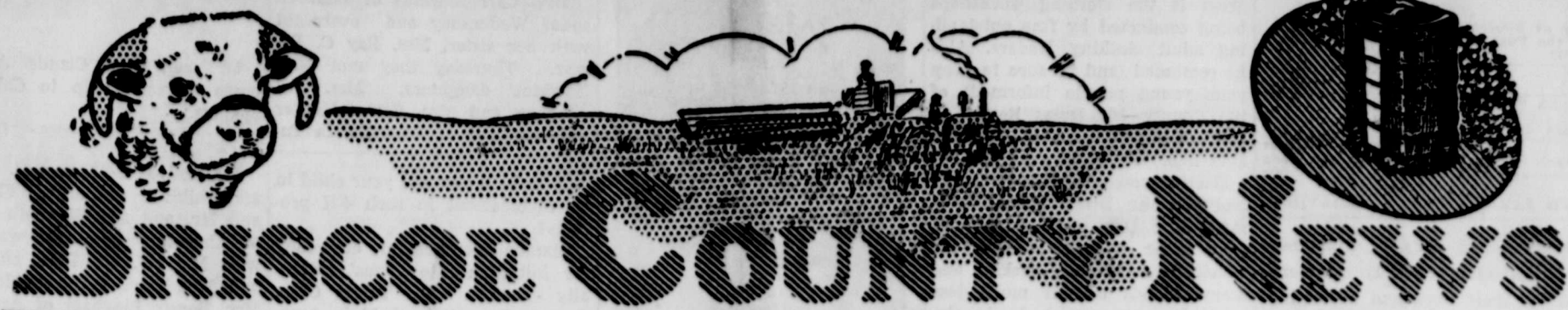

Research Indicates Time To Water Crops

Many years of irrigation research have led to the development of a number of basic principles farmers can use to decide the time and amount of water to apply to cotton and grain sorghum on the High Plains, says Leon Grosdidier, Briscoe County Agent. Scientists have found that cotton uses about one-tenth of an inch of water up to about the square stage. Then the plant's water consumption increases rapidly until it reaches a peak of from .25 to .4 inches per day at the peak bloom stage. Irrigation should be based on this water-use information, but, of course, it will be influenced by rainfall and the watering capability of the irrigation system. If only one irrigation will be

made, the agent says it should ideally go on at early peak bloom. Cotton to be irrigated twice or more during the summer has been found to produce more efficiently when the first irrigation is applied in the first white bloom period with the others following in the peak bloom period. More than ten years of studies at the South Plains Research and Extension Center, near Lubbock, indicate that a pre-plant plus two summer irrigations will produce the maximum net returns in the long run. Additional irrigations naturally increase per acre yields, but the yields do not increase proportionately with the amount of water added. Late irrigations are sometimes not paid for by the

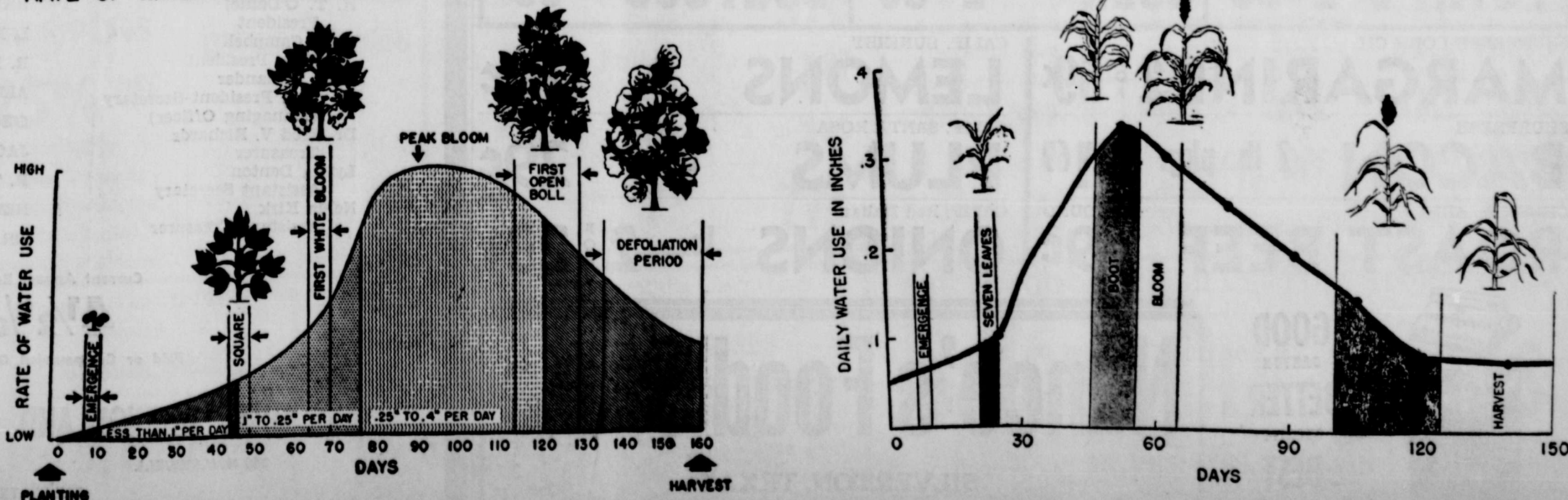
small increases in yield and they can lower the cotton's quality. Regardless of the number of irrigations following a pre-plant, the first application generally encourages excessive vegetative growth rather than fruiting. In every row irrigation, the highest yield per acre-inch of water has been obtained with a pre-plant plus one summer irrigation. "Even this efficiency may be increased along with increases in per acre yields with the same amount of water, by the use of alternate furrow irrigation," says Irrigation Specialist Bill Lyle of Lubbock. This permits more timely applications of limited water. Proper timing of irrigation is often more important than the total amount

