The Collect will be led by Mrs. James Ross Alexander and the President's Welcome will be given by Mrs. Ronald Dale Kitchens.

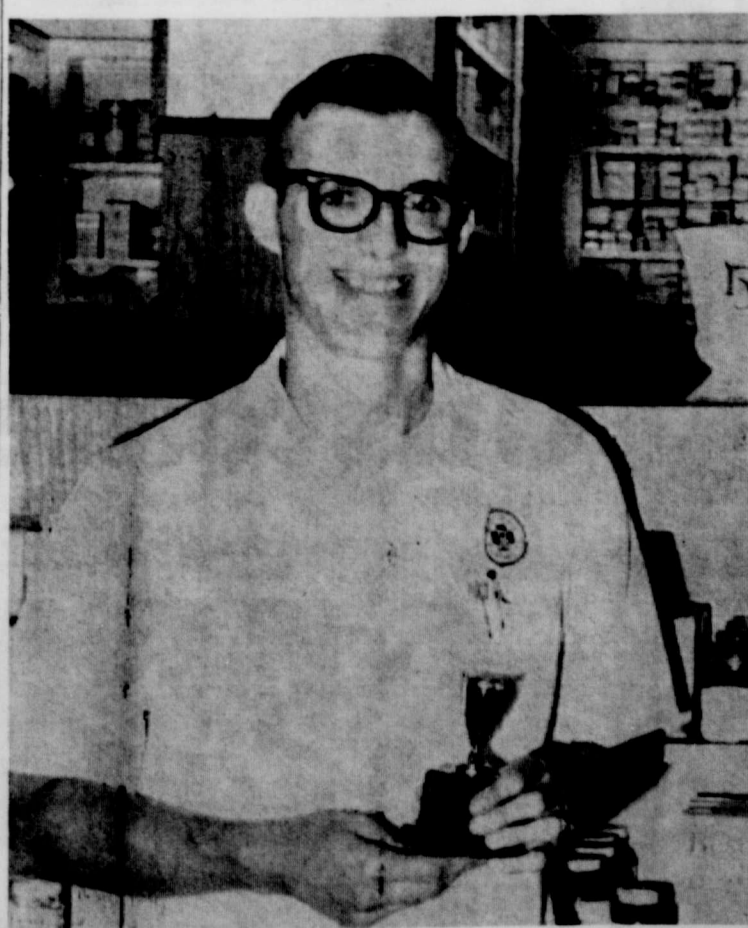

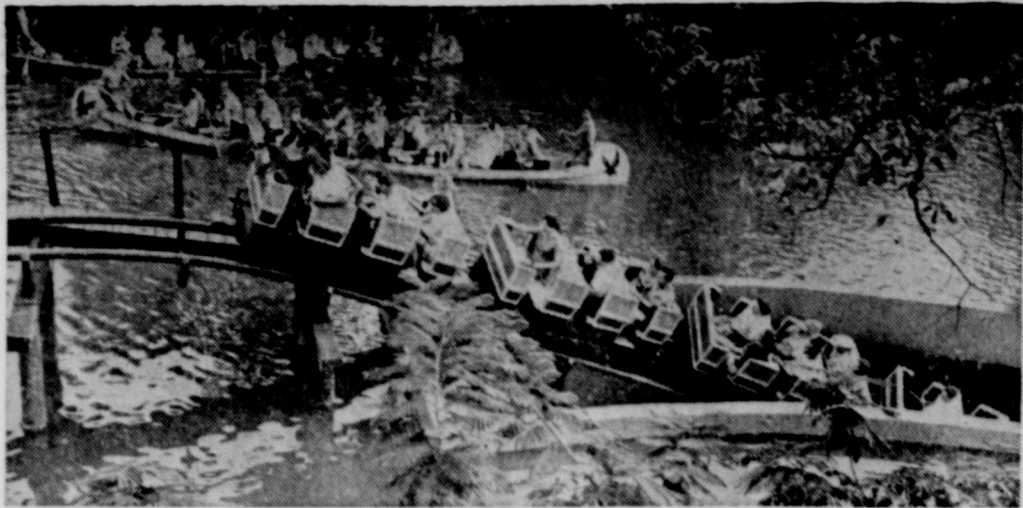

Emerging from an underwater tunnel at a speed of 38 feet per second, past startled passengers aboard the Caddo War Canoes, is Six Flags Over Texas' newest ride, the Run-A-Way Mine Train. Built at a cost of \$1,000,000, the exciting ride, which just opened, is situated in the Boom Town Section of the famed historical-theme park located midway between Dallas and Fort Worth.

