

Clarification keeps many farmers afloat

A farm credit provision passed by Congress last week corrects a misinterpretation of new borrowing restrictions on farmers seeking loans at critical planting time.

The 90-day grace period allows farmers time to gain approval under original credit rules. Without the provision, new farm bill credit provisions intended to target habitually-delinquent borrowers would have stopped the approval of many farm operating loans.

The provision effects only those whose loans were being processed at the time the new farm bill was passed April 4.

"A farmer's payday doesn't come about until harvest and sale of his crops, and a year of bad weather or poor markets can throw a loan payment off schedule," said U.S. Rep. Larry

Combest, R-Lubbock, among 13 House members who co-sponsored the clarification provision. "Passage of this correction addresses farmers for this loan season, but I am working on introducing legislation that will prevent the problem from recurring like a weed each planting season. I want to ensure that credible, hard-working producers will not be put out of business due to inappropriate loan eligibility policies. A borrower who is operating in good faith and can fully prove the means to repay loan balances at an agreed time, shouldn't be held in limbo."

Michael Cumpton, an ag specialist with the Texas Farm Service Agency in College Station, said that original interpretations of the farm bill credit provisions left "no latitude" to work with farmers who have

Eradication Foundation files lawsuits

ABILENE — As a result of the continued failure or refusal of some individuals to pay their 1995 annual assessments for the boll weevil eradication program, the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation has filed the first of a series of lawsuits to enforce collection.

"Some of these assessments have gone unpaid since June of last year," said Frank Myers, executive director of the foundation. "The board decided it was time to take legal action."

The first suits were filed Thursday in Taylor County Court in Abilene against delinquent individuals in the High

Church program responds to families housing needs

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Garbarino headed for state meet

ODESSA — Like many, Daniel Garbarino wasn't interested in seeing on the other side of 40.

A time of over 40 seconds in the 300-meter hurdles at the Region 1-3A track meet would have jeopardized the Muleshoe High School senior's chances of returning to the state meet, sending him into early prep retirement.

Garbarino finished under 40 seconds in both heats, winning the region title Saturday with a time of 39.77 in the blistering heat at Ratliff Stadium.

"This is where I run my best races," said Garbarino after defending his region title.

Garbarino said he still has some unfinished business at state after a finishing a disappointing eighth last year.

"I still have something to prove to myself," Garbarino said. "Being eighth in the state (last year) wasn't good enough. I want to stand on the (award) stand in Austin and look out at everybody. I'd like to win state, but sometimes that doesn't happen."

Garbarino also finished sixth in the high jump, clearing 6-4, helping Muleshoe finish in a tie for 11th with 17 points. He didn't make the finals in either the 110 hurdles or the long jump.

Chad Johnson added the other six points for Muleshoe, finishing third in the shot with a throw of 51-3.

Sprinter Ruben Martinez led Littlefield to the boys title. Martinez captured the 100

