## MR. AND MRS. C. O. ALLARD TO BE HONORED ON GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY

Mr. and Mrs. C. O. Allard will be honored with a golden wedding anniversary reception at their home in Silvertown Sunday, August 6, from 3:00 until 5:00 p.m.

Hosts for the reception will be Mrs. Allard's sisters and brother, Mr. and Mrs. S. M. Clayton, Jr. of O'Donnell, Mrs. Mildred Spann of Jackson, Mississippi, Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Jackson of Lubbock, and friends of the couple, Mr. and Mrs. Berton Hughes.

Mrs. Allard, Georgia as everyone knows her, was born Georgia Mae Jackson, in Higginsville, Missouri, on May 17, 1897. She moved to Texas with her parents in 1913, and lived near Lockney. They moved to Silvertown in 1916. Clifford Omra Allard was born in Stephenville on August 25, 1895. Mr. and Mrs. Allard were married August 4, 1917, in the First Methodist Church of Silvertown. The Rev. J. A. Bell, pastor, performed the wedding ceremony and Mr. and Mrs. Allard have made their home here since, with the exception of a year they lived in Quitaque.

Mrs. Allard has been active in Red Cross work, having served as Home Service Chairman for several years. She was recording secretary for the Floyd Association, now the Caprock Association, for ten years in the W. M. U. work of the Baptist Church. She is now serving her third year as chairman of the Briscoe County Historical Survey Committee.

Mr. Allard, Cliff as he is known, worked for the Phillips Petroleum Company for twenty years before going into business for himself as owner of the butane dealership in 1948. He retired this year, but is still active in farming and ranching. He is a member of the Lions Club and both are members of First Baptist Church here.

A gold color scheme carried out with yellow roses and other flowers will be used throughout the reception rooms, with the refreshment tables laid with linen cloths. Punch will be served from one table using milk glass China. A wedding cake and an arrangement of yellow roses will be used for the centerpiece. On the other table, a sterling silver service will be used to serve coffee, and a miniature buggy with bride and groom inside will be used as the centerpiece. The buggy will be hitched to a beautiful horse statue which Mr. Allard bought for his wife several years ago.

Relatives, friends and neighbors are invited to help Mr. and Mrs. Allard observe the occasion which marks the end of their first fifty years of wedded life.

worthy of preservation, according to Charles Woodburn of Amarillo, president of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

## Wheat Production To Be Highlighted At Meeting August 3

With planted wheat acreage on a downswing in Texas and average yields quite low, action must be taken to boost wheat production on the Panhandle.

With Briscoe County plantings some 55,000 acres and harvesting 37,200, yields were somewhat off. The average bushels planted were 16.1 with 23.8 bushels being harvested on the average. A total production of 885,000 bushels was accounted for in the entire county.

For this reason, a meeting will be held in Silvertown on August 3, at 8:00 a.m. at the City Cafe. The session is planned to last about one hour.

Keynote speakers will include Extension Specialists Dr. Bob Metzger, area agronomist; Jim Valentine, area soil chemist; and Don Rummel, area entomologist.

Metzger will discuss varieties as well as cultural practices significant to wheat production in Briscoe County. Valentine's comments will concern fertility and how proper fertilization practices can contribute toward higher yields and more forage for grazing. Insects and their affect on wheat production will be covered by Rummel.

Wheat contributes a major portion of the overall economy of Briscoe County and of the Panhandle. Adopting best known practices for higher yields, improved quality and cost reductions can greatly enhance the economic potential of this county. As pointed out in the Panhandle Economic Program—such crop production practices could result in a combined annual increase for the Panhandle area of \$40 million.

All wheat producers in the county are urged to attend the meeting.

The club members voted to send a \$3.00 donation to help redecorate the Caprock District room at the Texas Federation Headquarters in Austin.

