As I sit at my job this Fourth of July, hating to work on a day that is a holiday for most Americans but grateful for the right to work, I am thinking what a beautiful country this is that we live in. This morning everything is fresh, washed clean again by the gentle rains which began falling in the early hours. The birds are singing, the grass is green. It there a more beautiful spot on earth?

A surge of pride and love of country fills me when I see flags flying and think of the love of homeland which inspired our forefathers to sacrifice their own comforts to map the future of succeeding generations. Can there be a man with soul so dead that to himself has never said: 'this is my land, my native land.'

Earlier this week, I was reading comments by an Amarillo Daily News columnist on the inspiration written into the musical drama "TEXAS" which is being staged in Palo Duro Canyon every night except Tuesdays all summer. In its second season, the show had impressed that writer during a death scene, the background for which is the cast softly singing "In the Sweet Bye and Bye."

The amphitheatre visitor would have to be "a man with soul so dead" not to be tremendously impressed by the use of the American and Texas flags in the drama. Is there a person who doesn't almost burst with pride at a dramatic display of the flag?

Perhaps some communist-inspired demonstrators—but are there really many of them? Most of the demonstrators are hired workers—demonstrating is their job. On some college campuses demonstrators are hired for \$3 a day, \$4 a day if they have beards. They don't care what the demonstration is for or against—they do it for the money alone. And these are the ones who are slopping mud on America's public image.

Is this Independence Day observance a mockery due to the world situation and the fact that Americans are dying in war in Vietnam?

I don't think so, and I have not talked with a soldier returned from combat who hasn't seemed dedicated to the belief that America is doing what she has to do. Doesn't the Bible indicate that wars and rumors of wars will be with us forever? And in our National Anthem, have you ever read the words that Francis Scott Key wrote so long ago in his fourth verse?

Oh, thus be it ever
When freemen shall stand
Between their loved homes
And the war's desolation;
Blest with vict'ry and peace,
May the Heaven-rescued land
Praise the Power that hath made
And preserved us a nation!

Then conquer we must,
When our cause it is just;
And this be our motto:
"In God is our trust!"
And the star spangled banner
In triumph shall wave
O'er the land of the free,
And the home of the brave.

County Pioneer Buried At Lockney

Funeral services for Mrs. Emma Waller, 100, were conducted Thursday morning of last week in the Kress Church of Christ with Elmer Adecock, minister, officiating. Burial was in the Lockney cemetery by the side of her late husband.

Mrs. Waller died Tuesday night at Nichols Manor in Tulia. She was a member of the Kress Church of Christ, and had made her home with a daughter at Kress before entering the nursing home at Tulia.

The former Miss Emma Cooper, she was born October 21, 1866, in Dallas County. She married Nat G. Waller July 30, 1885, at Thorpe Springs, where she attended Adran Christian College.

The Wallers moved to Silvertown in 1890, and lived in a dugout in the canyons. They later built an adobe house with attached lean-to. Mrs. Waller was the first white woman to live in Briscoe County.

Mr. and Mrs. Waller helped organize Briscoe County in 1892, and he was elected to serve as county surveyor on the first slate of officers elected in this county.

Mr. and Mrs. Waller helped organize the Silvertown Church of Christ in 1893, and were charter members.

They moved to Lockney in 1901, and she was widowed in 1905. Mrs. Waller moved to Kress in 1943.

She is survived by two sons, Byrt Waller of LaMerada, California, and Nat G. Waller, jr. of Live Oak, California; three daughters, Mrs. Modenia Trussell and Mrs. Mary Morton, both of Kress, and Mrs. Annie Moore of Tulia; two sisters, Mrs. Carrie Arthur of Maricopa, California, and Mrs. Linnie Campbell of Hereford; 16 grandchildren and 33 great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Waller was a sister of the late Mrs. T. L. Anderson, and is survived by two nieces, Mrs. Ruby Elliston and Miss Anna Lee Anderson, both of Silvertown.

SERIOUSLY INJURED

Local relatives received word Wednesday that their niece, Mrs. Shirley Chitty Hurst of Happy, had been seriously injured in a pickup accident near Claude about midnight Tuesday. She was reported to be suffering a broken hip and pelvis and possibly internal bleeding. It was thought that she would undergo surgery Wednesday afternoon.

