## 4-H Club Members Earn County's Highest Award

Barbara Davis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Davis, and Larry Comer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leo Comer, were recipients of the Briscoe County 4-H Gold Star awards at the annual awards program held here recently. The Gold Star is the highest award presented on the county level, and is treasured by those who earn it.

Comer has completed four years of livestock projects; has participated in 4-H as a tractor operator four years; has been in junior leadership work for three years, and took part in 4-H soil judging contests two years. In the seven years he has worked in 4-H, he has won the distinction of being a member of the Champion Soil Judging Team of Texas (1965); placed first (1967) and fourth (1966) in the 4-H State Tractor Operator contest; and placed seventh in the Western Regional Tractor Operator contest (1967).

Barbara Lynn has been in 4-H Club work for six years, during which time she has completed four years of foods and nutrition projects; four years of clothing projects, and two years each in public speaking and junior leadership.

She was recipient of the Texas Youth Conference award (1967), Dress Revue and County Favorite Foods Show, attended District Junior Leadership Lab (1966), was in the method demonstration contest at District (1967) and was the County Favorite Foods contest winner (1964).

## Rev. G. A. Elrod Buried At Alvord

Funeral services for Rev. G. A. Elrod were conducted at 10:30 a.m. Saturday, November 11, in Elmwood Baptist Church in Abilene, with the Rev. Morgan Thompson, pastor, officiating, assisted by the Rev. Oscar R. Fanning, pastor of Wylie Baptist Church, and the Rev. Lewis Markwood, pastor of First Baptist Church in Roscoe.

Pallbearers were deacons from the last two churches that Rev. Elrod served: Ed Althof, John Boston, Woodrow Smith and Herbert Cooper, all of Roscoe; Gabe Garrison, Doug Arnold, Paul Ledbetter, Allen Kellum, Walter Bean, Raymond McJimmsey, all of Silvertown.

Burial was in Alvord Cemetery. Born February 27, 1896, in Alvord, he attended Alvord schools and Decatur Baptist College. He received his master's degree from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth in 1938.

Rev. Elrod pastored many churches in Texas and Oklahoma. He was pastor of First Baptist Church in Roscoe 1938-1945; then he moved to Silvertown, where he was pastor of First Baptist Church from April 1945 until April 1961, when failing health forced his retirement.

Rev. and Mrs. Elrod moved to Abilene in January 1965 to be near their daughter. They lived at 1209 Albany.

Rev. Elrod was a member of the Elmwood Baptist Church. He was a 32nd Degree Mason and a member of the Order of the Eastern Star.

Survivors include his wife, of the home; one daughter, Mrs. Charles R. Lindsey, of Abilene; two sons, Lowell A. Elrod of Baton Rouge, Louisiana and Festus A. Elrod of San Angelo; seven grandchildren, and one sister, Mrs. Oren Reeves of Hobart, Oklahoma.

## Silvertown Players Named To District 2-A Team

Three members of the Silvertown Owl football squad were named to the All-District 2-A team in voting by the coaches of the McLean Tigers, Claude Mustangs, Clarendon Bronchos, Wheeler Mustangs and Silvertown Owls recently. Five players received honorable mention, with two being named to All-District teams and also receiving honorable mention on the other team.

Harvey Masey, big senior Owl co-captain, was selected for the second consecutive year as an All-District tackle on the offensive unit. He also received an honorable mention as tackle on the defensive unit. Contributing his kick-off skill also, Masey has been uninjured and has started every game this year. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Masey.

Randy Cantwell, another big senior Owl co-captain, was elected to the All-District defensive team as an end, and received honorable mention as an end on the All-District offensive unit. Cantwell, who has been bothered by a neck injury this season, also started in every game. His tackling has been effective on defense and offensively, he has caught passes though scoring only once. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Cantwell.

Lannie Arnold, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Arnold and a junior letterman for the Owls, was named to the All-District defensive backfield. Arnold was Silvertown's quarterback this season until a neck injury during the Groom game sidelined him for the McLean game. He returned to the game as a running back and played in that position in all but one of the district games, having quarterbacked the team at Wheeler. He continued as the Owl passer, taking handoffs from Quarterback Mike Tate and neatly getting the passes away. He has made some tremendous punt and kick-off run-backs during the season, in addition to other services to the team.

Those receiving honorable mention on the All-District offensive team in addition to Cantwell were Cletus Grady, jr., junior halfback, and Bill Strange, freshman halfback. Grady is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Cletus Grady, and Strange is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Strange. These two big halfbacks combined to make up most of Silvertown's scoring power during the season, and both will be back on the squad next season.