applied, Lyle says. Grain sorghum irrigation is also important when planning the irrigation schedule on most area farms. Grain sorghum uses less than one-tenth of an inch of water per day up to about the seven-leaf stage and then the use rate increases rapidly. The peak water use of more than .3 inches per day comes between the boot and bloom stage. Research indicates the best grain sorghum yields are produced when available soil moisture is kept at or above about 45 percent of capacity from the pre-boot to the soft dough stage. This watering schedule is seldom the most profitable and it results in extremely inefficient

water use. Two well-timed seasonal irrigations will generally give good yields and probably near maximum net returns on grain sorghum. The agent says these two irrigations ideally should be applied at pre-boot and at the late-bloom stage. As with cotton, Grosdidier says research indicates one irrigation on grain sorghum gives the most efficient water use. If rainfall is short, the boot stage is the approximate time to apply the one irrigation. However, the agent said if conditions allow delaying this irrigation to the milk stage, research shows yields will be better even though earlier moisture stress may shorten the plant more than

a foot. No matter how many irrigations are applied, he says excessive early moisture followed by later moisture stress should be avoided on grain sorghum if possible. The agent explained that rapid elongation preceding the boot stage followed by moisture stress during grain development is likely to cause lodging as a result of charcoal rot. This irrigation research information may not always work as expected on any one farm, Grosdidier said. But local farmers can consider the basic ideas and apply those that fit into their water and crop situation.

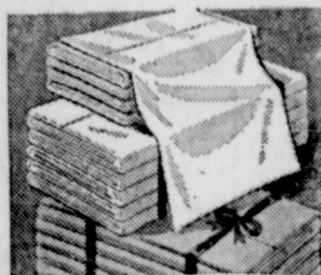

Mental Health Center To Serve This Area

Approval of a \$268,000 Federal grant for construction of a community mental health center in Plainview has been announced by the National Institute of Mental Health, U. S. Public Health Service.

The mental health center will be located on one floor of the Central Plains General Hospital now being planned.

An estimated 75,000 persons in the Hale, Floyd, Swisher, Briscoe and Motley county area will be served by the new center.

Inpatient service of 30 beds, emergency services and partial hospitalization will be provided on the ground floor of the proposed new hospital. Outpatient care, consultation and education will also be part of the new center's program.

When the center is completed, it will mark the first time a full range of mental health services has been available in this area.

Although the facility is located in the High Plains area of the Texas Panhandle, the center will be within one-hour driving time of all residents of the five-county service area.

Services may be extended to two additional counties later, bringing to 110,000 the number of persons in the catchment area.

Programs of the High Plains Training Center, which operates a sheltered workshop and educational training services for dis-

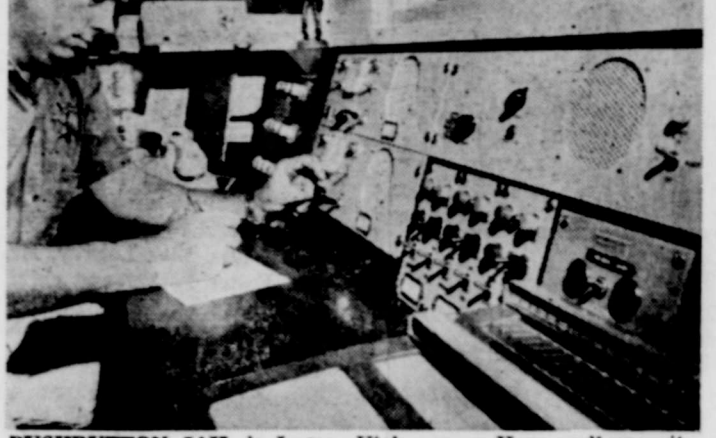