Mrs. Hurst is in the intensive care unit at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

She is the niece of Mrs. Howard Parker of Vigo Park, and of Olos and Pete Chitty.

Born in Branson, Colorado, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. H. McPherson, she married George Douglas Reves on January 20, 1955, in Clovis, New Mexico.

Mrs. Reves was a member of the First Methodist Church in Lockney and was reared in the Providence community.

Survivors include her husband and the two injured children, of the home; her father, Henry H. McPherson of Silvertown; her adoptive parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ben McGhee of Lockney; and three brothers, Henry Milton McPherson of Tulia, Robert McPherson of Silvertown and Gale McPherson of Lockney.

Mrs. Reves and Dale were victims of a two-vehicle collision in Floyd County on Farm Road 2286 four miles north and a mile east of Aiken at the intersection of a county dirt road and the farm road. The two were pronounced dead at the scene.

Also injured in the accident were two other Reves children, Pam, 13, and Mike, 10. Another occupant of the Reves' car was Mrs. Elmo Reves, mother-in-law of Mrs. Hope Reves.

All were residents of the Sterley community.

Lone occupant of the pickup was Durward Jack of Lockney.

The injured were taken to Lockney Hospital by ambulance. Later Mrs. Reves and Pam were transferred to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock for treatment of head injuries. They were believed to be the most seriously injured.

Pamela was reported to be in the intensive care unit.

Mike Reves was said to have a broken collarbone and broken ribs.

Investigating officers said the Reves' car overturned twice after the collision, and all five passengers were thrown from the auto.

Precooked dry beans that cook in 20 to 30 minutes are now on the market in most states. Old fashioned navy bean soup or popular baked beans can be ready for the table in less than an hour from start to finish.

Flat-sided containers for freezing are more space-saving than cylindrical and tub-shaped cartons.

American or cheddar cheese claims a place in every cheese assortment. There are three strengths which range in price from high to low.

Mild cheddar has been aged for 60 to 90 days, a short period in the life of cheese, but it contributes to the lower cost. Medium cheese is aged six to nine months. It develops a stronger flavor and is more costly in terms of handling and storing. Sharp cheese spends a year or more in the aging and curing rooms while the full strong flavor is brought to its peak, and the processing expense rises.

Give your plumbing regular attention and care.

Plumbing represents about 10 percent of the value of your home costs, more when neglected. A faucet leaking 60 drops per minute will waste about 2,300 gallons of water in a year, and neglecting to put in a new washer may result in a damaged fitting. These tips may help you add years of service and satisfaction to your equipment.

Fix leaky faucets immediately to avoid costly damage. Use a force cup, or rubber plunger, to clear obstacles beyond the drain traps. Don't use drain chemicals without first trying this.

Keep foreign objects out of the drain. Never pour grease, fats, or oils down them. Drain a few quarts of water from your water heater periodically. This will remove sediment and prolong heater life. When repairing fixtures, always pad gripping tools to prevent marring.

Use non-abrasive cleaners on enamel fixtures and chrome-plated fittings. Be sure your water heater thermostat is set at the recommended level.

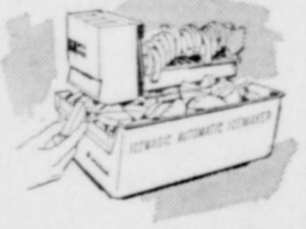

Whittington succeeds Denver Anderson and will join the other committee members, Beryl Long and Harold Storie, both of Silverton.

The three-member committee serves in an advisory capacity to the County Supervisor and makes

determinations as to eligibility for loan advances for the Agency. They are also frequently called upon by the County Supervisor to render assistance in the servicing of loans and the development of other community services.

The Farmers Home Administration does not compete with private lenders in the field of agricultural credit; however, they supplement such sources of credit and make loans on a long-range basis for the development of farms and ranches as well as improvement of community facilities, and provide housing for the rural residents. One of the most important programs is the family-

type loan to young farmers in ever-increasing numbers throughout the state. Recent authorizations have been given the Agency by Congress to make loans for recreation facilities for rural residents as well as financing multiple housing for senior citizens and labor housing associations. Another of the more extensive loan programs includes that of making loans for small towns and communities for the establishment or improvement of water and waste disposal systems.