Receiving an honorable mention on the All-District defensive unit in addition to Masey, was Tim Mattheus, another senior Owl co-captain, for his prowess as defensive halfback. Mattheus, though bothered by knee injuries and neck muscle spasms, was quite often the only Owl able to prevent the touchdown on long pass-plays by the opponents and was in on most defensive efforts as well as contributing to the team's offense. Mattheus played on the offensive unit more early in the season before he began accumulating injuries. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Mattheus.

## Correct Addresses On Overseas Mail Stressed

Postmaster Fred Strange today urged the citizens of Silvertown to be sure to use the correct addresses on letters and packages going to servicemen overseas to avoid serious delays in delivery.

Postmaster Strange reported that millions of letters and packages going overseas have been delayed because they were insufficiently addressed. He said that one of the biggest problems has been the failure of persons to include the very important five-digit APO or FPO number in the military address. Mail not containing this number is incorrectly addressed.

He said that last year more than nine million pieces of mail were delayed in delivery. Of this number, 3 1/2 million pieces failed to include the complete five-digit APO or FPO number in the address. This improperly addressed mail had to be sent to a military locator directory where time-consuming searches were made to determine the proper addresses.

The Christmas mail volume going overseas is expected to increase up to 30 percent or over four million pounds above last year, and every precaution should be taken by friends and relatives of servicemen to address their letters and packages properly to assure rapid delivery to its destination, the Postmaster added.

There are four essential elements to an overseas military address:

1. The serviceman's name, grade and service number
2. His complete military unit.
3. His gateway post office, New York, San Francisco or Seattle.
4. APO or FPO five-digit number

When any of these elements is missing, the letter or package will be delayed in delivery.

beings, you just don't hear them say that their sons are urging them to oppose the war. This mother told me: He says if we don't draw the line there in Vietnam, they will draw the line on our doorsteps.

What would the "flower children" do to keep the Viet Cong out of their yards and homes? If every Communist advance is allowed with no effort at controlling it, just how long do you think it would be before we, all snug in our homes, would find our very town being challenged?

Why can't these people realize that they are damaging America with their demonstrations more than a political philosophy could, by demoralizing our troops and letting them think that their sacrifices and efforts for their coun-

try amount to naught? This is the way Communism is supposed to work—I hope we haven't been invaded to the extent that America is already too weak to survive. The young people need to be prepared with the love of country and patriotic pride strong enough to repel these threats as they are presented to them. Political differences of opinion are alright, but we need to remember that basically we are all Americans—black, white, yellow and red—working in a brotherhood for a better life.

The office of President of the United States of America should command great respect, but these days it is becoming the "in-thing" to see who can belittle him best. Can you imagine any person being deliberately personally attacked by the pastor from the pulpit in his church on Sunday morning?

Granted, you may think a preacher is preaching a sermon at you and if your conscience is guilty, it may be that the preacher is really getting down to business. But the preacher at the church where President Johnson went to worship recently almost called him by name—made it so clear that no one could miss knowing to whom he was preaching. "To force a man and his family to listen to a political lecture from the pulpit in God's house when all rules of etiquette, ethics and protocol would not permit them leaving, is against all principles of freedom. How a man of God could deliberately refuse to give the spiritual food and peace of mind the President of our country sought in the house of the Lord, in order to blast him with the same problems that beset him at every turn, is beyond comprehension," said one patriot. What is religion coming to when it stoops to this?

It makes little difference what you think of the personality of the man who holds the office of President of the United States, what party he represents or his political philosophy, he is still the man we elected to be our President and he deserves the respect of all Americans so he can command the respect of the world.

Recently an article entitled, "The Plight of American Youth: No More Heroes," was published in the Sunday magazine section, "Parade," in which a 19-year-old sophomore at U.C.L.A. made several statements which parallel my thoughts to an extent today:

"When a man's in trouble, you can do one of two things—help him or leave him.

"This country is now in trouble. War is always trouble. Okay, do we say, 'This is none of our doing. Harry Truman made the basic mistake in 1945 when he befriended the miserable French instead of Ho Chi Minh?' Do we blame John Foster Dulles or President Kennedy, who, after all, sent the first large batch of troops to Vietnam?"

