



24 MILLION 4-H'ers SCORE WITH 8 MILLION PROJECTS



M ORE than 24 million 4 H boys and girls are expected to complete 8 million individual projects this year, an average of about four projects per member.

The statistics, supplied by the Cooperative Extension Service, represent a lot of ingenuity and initiative. All 4-H projects, meetings and events must be worked in among school, church,

home chores and part-time jobs.

There are a possible 100 different projects or activities available to youngsters between 9 and 19 years old from coast to coast, depending on where they live, their needs, resources and interests. Most center around specific projects in foods, home improvement, safety, health, livestock, clothing, home and farm management, leadership and community service. Certain standards and goals have to be reached.

To group overall accomplishments into one recognition program, the Extension Service developed the national 4-H Achievement program. In this program, one boy and girl from each state

is selected annually for having the most outstanding 4-H record.

Fifty win trips to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago
the first week of December. Twelve will receive national \$500 scholarships, and nearly 10,000 are expected to earn county achievement medals.

Sponsor of the achievement awards for the last 15 years is the Ford Motor Company Fund. During the 4-H Congress, Ford will host a luncheon and entertainment for the entire delegation of 2,300 delegates and guests.

Highlights of two 1965 winners' accomplishments are examples of what can be expected from the top 1966 records. An 18-year-old Alabama girl excelled in more than a dozen projects including food preservation, sewing, cooking, home improvement, dairy animals, demonstrations and exhibits.

She is now a sophomore at the University of Alabama. Her future goal is a medical career.

Home Notes

by Becky Hall Home Demonstration Agent

This week is Consumer Education Week and much emphasis is being placed on ways the homemaker can beat the grocer's cash register. According to Esther Peterson, President Johnson's special assistant on consumer affairs, variety and planning are the keys for homemakers who want to buy to make the most of a dollar. Part of this planning includes:

-shop weekly specials -buy when supplies are plen-

-try lower priced brands and

-make a list and stick to it -substitute - day old bread, powdered milk, cheaper cuts of meat, specials, and meat substitute dishes

-figure the cost per ounce, per pound, or per serving

"There's no limit to how much one can spend and how much one can save," said Mrs. Peterson. Unfortunately, research shows that those who need most to know how to shop -teen-age brides, poor families, and the uneducated know least how to do it.

To help offset rising food costs, plan more of your menus around items slightly lower or about the same in price as this time last

The half-dozen foods tagged plentiful this November by the U. S. Department of Agriculture show up well under such price comparisons, points out the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The plentifuls include the traditional favorites of the season turkey, pork, pears, grapes, raisins and dry beans.

Farm prices of turkeys and hogs have been running slightly below a year ago, according to market reports of USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service.

Turkey production hit a record high for the fourth consecutive year and is up about 11 million birds from last year.

Pork production is increasing more than it usually does in the fall, reflecting the 10 percent larger spring pig crop now coming

About 47 percent more pears are produced than last year, and 22 percent more dry beans.

Fresh grapes and raisins are a fifth above average output.

Nine New Books Added To Library

Nine new books have been received by the Silverton High School Library as gifts from the American Heritage Program sponsored by Wayland Baptist College. Previously two other books had been donated to the school library by the college. These books are available to all the high school students, but they are of special interest to those students enrolled in history courses.

Two of the new books were written by Bruce Catton. Catton is noted for his study of the Civil War and both volumes in the library deal with this subject. One is entitled "This Hallowed Ground" and the other "Never Call Retreat." Another of the new volumes presented by Wayland is a 1963 Pulitzer Prize winner entitled "The Guns of August" by Barbara Tuchman. This book deals with the events leading up to World War I. Four books concerning World

War II were also gifts. One was

"Day of Infamy" by Walter Lord. This book relates the bombing of Pearl Harbor in December, 1941. The second, "The Wooden Horse," by Eric Williams tells the exciting story of an escape from a German concentration camp. Cornelius Ryan's "The Longest Day," a third, describes the landing on the Normandy coast on D-Day. A movie was made from this fascinating book as well as one from David Westheimer's "Von Ryan's Express." This is a fictionalized account of an escape from Nazi Germany. One biography and one general source book were also received. The biography, "Captain Cortez Conquers Mexico," by William Johnson gives an insight into the life of the conquerer of the Aztecs. The reference book, "The History of the United States Flag" by Milo Quaife and associates, deals with the development of our nation's flag and also of several of our state flags. This book should prove useful not only to the high school students and faculty, but to the junior high and elementary school personnel as well.

These books were given as a result of Silverton High School's participation in the American Heritage Program. The books were selected by the Silverton director of the program, Zobie Self-Silverton is again going to participate in the program and it is expected that, as a result, more needed volumes of history will be added to the school's library.

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

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
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
