

# HOME NOTES

To focus attention on the farm and home safety problem the week of July 24-30 has been proclaimed as National Farm Safety Week by the President. We are all asked to recognize and vigorously attack the hazards and unsafe practices that cause farm and home accidents. Public acceptance of safety as a part of every activity in daily living could improve human performance and remove many environmental hazards often related to accidents.

Accidents are caused. Since they are caused they can be prevented. Therefore, let us each make a determined effort toward the vital task of reducing accidents at work, in the home, at recreation, and on the roadways.

No pesticide container is ever completely empty, so if you keep them, lock them away.

If you have only a few smaller containers (quart size or less) or two or three "bug bomb" aerosol pushbutton cans around the house, you may think that special storage is unnecessary. Pesticide products in any size can be hazardous to anyone, especially children who come in contact with them without knowledge of their content.

A central storage area with a lock for the "pesticide door" is a very important and inexpensive purchase.

After the pesticide products are locked away, keep the key in a place where only adults will be able to find it.

If you do not like to build things, an army footlocker from a surplus store or any lockable container will do.

The grape harvest season has arrived. You should find several varieties at your favorite food market this week to aid you in menu planning.

The pale green Thompson seedless grapes are plentiful now. You will also find good quality red cardinal and early-season black grapes on the market.

Look for grapes that are plump, fresh-looking, bright in color and have well-formed bunches with mature berries firmly attached to the stem. High color for the variety indicates good sugar content and flavor. White or green grapes are at their best in flavor and sweetness when they begin to turn amber. Dark-colored grapes should be free of any green tinge.

Grapes are a fragile, highly perishable delicacy. Buy them in small quantities and use them within a day or two. If you plan to keep them several days, sort them carefully, and refrigerate them.

For table use, wash grapes in a colander or hold the cluster directly under running water. Turn and shift them so that each berry is washed. Pick off any berries that are overripe or imperfect.

You can use grapes in salads and desserts or in colorful centerpieces.

Good fruit choices this week besides grapes are peaches, plums, cherries and bananas. Cantaloupes and watermelons are in fairly good supply, too.

Hot weather has slowed down the volume on most locally-grown vegetables.

Beef is still the best overall red meat value. Fryers are expected to be among meat counter specials.

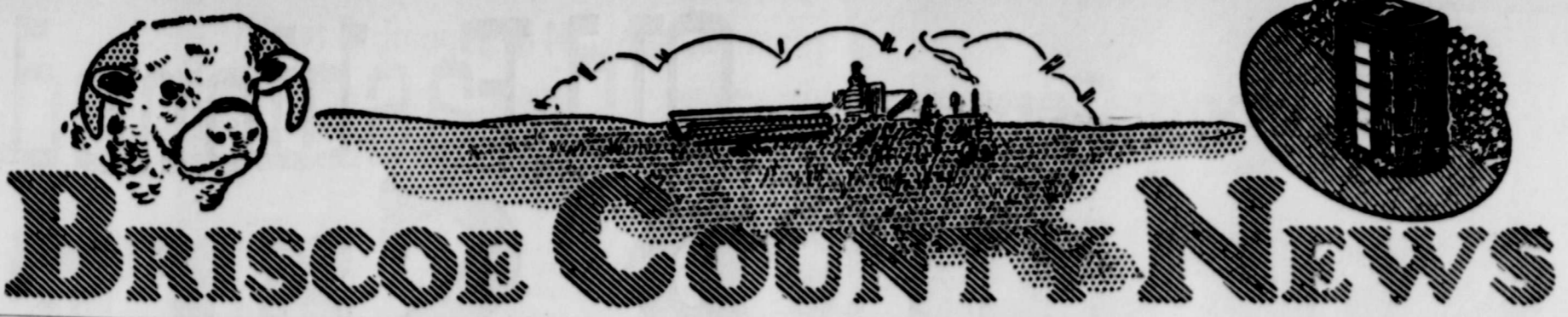
Dianne Davis shares with us a refreshment idea using Thompson seedless grapes.

2. Soften a 4-oz. package of cream cheese (use a small quantity of cream or whole milk if desired)
3. Coat the grapes with cheese.
4. Chill and serve.

## Boundaries Set For Committee Elections

Louie Kitchens, chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, today designated the boundaries of each community within the county where elections of ASC community committees will be held on September 7, 1966. The elections will be by mail on September 7, 1966.

Boundaries of the various communities where elections will be held will be the same as in previous years, except community F (Antelope) has been combined with community E. Community E will now be all the land north of the Tulia Highway (No. 96) and east to the Caprock.

