New Farm Road To Be Constructed

The Texas Highway Commission has approved the spending of \$70,000 for construction of new farm-to-market road mileage in Briscoe County as part of the 1966 FM Road Program.

District Engineer V. J. McGee said 4.0 miles in this county will be involved. The work will be under the supervision of T. Algie Groves, Engineering Technician, Matador, Texas.

The work authorized for this county is part of a 903.8 mile statewide farm-to-market road building program for 1966 as approved today by the Texas Highway Commission.

The project in Briscoe County extends from State Highway 86, 10 miles West of Silverton, North and East to a road intersection.
