Residents of Briscoe County have been asked to help solve the mystery of the origins of several geographical names found on the county map.

This information is needed for a dictionary of Texas place names, including Briscoe and the other 253 counties, to be published soon by the East Texas State University press. Before Dr. Fred Tarpley, professor of English at the university, submits his final manuscript, he is appealing to county residents for assistance in contributing information about several names with unexplained origins.

With the following exceptions, the reasons for the choice of approximately 200 names found on detailed maps of the county have already been determined: Barrel Creek, Big Sandy Creek, Bluff Creek, Bull Run Creek, Burson Lake, Cherokee Creek, Coon Creek, Hackberry Creek, Hardseramble Creek, Horse Creek, Indian Creek, Marshall Creek, Mexican Creek, Pilgrim Creek, Pole Canyon, Troublesome Creek, Tule Creek, and Turkey Creek.

Dr. Tarpley, who started his research on Texas geographical names five years ago, has exhausted material available to him in history books, newspaper files, student research, and interviews with county leaders. He is hoping

Baptist Church Celebrating Diamond Jubilee This Week

Homecoming is planned June 16-18 by the First Baptist Church in Silvertown. Members of the church are extending an invitation to their diamond jubilee celebration to former members, pastors and music directors. A number of former pastors already have accepted the invitation and will be taking part in the homecoming program.

Friday evening, June 16, Rev. W. H. Jackson will be preaching and Bro. Don Ledbetter, who is a native of Silvertown who was called to serve the Lord, will bring news on the Elko Mission work.

Saturday, June 17, Bro. Ira Fulgham will be preaching at the services scheduled.

Sunday, June 18, Bro. Jesse Leverett will be preaching at the morning service. At noon a barbe-

cue lunch will be served in the school cafeteria, and Bro. Carlos McLeod will be preaching at the service which is scheduled for 3:00 p.m.

Growth from a handful of pioneer citizens who congregated in the school house and county courthouse to a thriving facility with several staff members who serve many descendants of those early settlers will be noted during the celebration.

"The 75th anniversary celebration will be a three-day occasion, with special services Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Former pastors will be special guests. Friday and Saturday services will be at 8:00 p.m. with a Sunday morning service and a special service at 3:00 p.m. Sunday," said Rev. Clyde R. Cain, pastor. Dinner will be served at the school cafeteria, with meat and drink to be provided and those attending to bring the dessert and the salads.

"Former music directors have been invited to lead the music program, and nursery facilities will be provided," added Rev. Cain.

The church has a present membership of 992, with many of the present members descendants of those early settlers who established the church. Several four-generation families now appear on the membership rolls, including Mrs. H. L. O. Riddell, her daughter and son-in-law, the R. C. Hut-

sells, and their son and family, the Edsel Hutsells.

Mrs. A. D. Arnold is the mother of Mrs. Ruby Gilkeyson, who is the mother of two daughters, both of whom hold membership in the church. They are Mrs. L. B. Garvin, jr. and Mrs. H. B. Simpson.

Information Kits Available For Medicare People

Medicare beneficiaries who signed up for medical insurance protection can now obtain an information kit to help them keep a record of their doctor bills so they will know when they reach their yearly \$50 deductible.

The kit includes a record-keeping folder and two leaflets which tell how to request payment for medicare claims. The folder has pockets for holding doctor bills and space to write the date and amount of each bill.

Those who wish to obtain the kit can get one from the Amarillo social security office at 1006 S. Adams, telephone DR6-5151. Also, people who need help in completing a medical insurance claim are invited to get help from the social security office.