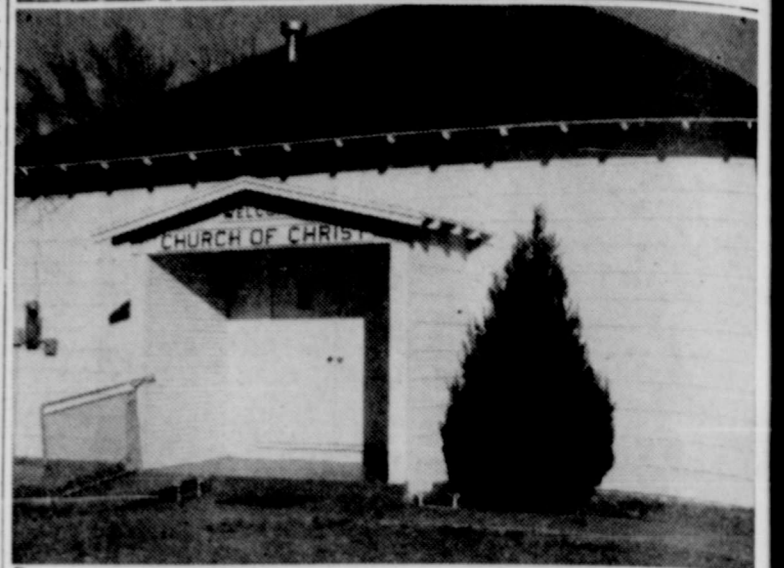

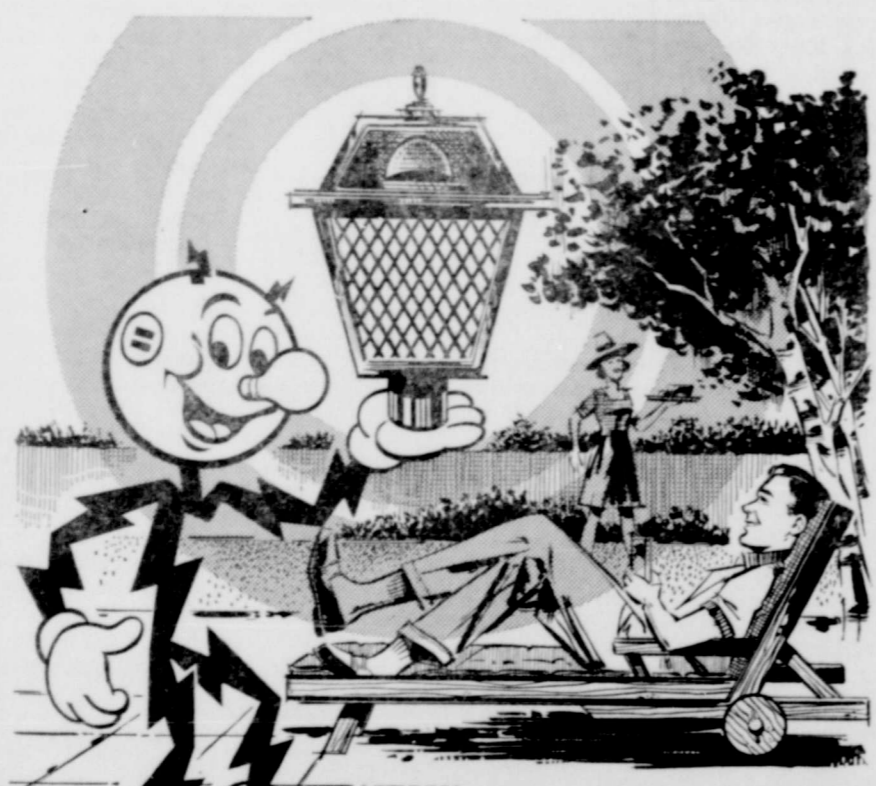

### Home Notes

It is with mixed emotions that I announce my resignation as Home Demonstration Agent for Briscoe County. You have been good to me and it seems I always put down roots wherever we settle, and make lasting attachments. The Randall County Commissioners Court approved appointing me as their Home Demonstration Agent effective September 1. We made this decision based on our needs to be closer to West Texas State University, because Winston is enrolled as a student there. Our plans are to be here about three weeks in August and take a few days annual leave to get moved and get the children in school.

You are invited to the 4-H County Dress Revue tonight at 8:00 o'clock in the Fellowship Hall of the First Baptist Church.

The two-day bi-district meetings for Home Demonstration Agents held in Amarillo last week was very worthwhile. We were presented a guideline or tool called "Focus" that was developed by the Federal Extension Service. Texas will have their "Focus" de-

veloped soon and then each county will develop its own. It is similar to the agricultural guidelines except it is developed for determining priority programing concerning family living. The areas of national concern have included five areas: family stability, consumer competence, family health, family housing, community and resource development. As you can see, it has a very broad base, but about every concern we have pertaining to family living is included. You will be hearing more about "Focus" in the weeks and months to come. The county family living sub-committee of the county program building committee will be considering their areas of concern in Briscoe County and making some recommendations for priority programs that will be useful to the Home Demonstration Council yearbook committee, the 4-H organization leaders, the county 4-H adult leaders association, youth organization, church groups, study clubs, and other government agencies.

The week of July 23-29 has been proclaimed National Farm Safety Week by President Lyndon B. Johnson.

The President in signing the proclamation emphasized "Agriculture remains America's first and most important industry. It

supplies food for our people and many millions throughout the world, and a vast measure of the raw materials used in the making of other products.

"Therefore, whatever diminishes or impedes the efficiency and productivity of our farmers is detrimental to men and women everywhere."

The objective of the National Farm Safety Week is to draw attention to the safety problems of farm and rural people and suggest ways to prevent accidents on the farm, in the home, and on the highways.

"Disabling injuries and the resultant economic losses are at an all-time high. Not only is a personal hardship involved, but we as a nation cannot tolerate the drain on our rural manpower and economic vitality in this time of critical world food needs," Leon J. Urban, manager of the National Safety Council Farm Department, points out.

In view of this costly loss of economy and the tragic loss of life, President Johnson makes this plea to America's farmers and their families:

"I urge all persons who live on farms, and those persons or groups allied with agriculture, to respond to applying full energy to the ongoing task of reducing accidents at work, in homes, at

Poisonings—Almost every day a child dies from accidental poisoning. One of the major causes is aspirin. Due to the use of large quantities of pesticides and other chemicals, the chance of a farm child being accidentally poisoned is even greater. Keep all medicines and chemicals locked out of the reach of small children, and do not store chemicals in pop bottles.

Playdays and judging contests will highlight the activities for the year.

Recent rains in Briscoe County have created favorable conditions for screwworm fly increases, and area livestock owners are alerted to watch their herds carefully.

Although the number of confirmed screwworm cases is under last year's count for this time of year, stockmen must continue the battle against this costly pest. Stockmen should watch their livestock throughout the summer and into the fall, to prevent the buildup which occurred last fall.

You ranchers and farmers should inspect animals carefully, check and treat all wounds, collect any larval samples and bring them in to the office to be sent off for identification.

This year, Mission lab officials say that there have been 61 screwworm cases reported throughout the nation, with Texas having 54 of these.