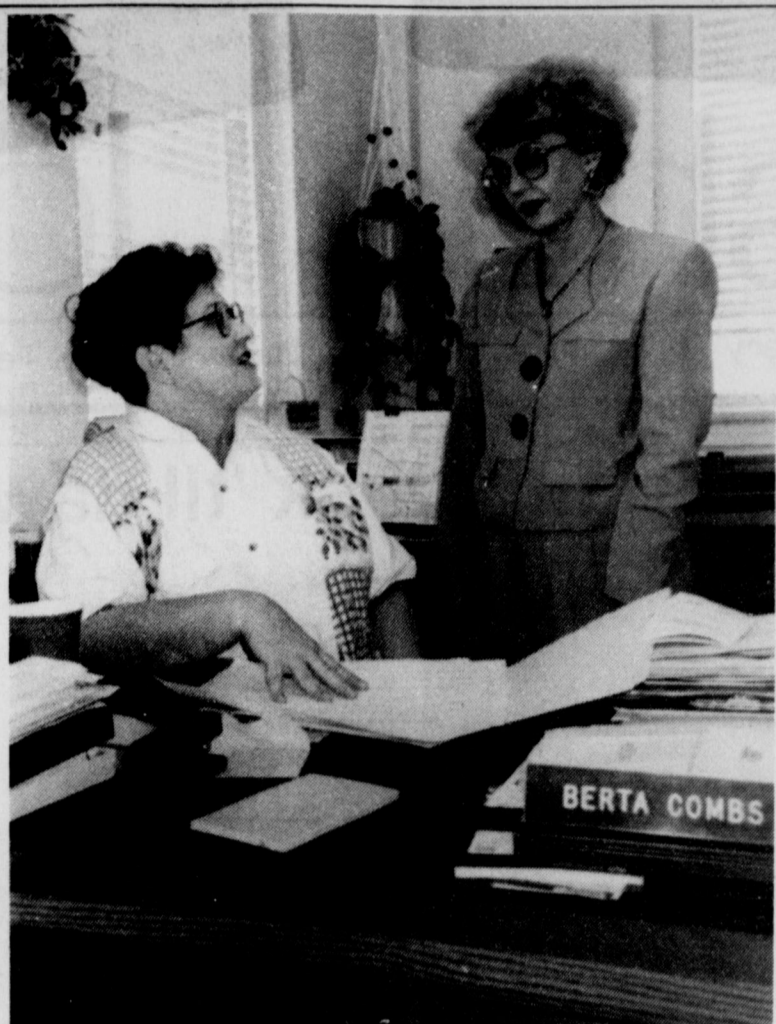

had minor repayment troubles in the past.

Local and state agencies are given strict credit guidelines by their parent agency, the United States Department of Agriculture.

Original USDA interpretations made little distinction between habitually-delinquent borrowers and those with good repayment histories, Cumpton said.

"The only previously delinquent applications eligible for operating loans after the grace period will be those with a government-Ok'd restructured write-down that was in good standing. No more than one debt forgiveness on a previous direct loan will be allowed after the grace period," according to Jimmy Clark of Lubbock, who represented Combust in a private meeting with farmers and lenders last week in Lubbock.

An additional \$10 million for loans has been approved for Texas.

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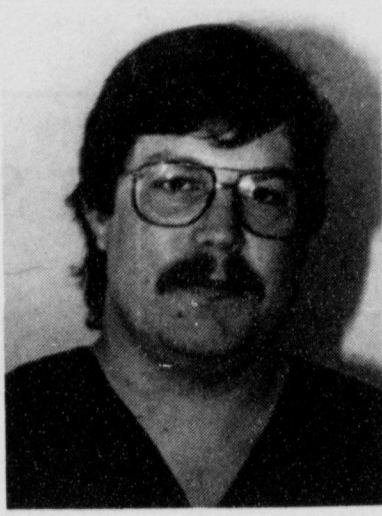

2. What do we want from our city government? Priorities need to be established and then examined on a regular

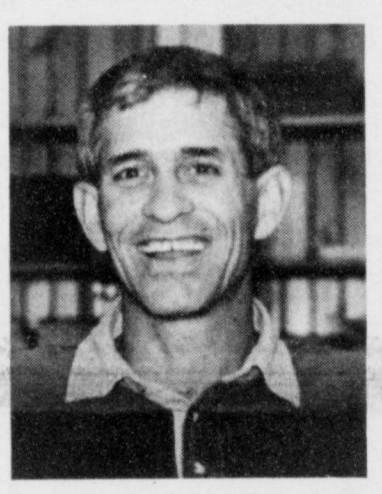

Wheat prices approaching record highs

The drought has slashed wheat production, causing wheat prices this month to reach their highest levels in more than 20 years.

On April 12, futures prices for hard red winter wheat topped \$6 a bushel for the first time since February 1974.

However, most Texas wheat farmers won't benefit much from the high prices. Farmers in Texas will see wheat pro-

duction cut by more than half from normal, and one estimate says wheat producers in the northern Texas Panhandle region will lose \$120 million.

Texas wheat producers are in a third year of below-normal production, and dry conditions have also kept them from grazing cattle on their wheat, which usually accounts for about one-third of their income.

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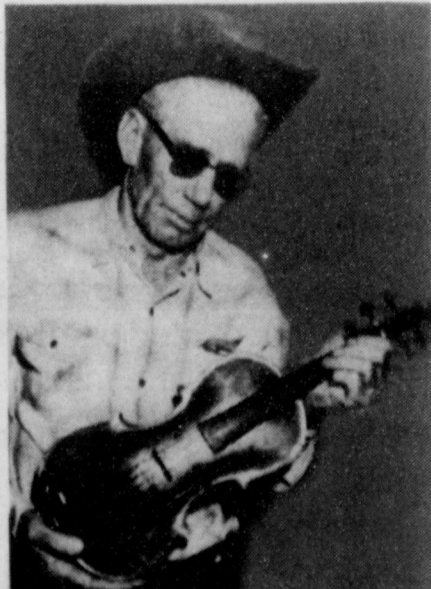

Faver succumbs to heat in state bid

ODESSA — Like an ice cube on hot pavement, Cari Faver's chances of returning to the state meet in the 1600 meters melted away in the near record temperatures that soared into the high 90s Saturday during the Region 1-3A girls track meet at Ratliff Stadium.

The Muleshoe High School junior sprinted out front early and stayed with the leaders through the first lap. Then the heat took hold, dragging Faver back in the pack. An obviously fatigued Faver finishing near the back.

