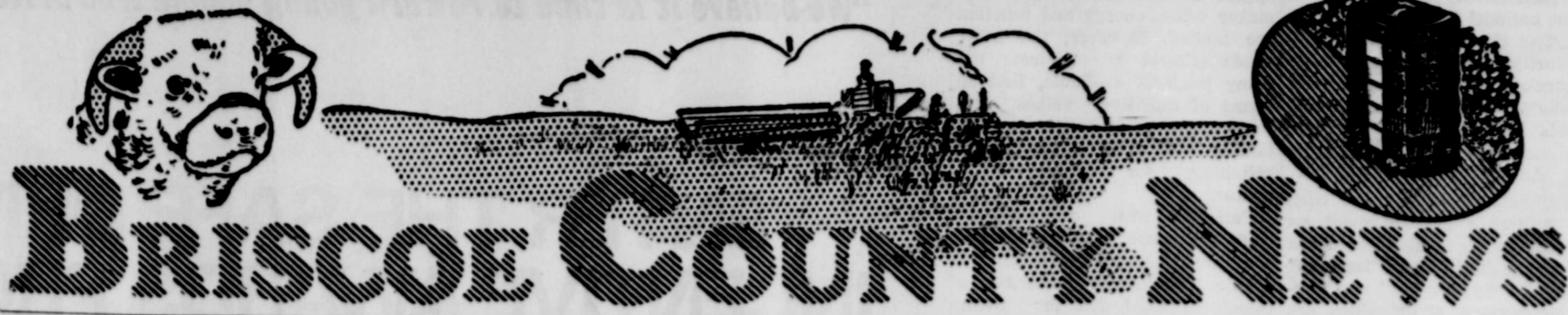
A similar demonstration was presented Wednesday afternoon to the Quitaque Home Demonstration Club by this agent.

Briscoe County Grain Production Up In 1965

Briscoe County's grain sorghum production for 1965 was 2,772,500 bushels according to final figures released by Grain Sorghum Producers Association. This was a gain of 720,500 bushels, or a 25% increase over the 1964 crop of 2,052,000 bushels.

This ranked it 28th in grain sorghum production among all

counties in Texas, according to Y. F. Snodgrass, South Plains representative for the Grain Sorghum Producers Association. Parmer County again led the state and nation in grain sorghum production with 18,683,500 bushels this past year. The trend for the past several years has been increased grain sorghum produc-

tion in this county and in Texas. Texas, the number one grain sorghum producing state, had a production of 285,740,000 bushels in 1965 which was 43% of the total grain sorghum produced in the nation. All Panhandle counties had increased grain sorghum production in 1965.

The 1965 grain sorghum crop was the largest ever in Texas and the Nation. National production was 696,062,000 bushels, 35% above last year and 21% above the five-year average. The biggest production shift came in the 13-county North Plains of Texas area which produced 81,111,600 bushels of grain sorghum in 1965 which was 12% of the national production and 21% of the Texas production.

The Coastal Bend area around Corpus Christi also registered increases in grain sorghum production. Nueces County moved up to the 4th place producer in the State with 12,784,000 bushels. Even in the heart of the traditional cotton area of the South Plains, grain sorghum showed gains. Lubbock County itself leaped from 4,715,000 bushels in 1964 to 6,104,000 bushels in 1965.

It is expected that the increasing grain sorghum production trend will continue this year, particularly in the North Plains, Coastal Bend and South Plains.

Along with these production increases, utilization of grain sorghum has steadily increased at home and abroad through intensive promotion program by Grain Sorghum Producers Association. When such programs were started in 1956, livestock use of sorghum was 179 million bushels; now it is 479 million. Exports in the same period have moved from 22 million bushels to over 200 million in 1965. The other major uses of grain sorghum, commercial and industrial, now promises to double with the opening of the new wet milling plant to be built at Dimmitt.