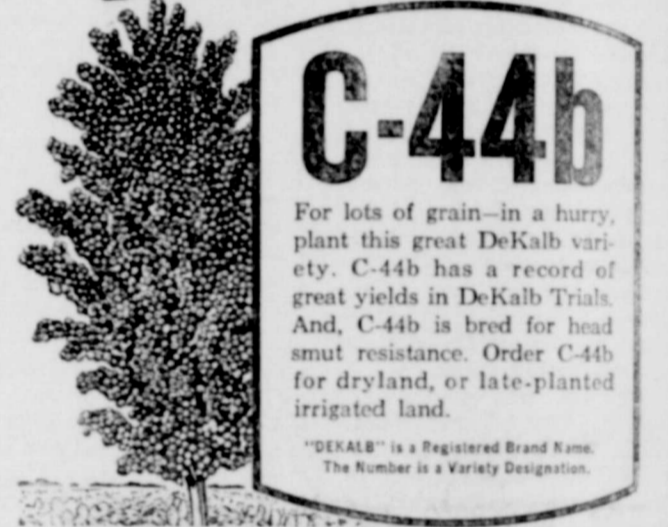
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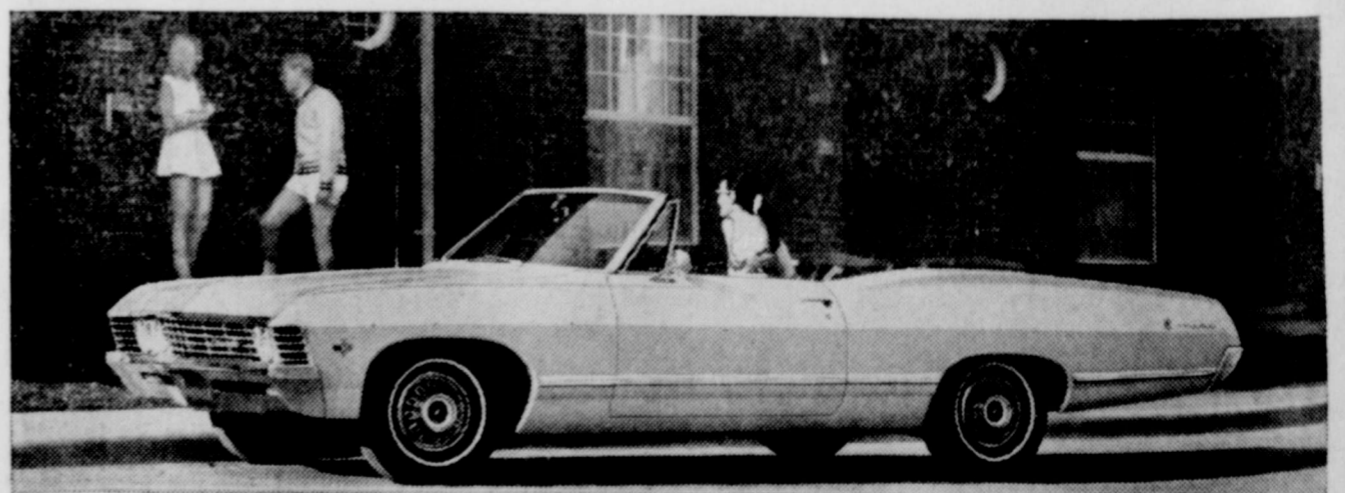

Mrs. Jim Clemmer directs the five-day kindergarten and the custodian is Manley Wood. The church also assists the mission in Elko, Nevada, which is directed by Don Ledbetter, former member of the Silverton First Baptist Church.

The first Sunday School for the church was organized here in October 1891, first meeting in the school building and later in the county courthouse. All denominations met together, and when the Presbyterian Church building was constructed, the community Sunday School met there until each denomination erected its own building.

The actual organization of the local First Baptist Church was in 1892 with 16 charter members. In 1901, the first building was constructed where the Chevrolet building now stands. Additional improvements were made in 1903. From 1911 until 1921, the church had nine pastors. Various departments of the organization were added after that time, and in 1931, a second church came into being — the Calvary Baptist Church. Organized on June 4, 1933 under the pastoral leadership of Rev. W. M. Lawrence, the church continued until 1946, when the two were combined. The present building was constructed in 1946.

Fiftieth anniversary was observed for First Baptist Church in 1942, and the local negro mission project was launched in 1943.

The church has continued to grow with a library dedicated on

May 20, 1952 to provide books, films and additional helps.

The New Jerusalem Baptist Mission for the Latin American people was begun in 1957. Buildings for both mission churches were constructed and are still in use. Educational building of the present church was erected in 1957 and a parsonage in 1960. The church is in a building program at the present time to construct added facilities and to remodel the present building.

Thirty pastors have served the Silverton church since Rev. W. S. Riddell first accepted the responsibility those 75 years ago — 75 eventful years, which will be remembered as old time members and pastors meet with the present membership for this, the diamond jubilee celebration.

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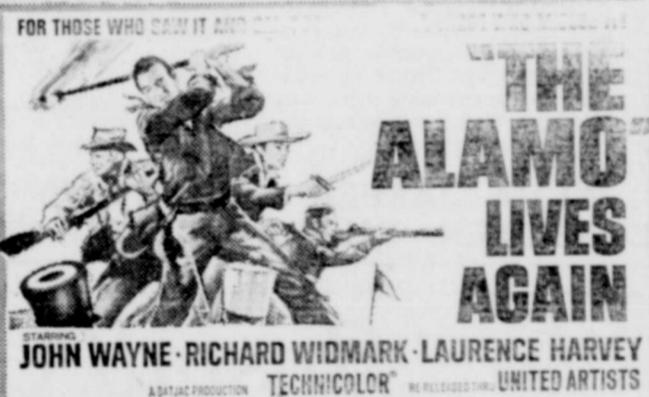


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Home Notes

June is Dairy Month and dairy products are included in the June USDA Plentiful Foods list. Other plentiful foods to watch for when shopping this month are beef, potatoes, dry beans, eggs and orange juice.

