Homes of the Early Settlers The homes of the earliest settlers were nearly all one-half dugouts. They were small, but warm and comfortable. The cavity was made about three feet and a wall was then built up about three feet more. The inside wall was made of cedar logs and plastered with white mud. This made the place clean, safe and very nice looking. The outside was built up around the logs with rocks that were also plastered together. Either a glass window or a wooden shutter was put in each side of the room. The roof was made in a triangle and three huge red cedar logs were placed as beams going lengthways with the room. Across along a ledge, the back went into Patton present. the earth and the front opened