"After a while, so many people passed me I stopped counting," said Faver, who finished third at the state meet last year. "But I don't want to make excuses, everybody had to run in it. I picked a bad day to have a bad race."

Mindy Martinez of Brownfield won the race with a time of 5:32.7 seconds, a time Faver had bettered by more than six seconds earlier in the year.

It was a tough meet for Faver, who got boxed in and bumped around in a rough 3200 meters final Friday. She was never really in contention.

"At least I'm not a senior," Faver said. "I still have another chance."

With a third-place finish in the 1600-meter relay, Abilene Wylie edged future District 1-3A opponent Childress to win the team title. Wylie finished with 80 points, six points in front of Childress.

Dimmitt was the top 2-3A school, finishing tied for 12th with 10 points. Muleshoe finished in a tie for 32nd with two points on Jo Beth Gilleland's fifth-place finish in the 300-meters.

No other Lady Mules reached the finals.

Former Muleshoe coach Bruce Lacefield was hired as defensive coordinator and head track coach at Class 2A Morton High School earlier this month.

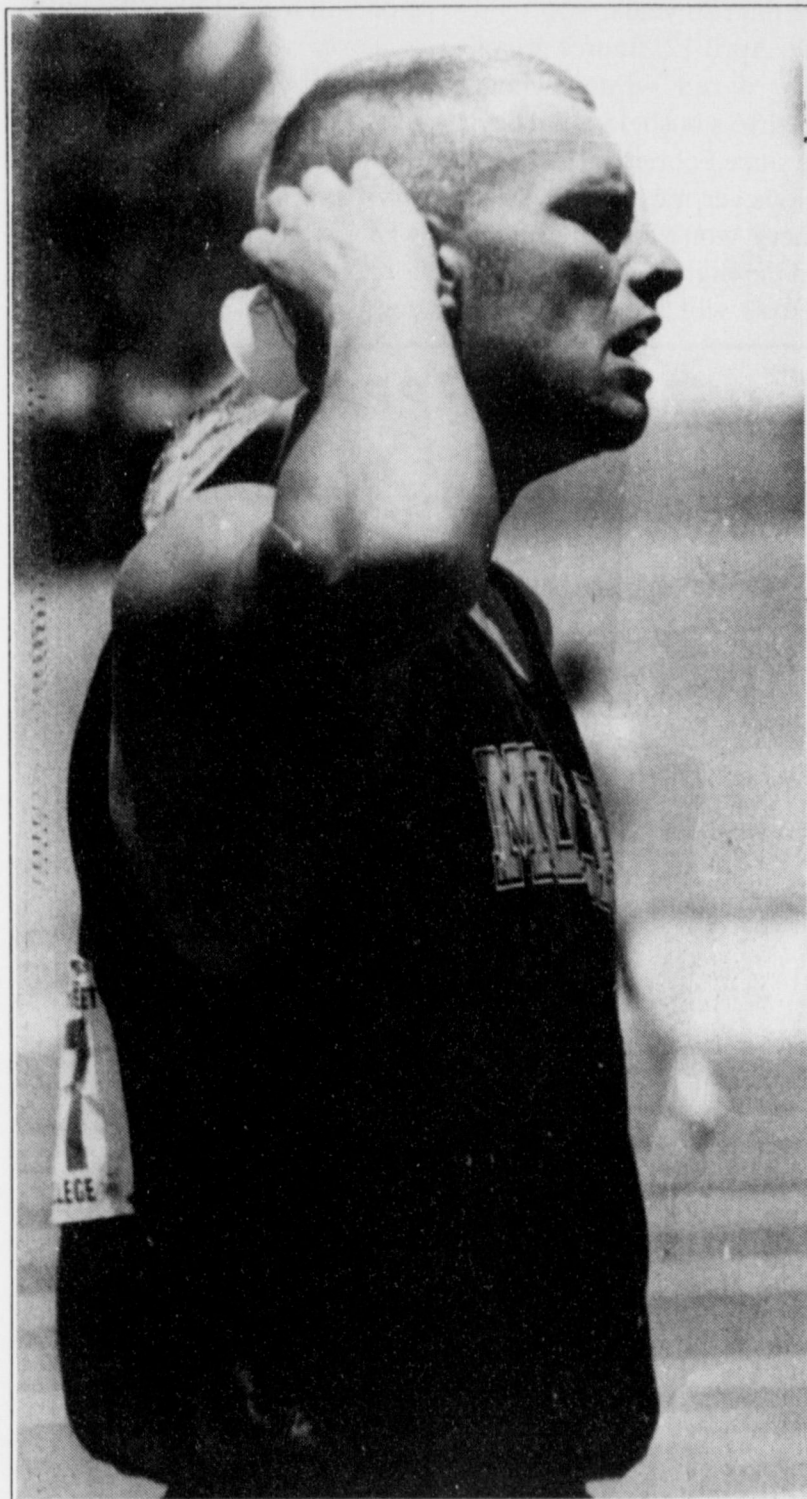
He started Monday. Lacefield was asked to resign by new athletic director David Wood in March.

