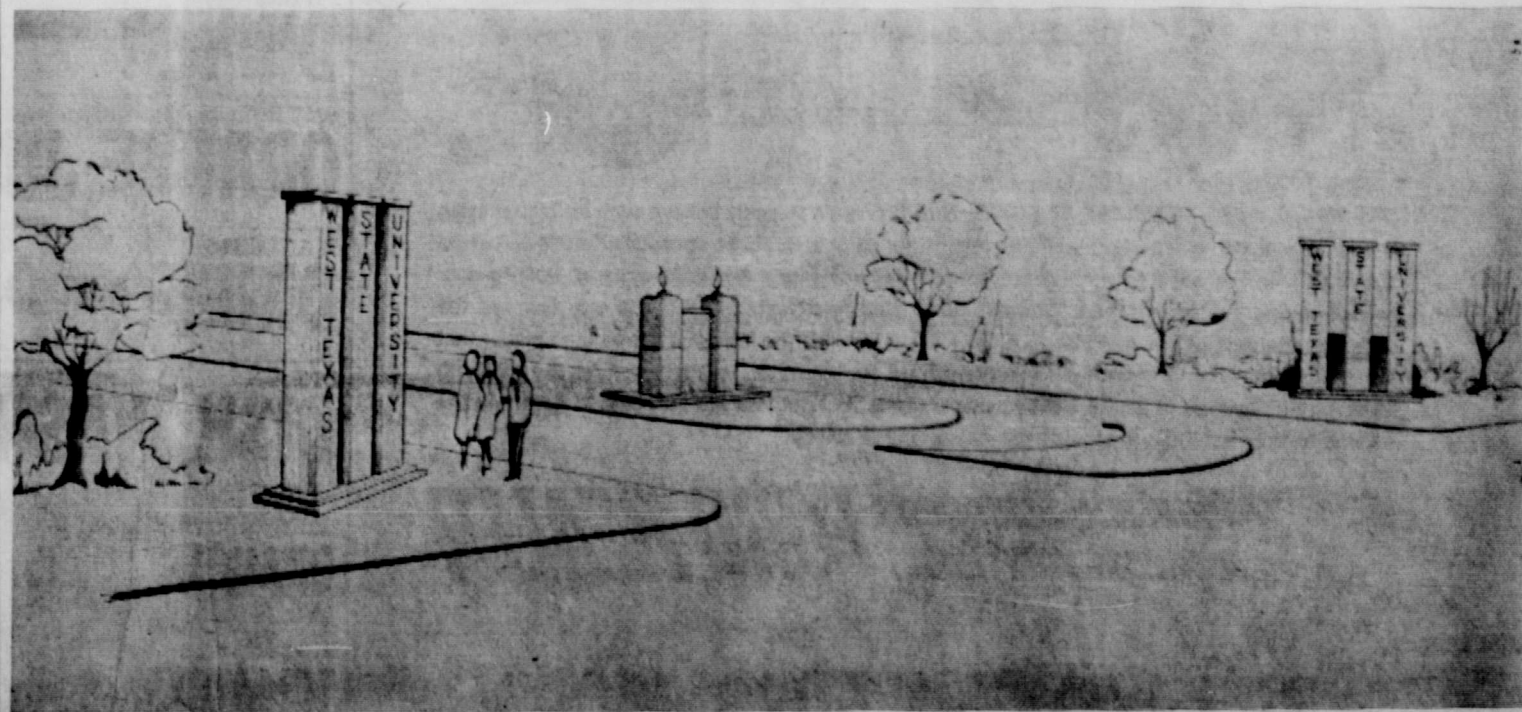
Students from Tulia and Quitaque will also be presented on these programs.

participants in County Eliminations Contest and then District Eliminations. But it was very rewarding for all who had a part in these activities. Some of the developments that have occurred in these active young people have been in learning some new knowledge, attitudes, and skills which will help them work with other young people and with adults more effectively and satisfyingly. These young people have had some opportunities to develop their basic urge to learn and to grow more mature through their associations and under the training of adults who enjoy working with young people and who believe in them and accept them as

near-equals with capacities and potential skills at almost adult levels. They understand and accept as a natural process in growing-up the temporary failures, frustrations and rebellion which young people experience. Yet they do recognize that young people still do have important growing-up learning to work on, and need adult guidance and direction in this unfinished business.