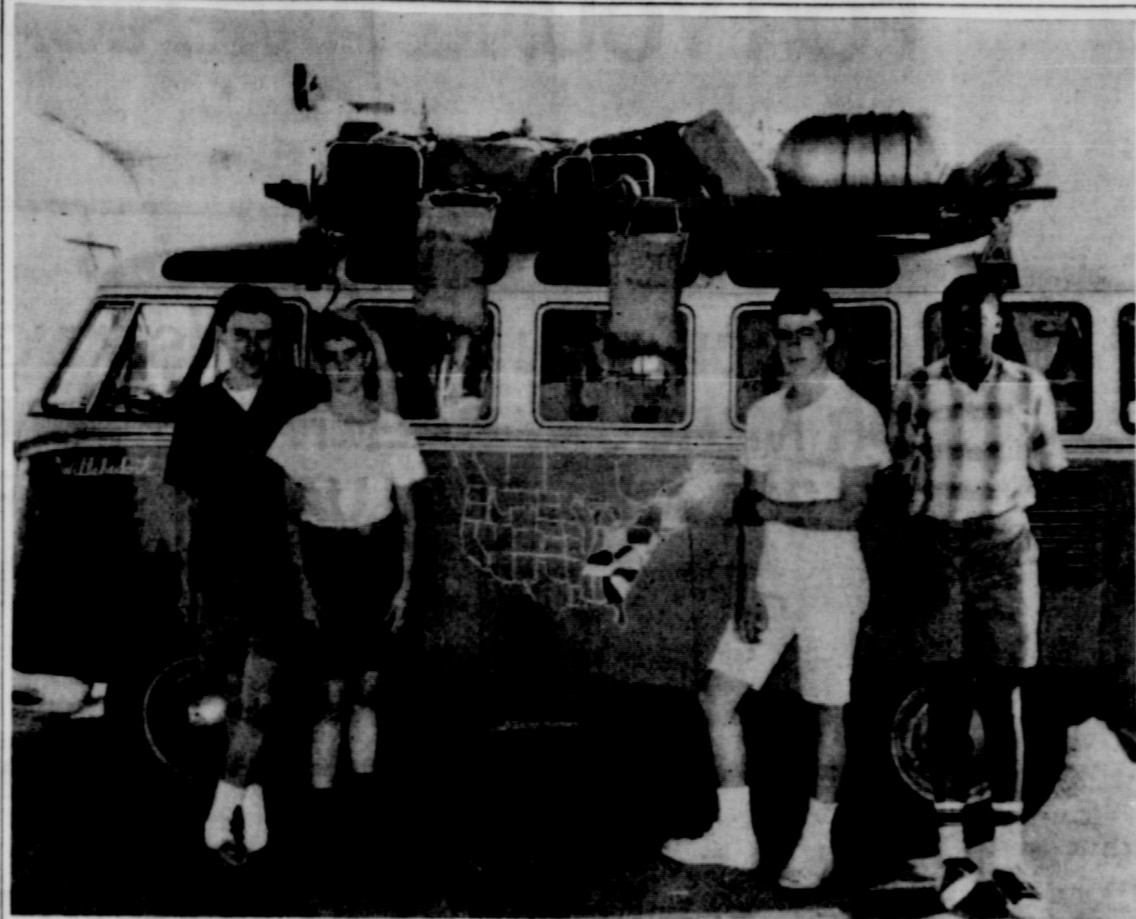

Conference. It is three years old and is sponsored by the Texas Law Enforcement and Youth Development Foundation. They are now being supported by the Hogg Foundation of Mental Health, Houston Endowment, and Sears Roebuck Foundation.

Approximately 13 million Americans are afflicted with arthritis and rheumatism, according to a recent national health survey conducted in the United States.

Arthritics are most susceptible to quackery and fadism, because knowledge and treatment of arthritis is limited. Texas regional staff members of the Food and Drug Administration emphasize. They estimate that more than \$250 million a year is spent on such useless cures as filtered sea water, alfalfa tablets, "immune" milk, "glorified aspirin" and similar concoctions, all of which are rejected by medical science.

This means that \$50 a year of misplaced hope is spent by the average arthritis sufferer.

While no specific diet in itself will cure arthritis, it is important to follow good basic nutrition, national and state Extension nutritionists emphasize.

All foods needed for the arthritis patient can be found in local

food markets. The alluring array of modern convenience foods may appear to be a boon to the homemaker whose energy and function are limited. However, the home needs criteria to evaluate the many products available, first in terms of nutritive values and costs and then in terms of palatability, keeping qualities and suitability for use in family menus.

Patients with osteoarthritis, gout and some other rheumatic conditions may be overweight. A physician generally prescribes a calorie-restricted diet for them. Weight control is of special importance for persons with arthritis, since extra pounds put an added burden on the weight-bearing joints, aggravate the pain, make movement more difficult and may even accelerate the progress of the disease.

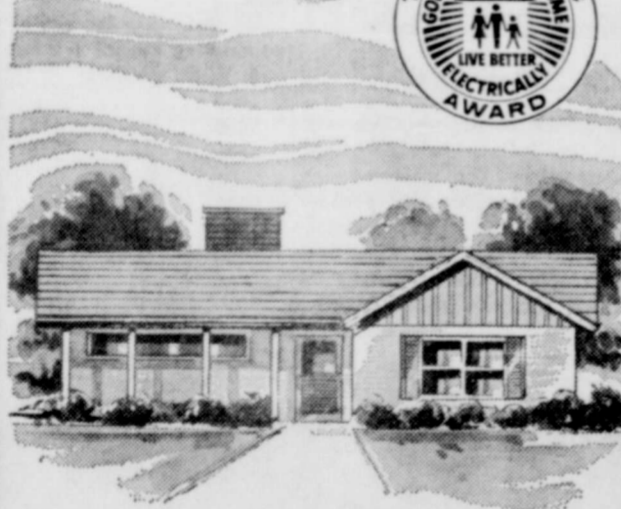

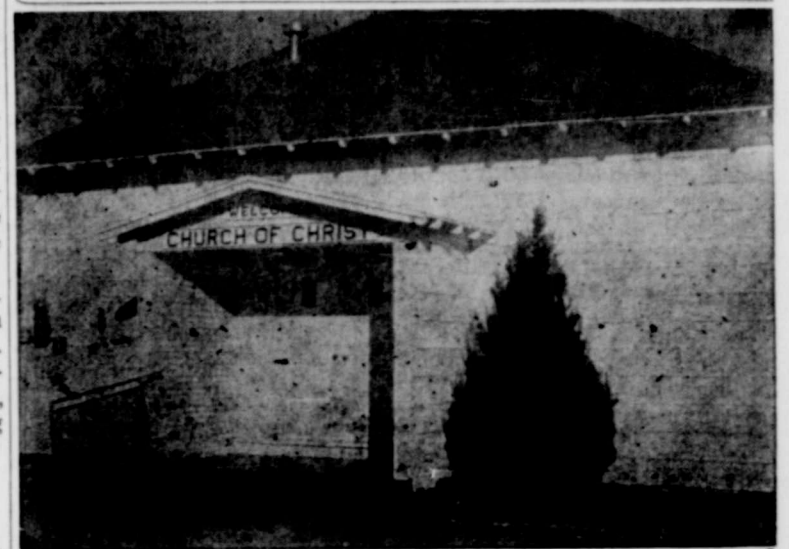
