## Maturity Date Nears For 1965 Cotton Loans

Farmers have until the close of business on August 1 to redeem their 1965-crop cotton which is under Commodity Credit Corporation loans, Louie Kitchens, chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, said today.

The chairman explained that growers who have 1965-crop upland and extra long staple cotton under loan may redeem their crop at any time through August 1 by paying off the loan plus charges and interest. Any of the cotton on which loans have not been repaid by that time will be acquired by CCC, but this does not include cotton on which CCC may call loans on an earlier date or cotton on which there is a basis for a claim against the producer.

As provided in the loan agreements, CCC will not pay for any market value which the cotton may have in excess of the amount of the loan plus charges and interest.

According to the chairman, advance notice is given that the 1965 crop cotton will be acquired by CCC after August 1 so that borrowers may have sufficient time to redeem their cotton and mills and merchants will be able to obtain additional cotton they may need from the loan before that date.

The August 1 deadline applies to all 1965-crop cotton under loan, including cotton represented by warehouse receipts sent to a local bank at the request of the producer on a purchaser of the equity. This cotton may be redeemed by paying the bank not later than the close of business on August 1.

Through July 1, a total of 6,965,234 bales of 1965-crop cotton were reported pledged for loans. As of the same date, 1,528,992 bales had been redeemed, leaving loans outstanding on 5,352,298 bales.

### Patrol Issues Accident Report

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated five accidents on rural highways in Briscoe County during the month of June, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one death, three persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$15,585.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1966 shows a total of 13 accidents resulting in two persons killed, 12 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$26,355.00.

The number of traffic deaths in Texas continues to rise. For the first six months of 1966 there have been 1470 traffic deaths compared to 1325 traffic deaths for the first months of 1965. This 11% increase is very alarming, and chances are it will become very critical because of vacation months and holiday periods still ahead to intensify the magnitude of the accident picture.

The Sergeant stated, "It is estimated that at the end of 1966 traffic deaths in Texas will increase about 10% over 1965 which means approximately 3300 persons will be killed in traffic accidents." The Sergeant added one other comment, "To control accidents, we must first learn to control ourselves."

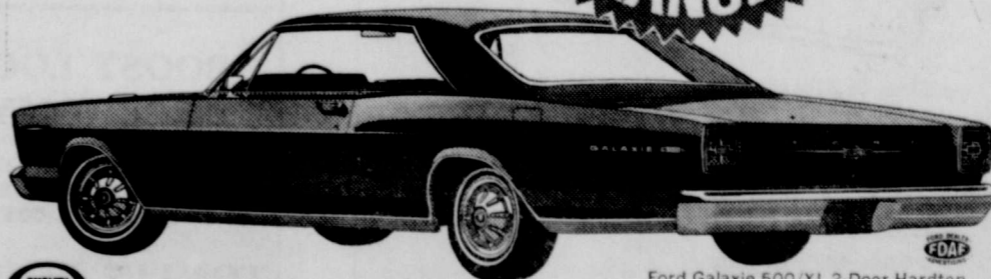

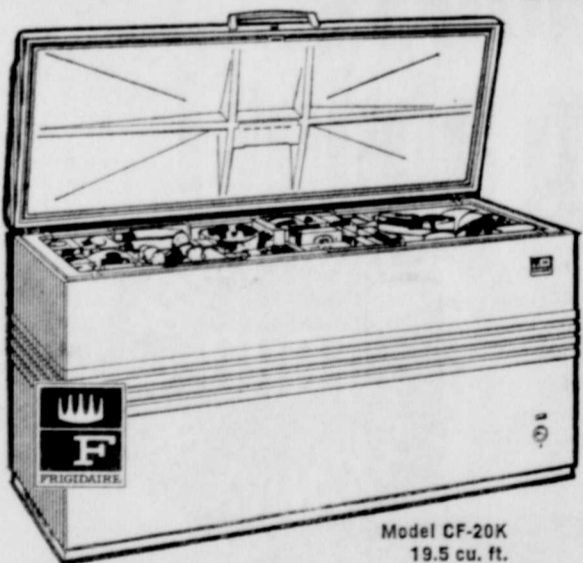