These outstanding adults who dedicate their time and energy helping youngsters deserve our gratitude and thanks.

Beware of motion sickness and nausea drugs. The U. S. Food and Drug Administration acted in March to warn against the use of certain drugs by pregnant women. These drugs, which are used for nausea, motion sickness, and vomiting may cause birth deformities if taken during pregnancy. The products are considered safe for other persons and are sold without prescription.

Action by the FDA was taken because certain of these products do not contain a statement warning women of the potential danger. Unless the companies change their labeling, they will be required to withdraw the products from the market.

With this evidence we want to urge all women that it is important never to take medicine, not even aspirin, while pregnant, without your doctor's approval. This is a fact of which all women are not aware. When a woman is pregnant, nothing—vitamin pills, medicines for upset stomach, headache prescriptions—should be taken without your doctor's consent.

If you want flowers in bloom from early spring until fall, plant some early blooming annuals and some that bloom later in the season up until frost. Most annuals are grown for cut flowers, although some may be for garden display or for drying for indoor use during winter.

As a general rule, sow seeds outside after the last killing frost. Seeds may rot before they germinate if planted while the soil is too cold (below 60 degrees F.). Exceptions, which can be planted in early spring are: baby's breath, cornflower, poppy, phlox, stock, strawflower, sweet alyssum and sweet pea.

Start seed indoors no sooner than 8 weeks before the danger of killing frost is over, otherwise plants may get too big for successful transplanting. Instead of growing your own plants indoors you may wish to buy seedlings from a nursery. When seedlings have developed two true leaves, it's time to transplant. Dig deeply under

seedlings and lift them from the container. Separate them, and transplant individually. If you buy plants in peat pots you can set the pot into garden soil and the roots grow right through the pot. Water and fertilize as needed. Ask an expert for advice on this, and you'll learn as you garden.

For spring parties that you want to be special, try this punch recipe from the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

1 quart boiling water
 1½ teaspoons black tea
 5 whole cloves

1 cup orange juice
 1 quart lime juice
 ½ cup lemon juice
 ½ cup liquid honey
 1 cup cold water

Pour boiling water over tea and cloves. Cover, let steep for five minutes, then strain. Combine tea with other ingredients and pour over cracked ice to chill. Garnish with thin orange slices, red cherries, or mint leaves. Makes 24 ½ cup servings.

Note: Limes add a distinctive flavor but if you cannot get them you may substitute an equal amount of lemon juice.

Office of School Desegregation Under Title VI of the Civil

Rights Law
Desegregation Plan in Effect
The Silvertown public school system is being desegregated under a plan adopted in accordance with

Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. The purpose of the desegregation plan is to eliminate from our school system the racial segregation of students and all other

forms of discrimination based on race, color, or national origin. Thirty-Day Spring Choice Period
Each student or his parent, or other adult person acting as parent, is required to choose the school the student will attend next year. In the Silvertown Independent School District there will be no choice because there is only one school, and all pupils, regardless of race, color or national origin, will attend this school.
All Other Aspects of Schools

or permission granted, by this school system for any students living in the community it serves to attend school in another school system, where this would tend to limit desegregation, or where the opportunity is not available to all students without regard to race, color or national origin. No arrangement will be made, or permission granted, by this school system for any students living in another school system to attend school in this system, where this would tend to limit desegregation, or where the opportunity is not available to all students without regard to race, color or national origin.