NEW \$1,000,000 RIDE PREMIERES AT SIX FLAGS

Arlington, Texas: The most ambitious and expensive attraction ever built at Six Flags Over Texas, the Run-A-Way Mine Train, was unveiled at the famed historical theme park located midway between Dallas and Fort Worth.

Situated in the Boom Town Section of the 115-acre park, the ride, costing \$1,000,000, opened after more than a year of research, development and construction.

Covering about an acre of wooded grounds along the banks of Johnson Creek, which flows through Six Flags, "The Run-A-Way Mine Train" tracks extend in a twisting pattern for 2,484 ft.

A capsule version of the trip begins when passengers are taken for an excursion through the "Great Southwest Mining Company's" property in ore cars.

The cars are propelled through a series of lifts up to 35 feet

high by pulleys and gravity. The train, gathering speed, reacts as if it is out of control, reaching a maximum speed of 38 feet per second.

The train races across a bridge through open cuts, crossing over and under the tracks where the two narrow-gauge steam engines regularly travel. It passes through a hotel lobby, dives down a shaft into a 150-foot-long curving tunnel built underneath the water and emerges in the middle of the "Caddo River" domain of the Indian War Canoes. From there, the cars glide gently back to the depot.

Some interesting facts and figures are that a force of slightly under 2 G's is exerted as the train races through the curving 150-foot-long tunnel under the water; each train consists of five ore cars capable of carrying six passengers each or 30 passengers per train. Construction of

the ride involved 2,000 yards of poured concrete, 165,000 feet of reinforced steel, 85,000 feet of electrical wire and conduit, 350 telephone poles for supports and piling, 110,000 square feet of redwood, cedar and pine lumber. Some 443 electrical connections are contained in the console to operate the ride. The loading depot contains 30 tons of air conditioning for the comfort of passengers waiting to board the train. About 150 kw's (150,000 watts) of electrical power per hour are consumed by the ride (equivalent to the amount of power used in one hour by 30 three-bedroom homes).

Six Flags' operating schedule for the remainder of the 1966 season is that the Park will be open seven days a week through September 5; thereafter, until closing on November 27, the Park will be open on Saturdays and Sundays only.

HOME NOTES

Almost before we knew it, the air was full of footballs, the school yard was full of kids, and Fall will soon be knocking at the door.

It's an exciting season, but an expensive one. The theme of the State Extension Conference last week on "Mobilizing Our Potentials in a Changing World" was certainly a timely one. They were challenging and inspiring us as educators but I'm hoping to challenge you as a consumer.

According to all statistics food is still our best buy. In these days of inflation everything has increased percentage-wise a great deal more than has food. But we still need to use all our resources to live according to the standard we desire within our income.

Perhaps sharing some of Mrs. Gwen Clyatt, Extension Food Specialist's shopping tips with you will prove useful.

"Fresh" is the key guide to use as you shop for produce.

Quality is at the highest and prices are at the lowest during the peak season of production. The secret of smart shopping is to buy vegetables that look fresh, then take good care of them.

The refrigerator is the best place to store fresh vegetables. The shorter the time between market basket and your refrigerator, the better quality vegetables you can serve to your family.

Besides produce, food shoppers have a wide variety of choices when shopping the frozen foods department for concentrated fruit drinks. Your choices range from lemonade to fruit drinks or punch to fruit juices.

If you select juices, you have only juices, and very fine pulp. There's no water added. The label will indicate if sugar has been added. Cocktails and nectars are usually mixtures of juices and pulps with water and in some instances sugar and seasonings.

Fruit drinks may be artificially

flavored and contain none of the natural fruit. Others may contain some fruit juice. Fruit punch is a mixture of juices. The combination of juices is shown on the label with one named first in the greatest amount.

Instant and powdered drinks and liquid concentrates contain fruit or imitation flavor, fruit acid, and added color. Some are packed with sugar, and you add the water.