Extra-base barrage boosts Floydada past Mules

It's one of those good news, bad news deals.

The good news is Muleshoe High School controls its fate. Win its last three games, and the Mules do no worse than finish second in the District 2-3A and gain a bi-district play-off spot.

The bad news is Muleshoe lost its fourth-straight district game Saturday, 16-11 at home to Floydada, dropping the Mules into a four-way tie for third at 3-4.

Michael Merkedo drove in six runs with a pair of home runs and a double and district-leading Floydada scored 14 times in the last three innings. Floydada (14-4 overall, 5-2 in district) gained sole possession of first place when Shallowater beat Friona, 5-3, dropping the Chieftains (9-12) to 4-3. In Saturday's third game, Littlefield beat Dimmitt, 4-2.

"That was a big game," Muleshoe coach Brad Hill said. "If we had won, it would have put us in a good position (for the playoffs) because we would have beaten Floydada twice."

Muleshoe (10-13) plays two of its last three games on the road, starting Tuesday at Friona.

"We're going to have to play good ball to beat Friona at Friona," Hill said. "Then Dimmitt comes here (Saturday) and they can hit the ball."

Muleshoe scored seven runs in the sixth inning to get within 12-11, making the most of just two hits while capitalizing on three errors, three walks and a hit batter.

Alfredo Gonzales had an RBI double and Rodney Alanis followed with a run-scoring single to cap the rally. Gonzales

fielder had a two-run home run in Floydada's six-run sixth.


Catcher Monty Anderson doubled, tripled and had three hits for Floydada, which managed seven hits off three Muleshoe pitchers.

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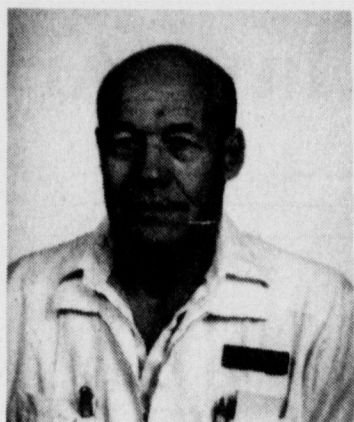

and 200 meters, and ran the third leg on the Wildcats' gold-medal winning 400-meter relay team.

Littlefield finished with 52 points. Future 1-3A opponents Tulia (42 points) and Childress (37 points) finished second and third. Dimmitt was sixth with 28 points.

The top two individuals in each event advance to the state meet in two weeks.

Garbarino, running in lane 4 in the finals after posting a semifinal-best time of 39.5, made up most of the stagger by the turn and came down the stretch with a comfortable lead. He struggled at little at the last two hurdles, knocking down the final hurdle before lunging across the finish line ahead of Alfonso Garcia of Crane (40.18) and Adam Jennings of Denver City (40.22).

"I've seen a lot of races won and lost at the last hurdle," Muleshoe boys track coach Ted Johnson said. "Fatigue was the main thing. He has to learn to stay mentally focused all the way through the finish line."

Chad Johnson came within a quarter inch of his career-best Saturday, but couldn't come up with the one big throw needed to go to state. Matt Fryer of Jacksboro won the shot with

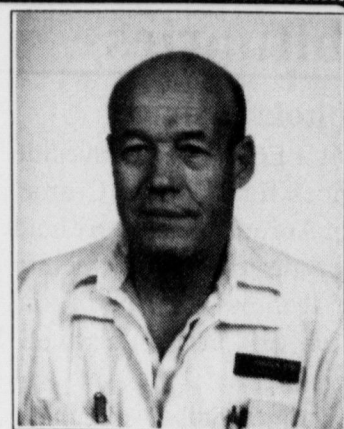
a throw of 54-11. Martin Salgado of Fabens was second at 53-9.

Plains, Lower Rio Grande Valley, Rolling Plains Central and the Southern Rolling Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zones. More suits are expected to be filed in the coming days and weeks. In all, the suits seek collection of more than a half million dollars plus court costs and attorney's fees from nonpayers in the four zones.

As of April 16, 1996, the Foundation had collected 97.4 percent of the total 1995 assessments due from producers in the zones with collections as follows: Southern Rolling Plains—99.4 percent, Rolling Plains Central—98.6 percent, High Plains—98.4 percent and the Lower Rio Grande Valley—88.4 percent.