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Desegregated
All school - connected services, facilities, athletics, activities and programs are open to all on a desegregated basis. A student attending school for the first time on a desegregated basis may not be subject to any disqualification or waiting period for participation in activities and programs, including athletics, which might otherwise apply because he is a transfer student. All transportation furnished by the school system will also operate on a desegregated basis. Faculties will be desegregated, and no staff member will lose his position because of race, color or national origin. This includes any case where less staff is needed because schools are closed or enrollment is reduced.

Junior Club Hosts Foreign Students

"International Problems" was the topic of a panel discussion presented by Ann Zanella of Auch, France, Rolf Olofsson of Hogfors, Bygdea, Sweden, and Kaz Wierzbicki of Hastings, New Zealand, at the regular meeting of L. O. A. Junior Study Club Tuesday afternoon in the Production Credit Association community room.

Miss Zanella, who attends Lockney High School, expressed the opinion that France's attempt to get into the common market is the most pressing problem in her country today. Mr. Wierzbicki, who attends Floydada High School, indicated that attempts are underway to make his country more self-sufficient and that the government is encouraging private industry in order to decrease the amount of imports necessary to the country's economy. Mr. Olofsson, a student in Tullia High School, described his country's multi-party system of government.

The American Field Service students told about their families and homes abroad and described their first impressions of America and of Texas. They compared their schools, their home lives, and activities of teenagers in their homelands.

Mrs. Owen Thornton, president of the American Field Service at Lockney, and Mrs. Billy Staniforth of South Plains accompanied the Floydada and Lockney students to Silverton, and took part in the discussion period which followed.

3. Indifference (Hosea 6:6)
4. Worldliness (Hosea 7:8)
5. Corruption (Hosea 9:9)
6. Idolatry (13:2)

Edward Gibbon's "The History of the Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire" has long been one of the most quoted warnings to America. In 1787, Gibbon analyzed the fall of the powerful Roman Empire under five divisions, each of which has a duplicate in America today. The five reasons are: (1) rapid increase of divorce, and with it the destruction of the sanctity of the home upon which rests human society; (2) constant increase of taxes and wasteful

spending of public funds for free bread and circuses; (3) the mad craze for pleasure, with sporting events becoming more brutal and exciting each year; (4) the construction of gigantic armaments and, at the same time, failure to

realize that the real enemy is within the decadent people; (5) the decay of religion with faith fading into formalism, and professional religion losing touch with the people and their needs. Where does our nation stand?