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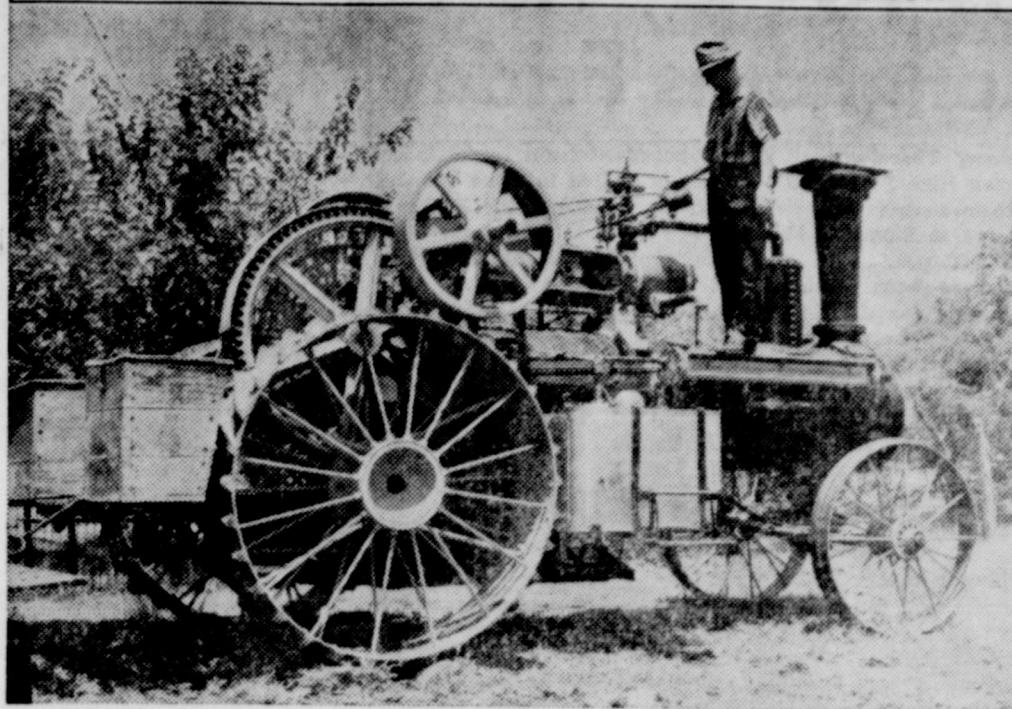

Mrs. Billie Carr is the new home economics teacher. She has been a home demonstration agent for the past five years, and this is her first year of teaching.

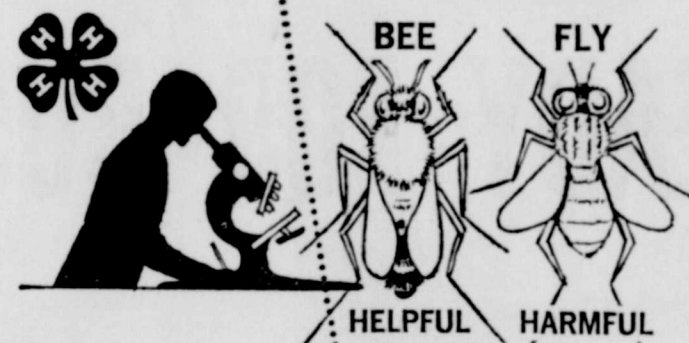

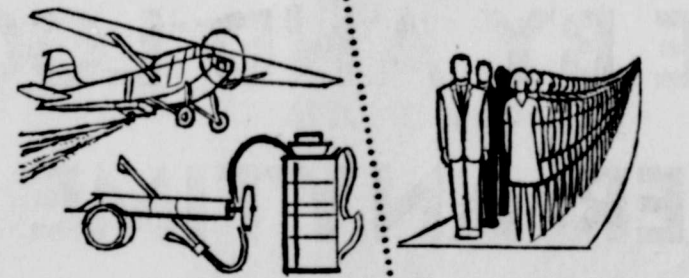

Despite widespread use of control measures, insects cause about \$12 billion damage annually to U. S. livestock and crops. Moreover, the damage is done by only one percent of the 700,000 different insects known to man.

To help lessen this destruction are 4-H youngsters who are fascinated by bugs, worms and butterflies. They are busy with entomology projects set up by the Cooperative Extension Service and carried on with the assistance of local 4-H Club leaders, conservationists and other specialists in this area.

Future career opportunities are virtually limitless. Girls with butterfly nets and boys with glass jars in which to snare their catch may one day be scientists, teachers, researchers, manufacturers, accountants or salesmen. Scores of different jobs are related to the entomological field.