The Chairman reminded farmers that the elections will choose three committeemen and two alternates for each community. The chairman, vice - chairman, and third regular member of the elected ASC committee will also serve as delegates to the county convention to be held soon thereafter, where farmers will be elected to fill vacancies on the ASC county committee. The alternate com-

mitteemen will serve as alternate delegates to the convention.

Farmers eligible to cast ballots in the election will be all those who are eligible to participate in one or more of the national farm programs which the committeemen help to administer locally. The farmer may be an

owner, tenant, or sharecropper. Persons not of legal voting age who are in charge of the farming operations on an entire farm are also eligible to vote in the elections. Eligibility to vote—or to hold office as a committeeman—is not restricted by reason of race, color, creed, or national origin.

## ASC County Committee Nominations Invited

A call for the "best men available" to serve on the ASC community committees was issued today by Louie Kitchens, chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee. Slates of nominees for membership on ASC Community Committees soon will be established at the ASCS county office.

"The committee system is the backbone of farm programs," the chairman declared. "Its responsibilities include the conservation of natural resources, the stabilization of agricultural commodities and price-support activities which protect and improve farm income. We need the best possible cross-section of farmers to insure effective administration of the various measures."

The chairman pointed out that any local resident who is eligible to take part in an ASCS farm program may vote, and he may hold office as a committeeman regardless of race, color, creed or national origin. Further information regarding qualifications of committeemen is available at the ASCS county office.

Farmers who are eligible to vote in the community committee elections also have the right to nominate as candidates for committee membership any farmer

who is eligible and willing to serve. Such petitions, each one nominating one farmer and signed by six or more eligible voters, may be filed at the county office any time before August 12, 1966. Eligible voters may sign as many petitions as they wish. Additional nominations may be made by the incumbent ASC community and county committees. These committees, in their selection of nominees, will make every effort to see to it that their list of candidates reflects the racial composition of farmers in the county.

The election of ASC community committees throughout Briscoe County will be held September 7, 1966, by mail. Each community election will choose three community committeemen and two alternates. The regular members elected will serve as delegates to

## Emergency Loans Available in County

Briscoe County has been designated eligible for emergency loans, according to Donald B. Cruce, county supervisor of the Farmers Home Administration in Tulia.

Any established farmer or rancher in a designated area is eligible if he (1) is a citizen of the United States, (2) is unable to obtain from other lenders the credit required to continue his normal operations, (3) has reasonable prospects for success with the assistance of a loan, and (4) possesses the legal capacity to contract for the loan.

Loans may be made for the purchase of feed, seed, fertilizer, replacement of equipment and livestock; for other essential farm and home operating expenses; and for the replacement or repair of buildings, fences, on individual farms that were damaged or destroyed by the disaster.

Further information concerning emergency loans may be obtained at the part-time office of the Farmers Home Administration on Tuesday mornings in Silverton on the second floor of the courthouse.

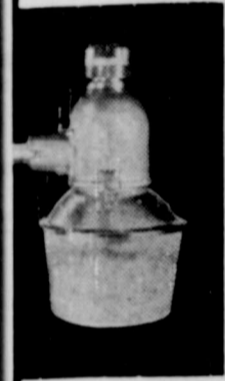


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## Miss Lynda Elliott and Mr. Stanley Fogerson Vows Exchanged In Matador Ceremony

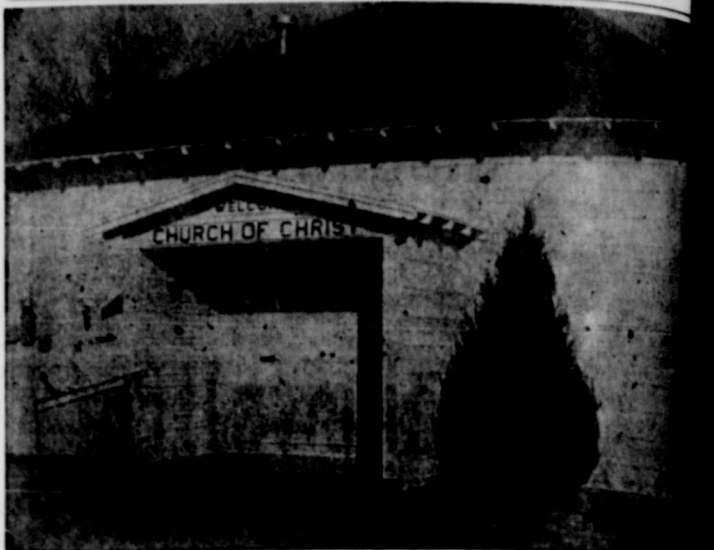