"What good does all that do? The country's at war. Let's get a peace with honor and dignity. The Communists respect one thing—power. You can't negotiate from weakness. Any fool knows that. You got to stay in and fight, or you've had it.

"What it amounts to is that we're stuck. We've gotta see this thing through. Besides, what alternative have we got? I hear all this about defeating Johnson at the polls.

"Okay, say Johnson is zapped.

Who replaces him, a Dove? Nixon is a Hawk. Rockefeller is a Hawk. Reagan is the worst Hawk of the lot.

"No, sir, the country has got to get behind Johnson. He believes in the concept of a limited war. He's announced that we're ready to pull all the American troops out of Vietnam six months after peace is declared. Is that unreasonable? Or would you rather take on China and Russia right now?"

"Johnson didn't start this war. He inherited it. Maybe he should've examined his inheritance a little more carefully. Maybe he could have hired different estate appraisers. But he didn't, and he's paying the price. But what kind of fair-weather people are we?"

"The Communists say we have no resolution, no moral fiber, no backbone, that we're flabby and decadent.

"It's costing us plenty in blood and money and it will probably cost us more. But they're not ha-

ving a picnic either. We've got to stay, because we announced to the world we would stay. It's as simple as that.

"A nation is like a man, and a man is only as good as his word. This is no time to turn chicken on Johnson. Later, when the war is over, the people can do what the British did to Winston Churchill after World War II. They can turn him out if they want. I hate to sound like a two-bit cheerleader, but this is the time and place to fight, not to talk."

Let's spend Thanksgiving 1967 in thanks for our many blessings, recounting the rights and privileges that our country guarantees to each of us, and promising ourselves to do a better job of promoting America's welfare rather than ever being guilty of neglecting to polish the traditions for which our founding fathers died.

Need they have died in vain? Need our American servicemen think they are dying in vain? Pray

for them and write them letters of encouragement today!