Briscoe and Swisher counties are serviced by the Farmers Home Administration office located at 222 West Broadway, Tulla, Texas. The office hours are 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday except on legal holidays.

OPEN MEETINGS NOW MANDATORY—Gov. John Connally signs Senate Bill 94 in the presence of Garth Jones, Associated Press; Sen. OPEN MEETINGS MANDATORY BY GOVERNMENTAL BODIES

Gov. John Connally, on May 22, signed into law an "Open Meetings" bill which he proclaimed as "a great step forward for the people of Texas."

He was referring to Senate Bill 94 sponsored by Sen. Chet Brooks of Pasadena. Similar legislation was introduced in the House by Rep. Bill Rapp of Raymondville.

Passage of the "Open Meetings" legislation at the 1967 session culminated a drive that began some 20 years ago. It was engineered by legislators and the press to insure a better flow of information to the public.

At the bill signing ceremony, Governor Connally made this statement regarding the importance of the legislation:

"Senate Bill 94, commonly known as the open meetings bill, provides basically that all meetings of boards, agencies and commissions shall be open meetings, open to the press. This is something that the working press in the capitol and the press throughout the state have been interested in for a long, long time. I think it's an historic and significant bill and a significant day."

"Certainly there's never been any desire, as far as I know, on the part of anyone who serves on a board or an agency or commission to transact its business under the cloak of

secrecy. But, nevertheless, the meetings have, from time to time, been closed."

Connally added: "This bill will now end that and provide that all the meetings shall be open to the press. It's a great step forward in trying to provide a means where the public can be more informed with respect to governmental affairs and public affairs."

"Beyond any question, one of the weaknesses of a democratic society is that it's always difficult to try to articulate and to inform the public of the problems that surround the administration of government. I personally feel that if the public is informed, if it has the knowledge, people themselves will always make the right decisions. And this is going to be a step in providing the means where people can be better informed on the workings of their government."

Governor Connally further stated: "This is particularly important because the affairs of this state are run by the various agencies, boards and commissions. People generally do not quite understand the significance of these various boards, agencies and commissions and the work that they do and the decisions they make. It is really the heart and the essence of government in Texas."

"So I want to applaud the efforts of the press itself to bring into the light and to the awareness of the Legislature the need for this type of legislation. I want to commend the members of the Legislature who supported it and congratulate the people of Texas that they now can be better informed on their own affairs."

Excepted in the bill, so far as open meetings are concerned, are grand juries and certain executive sessions supported by or expending public funds. The law also excepts meetings called to consider the appointment, employment or dismissal of a public officer or employee or to hear complaints or charges brought against such persons, unless the individual concerned requests a public hearing.

Similar legislation was introduced by the Texas Press Association some 20 years ago. This year it had the backing not only of TPA but also the Texas Daily Newspaper Association and the Sigma Delta Chi journalistic fraternity, plus the support of radio and television media.

Co-sponsors of the new law, in addition to Senator Brooks, were the following Senators: Joe Christie of El Paso; Barbara Jordan of Houston; Criss Cole of Houston; Henry C. Grover of Houston; A. R. Schwartz of Galveston; and Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo.

Joining Representative Rapp in escorting the bill through the House were Representatives Russell Cummings and Paul Floyd, both of Houston.

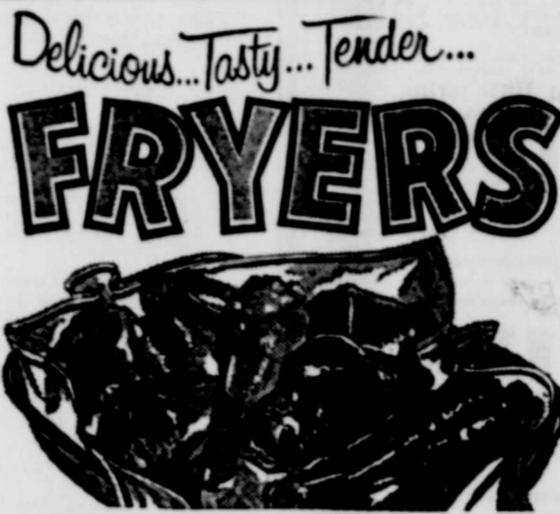