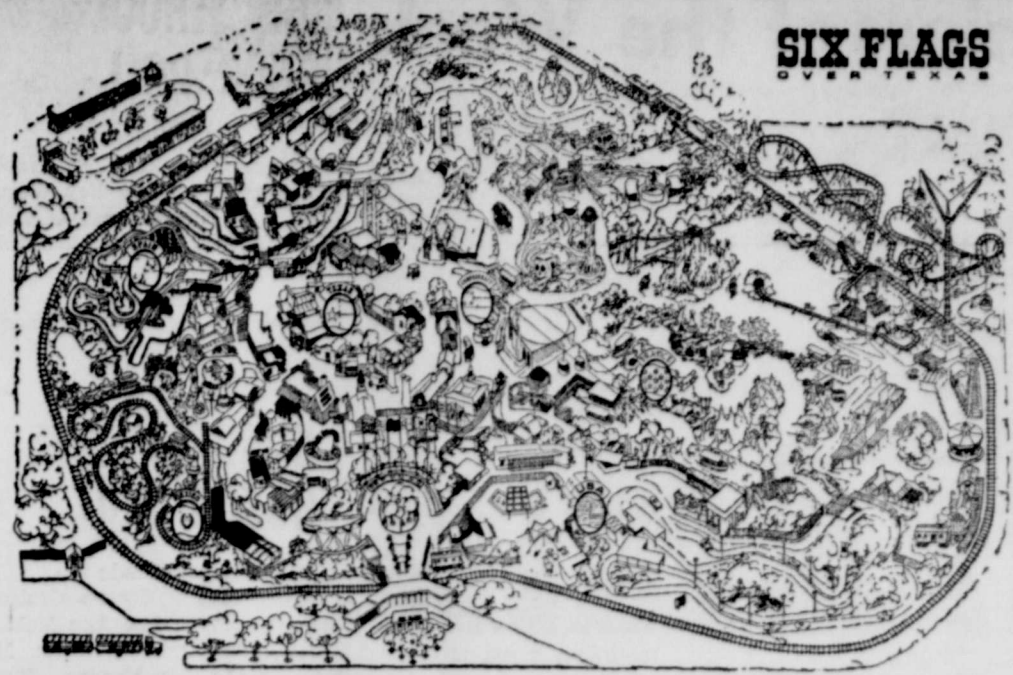

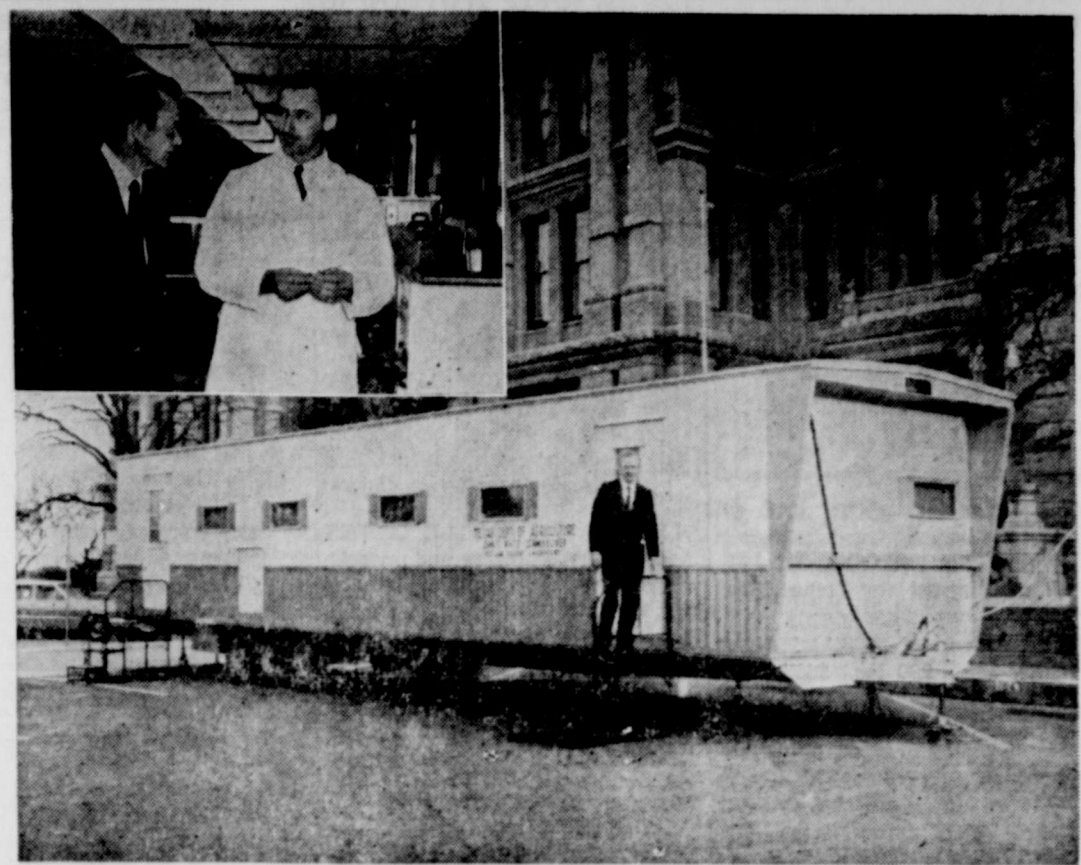
Mrs. Vaughan was baptized at the age of 13 years into the Methodist Church, and was a faithful member until her death.