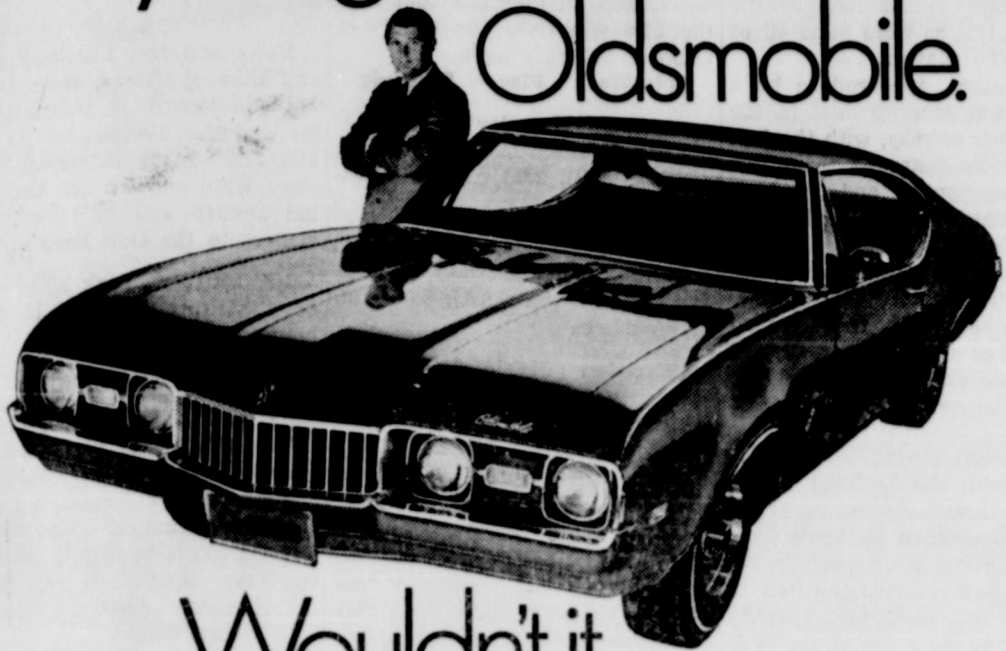

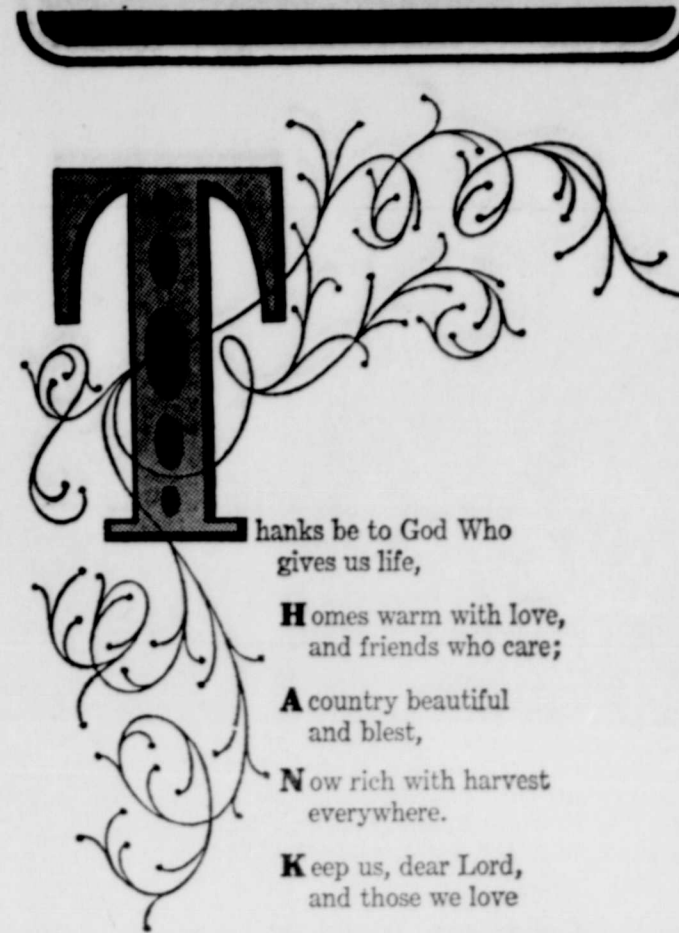

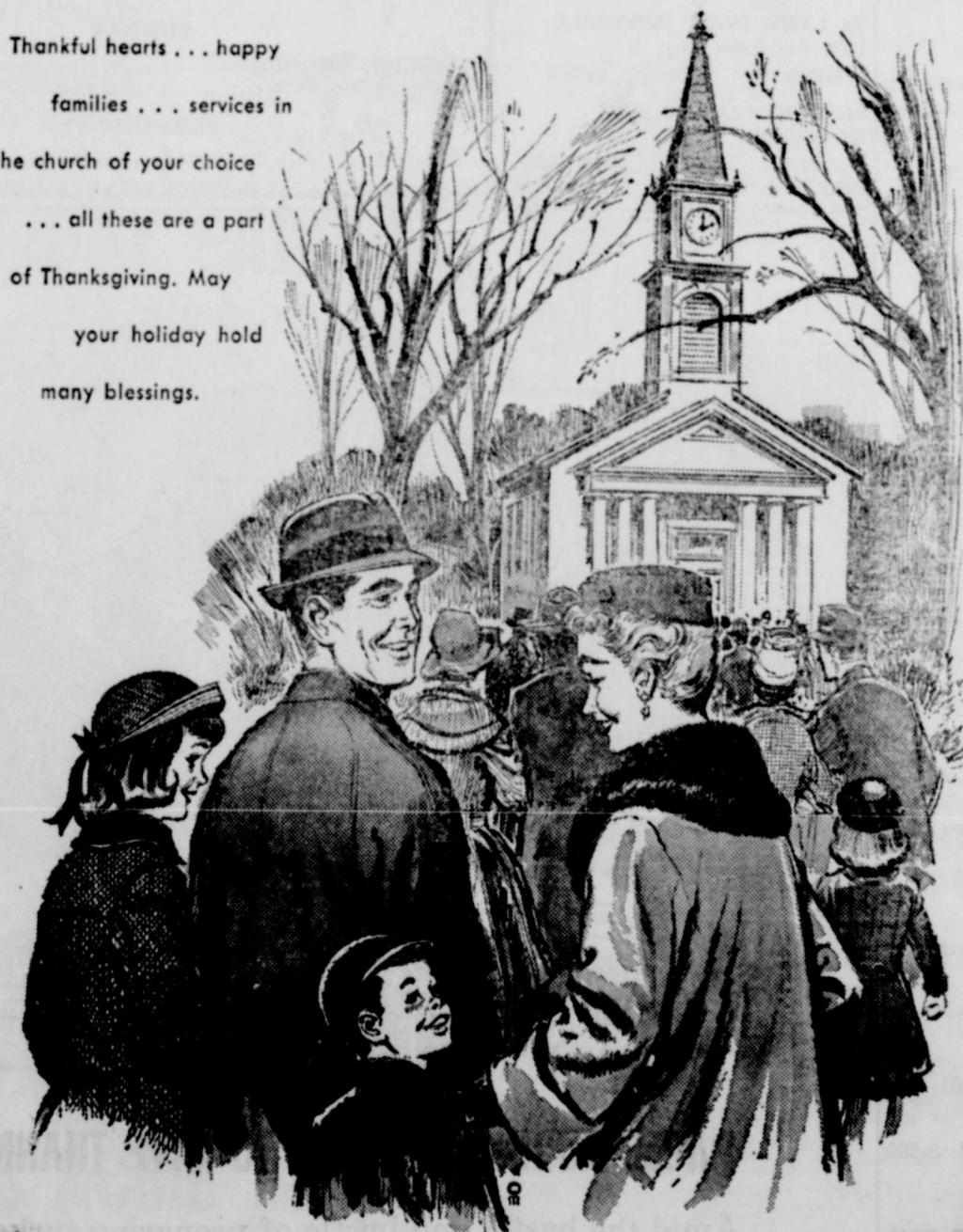

### Texas Federation President Is Guest Speaker Here

Mrs. B. F. Seay of Andrews, president of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, was guest speaker for the Silverton Federation Day Tea hosted by the Century of Progress Study Club at 3:00 p.m. Wednesday, November 15, in fellowship hall of the First Methodist Church.

The busy state president described her activities during the eighteen months she has represented Texas federated club women at activities across the nation. She related her personal observation of legislators at work in Austin during the three months she was there testifying on bills which were being backed by the federated women's clubs of Texas.

"We have two kinds of men representing us in Austin," she declared. "Some are politicians and some are statesmen. A poli-

tician is one who is always looking to the next election; a statesman is always looking to the next generation. And, ladies, let me tell you! we have quite a few more politicians than statesmen in Austin.

"Most of our older people aren't too happy about the prospects of driver re-examination, but when we realize that some of these people have been legally declared blind, and are driving themselves to get their old-age assistance checks, we know that these drivers have no business on our highways. The re-examination program for people over 65 would consist of eye and hearing tests and a test of their general knowledge of the rules of the road, rather than a test of your parallel parking skill.