Cynthia Sutton, the senior 4-H dairy foods county winner, competed at the District 4-H Foods Show with the following dairy preparation.

Easter Surprise Dessert

- 1 cup sugar
- 4 tablespoons flour
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 5 tablespoons lemon juice

- 1 lemon rind, grated
- 3 eggs, beaten
- 1 1/2 cups milk
- 1/2 cup nonfat dry milk
- Whipped topping, coconut and assorted fruits as desired for garnish

Add sugar, flour and salt to butter; then lemon juice and rind. Blend well. Add beaten eggs to milk and stir well. Cook all together in double boiler, stirring constantly. Cool. Pour into dessert dishes. Garnish with whipped topping, coconut and fruit. Serves 4.

We have ordered the entry forms for the "Make It With Wool Contest." It may seem early

Popcorn For Cattle?

Cattle eating popcorn? Ridiculous! Maybe this idea isn't as far-fetched as it sounds. The latest method of preparing grains to increase feedlot cattle gains involves popping sorghum grain. Not enough research has been conducted to form any conclusions, but this method may improve cattle gains, says County Agent Ken Cook.

Such methods as grinding, steam-rolling, pressure cooking, flaking and reconstituting grain in air-tight silos have significantly increased gains in feedlot cattle.

The county agent says that the increasing interest in rations for cattle has been caused by the rise in number of marketed Texas feedlot cattle. Five percent of the marketed cattle in the state in 1955 came from feedlots. In 1960 the number represented 11 percent, and in 1966 more than 25 percent of the cattle came from feedlots.

A new leaflet, L-697, Rations for Growing and Finishing Cattle, is available at the County Agent's office listing information on starting cattle on feed and recommendations for using protein supplements, roughage, additives and minerals in rations.

County Agent Cook says that the system of starting cattle and feeding until slaughter on all grain, grain and protein supplement or all concentrate with no roughage has been practiced by

some feeders and is presently being studied at Texas A&M University. He added that feed per 100 pounds of gain is reduced considerably, thus lowering production costs, but that risk of higher death losses, founder, liver abscesses, rumen ulcers and slaughter price dock are some of the areas that need further study before definite recommendations can be made.

Youth Classes Offered In Lubbock

"Summer Time is Fun Time" is the theme of the summer Youth Classes offered at West Texas Museum on the Texas Tech campus, beginning June 19 for two sessions.

Art, rock collecting, speech, astronomy, birds, wildlife, anthropology and archaeology are included in the courses offered for boys and girls in grades one through twelve.

Registration for all classes may be made in person at the Museum or by mail.

Registrations should be made early, as classes are limited due to lack of facilities in the present Museum building.

This summer marks the fourth year of the full curriculum for the Youth Classes, although the Museum has offered classes in art instruction since 1950. Creative Art classes, the most popular last summer, will be offered again this year. Grades 1-3 will meet from 9:30 until 10:30 a.m. during the two-week sessions, and grades 4-6 will meet from 10:45 until 11:45 a.m. A class in paper craft, for grades 7-12, will meet from 1:15 until 2:15 p.m. Tuition for each class is \$10.00.

Junior Rockhounds, a basic study of rocks and minerals, and a class in the fundamentals of speech will be available for grades 4-7. The rock study will be held from 9:00-10:00 a.m. during both sessions, and the speech class will meet from 1:15-2:15 p.m. Tuition for each class is \$5.00 per session.

Astronomy, Birds of the Southwest, and Trailing Texas Wildlife are three classes geared to the interests of boys and girls in grades 5-12. Tuition for each class is \$5.00.

Astronomy students will use the Spitz Planetarium in their basic study of the solar system. The class will meet from 10:00-11:00 a.m. during both sessions.

Birds of the Southwest will meet during the first session only, June 19-30, from 11:00 a.m.-12:00 noon. Students will learn to identify species native to the West Texas region.

Trailing Texas Wildlife meets the second session only (July 17-28) from 11:00 a.m.-12:00 noon.

Teenagers, in grades 7 through 12, will find Anthropology, Archaeology and Speech offered, with tuition of \$5.00 for each course.

The archaeology classes will meet from 1:15-2:15 p.m. and the course will be climaxed with a field trip.

Anthropology will meet from 2:30-3:30 p.m. and speech class will be held at the same hour.

Deadline for registration for the first session (June 19-30) was June 12. The second session is July 17-28. Deadline for registration is July 10.

Some classes fulfill partial requirements for Boy Scout and Girl Scout badges and Camp Fire honors.

Frontier Tracing stamps will be accepted for tuition at the rate of \$2.00 per book.
