

USDA Officials To Hold "Shirtsleeves" Conferences

Ralph T. Price, chairman, Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation State Committee, today announced three farm policy meetings to be held this month.

The meeting for this area will be held May 24, 1967, from 10:00 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. at the Lamesa High School Auditorium, 14th and Avenue F, Lamesa. These meetings are being scheduled as requested by the Secretary of Agriculture in order to learn the current thinking of county, area, and state leaders of farm organizations and of individual farmers. Agency officials are to report to the Secretary the comments and recommendations of those in attendance. Horace D. Godfrey, National ASCS Administrator, will attend the meeting and lead the discussion.

Secretary Freeman recently held three such "shirtsleeves" meetings with farmers in major midwest states. He returned to Washington convinced that such face-to-face talks are worthwhile in reaching important policy and program decisions.

"Along with the statistics I get from our economists," he has said, "I constantly need the personalized and highly specific information that comes out of peoples' experience. I also need the best ideas I can get from farmers and their leaders as to how to improve our programs and improve farm prices and income."

Chairman Price points out that the Secretary has been increasingly concerned about the level of farm prices and the cost-price squeeze on farmers, a squeeze that has become progressively more severe in recent months. He is determined to do everything possible to relieve this situation, and believes that the wisdom and counsel of State and area farm leaders—gained in frank and informal personal discussions—can help the Administration to make the right decisions during this critical period.

The Chairman said that special invitations to attend the state meetings have been sent to farm leaders, and that area farmers also are invited to attend. Farmers will be encouraged to participate freely.

A new county agricultural agent was hired Monday by the Briscoe County Commissioners Court.

He is Kenneth D. Cook, formerly assistant county agent for Lubbock County, and will assume duties here June 1.

He will replace Leon Grosdidier, who resigned recently to take a job with a feed company.

The new county agent is married, and his wife has been employed as a teacher by the Silverton Independent School District. She has been teaching at Acuff this year.

Mr. Johnston is a brother of Mrs. Ray Thompson.

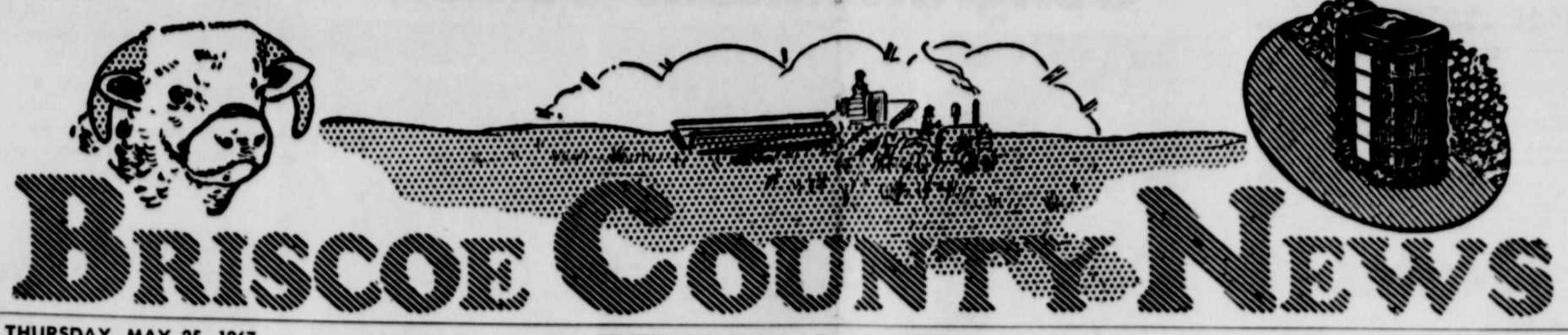
Recitals Planned

Planning your June menus? Be sure to add plentiful foods to your shopping list. May plentiful foods according to the USDA are eggs, orange juice, beef and potatoes.

Vacation time is fast approaching and in traveling about the question many times arises: Is it safe to use bar soap in a public washroom? A resounding YES is the answer based on repeated tests reported in medical and health journals. Scientific research shows that bar soap does not support the growth of bacteria under usage conditions. Moreover, bar soaps are inherently anti-bacterial because of their physical-chemical nature. While it is good manners to rinse soap after use, even a dirty bar does not constitute a health hazard.

Did you know that durable press curbs sheet shrinkage when washed? Treating bed linens and covers with a durable press finish has resulted in several benefits besides its basic no-iron properties. Because it reduces shrinkage when laundering cotton and blended-fiber bed sheets, standard sizes are being reduced from 108 to 104 inches, one from 120 to 115 inches in queen size.

Another change is marking sheets in terms of mattress size instead of torn size. These new markings are expected to aid homemakers to buy durable press flat and fitted sheets more nearly sealed to the beds they cover.

Careful pressing is a must if a garment is to have a professional look when finished.

Every dart should be pressed before a seam crosses it, and every seam should be pressed open before being crossed by another seam.

Some fabrics are more difficult to press than others, and some extra equipment is helpful when pressing particular fabrics. For

example, a needle board is helpful when pressing nap and pile fabrics. If a needle board is not available, you can press such fabrics as velvet, velveteen, corduroy, wool, broadcloth, etc. by placing a heavy terry towel or left-over piece of fabric on the ironing board. Place the garment gently over the ironing board, wrong side up. Press with a steam iron.

Short seams in napped or pile fabrics can be pressed over a stiff brush. Turn the bristles up. The nap interlocks with the bristles and the fabric can be pressed without marking.

Matelasse is another fabric in which the technique is different from regular pressing. To press this fabric, let the iron stand on its heel, and move the wrong side of the seam across the base of the iron horizontally as you hold the seam open. Darts can be slashed open and pressed the same way.