"And it also amazes me that the proposed law which would require a sobriety test of every person involved in an accident where there are injuries or deaths continues to fail passage in Texas. There are many instances similar to the one in which a 23-year-old young man, loaded with enough alcohol to make several persons quite high, ploughed his car into a vehicle in which a mother and six children were killed. This brought the young man's total kill to nine, because in a similar accident earlier in his life, he had been guilty of driving while intoxicated into an accident which took three lives. He was driving with a suspended license at the time of the second accident. But we can't get laws passed to protect us from these drivers because so many of our legislators in Austin prefer to defend these V. I. P. D. W. L's in court rather than voting for laws which would help keep them off the highways," Mrs. Seay said. "I don't know if Ralph Wayne is your representative, but I would like to say that he is a most helpful representative and worked very hard to see passage of the proposed safety legislation,

seven of ten pieces of which did pass," Mrs. Seay added.

A native of Lubbock, the daughter of a deceased Church of Christ minister, Mrs. Seay is a forceful speaker who believes her causes are just and doesn't mind championing them.

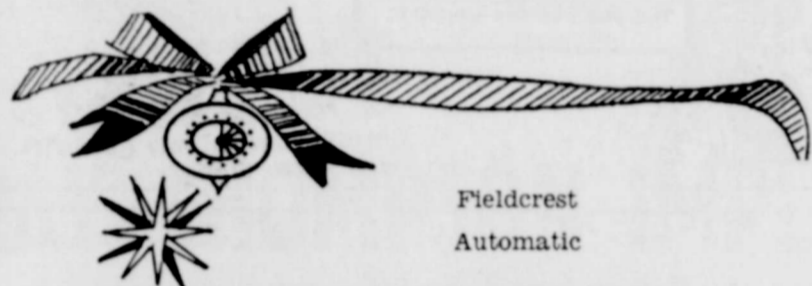
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# The Right Of Choice

Should the public be able to choose whether to use narcotics and other addictive drugs? That is one of the most talked about questions in our society today. The government and other sources are trying to ban everything from cigarette smoking to heroin and L.S.D. In some cases people such as the hippies and Dr. Leary of California, the man who made a religion out of drugs, are trying to increase their use.

However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian right has prior to August 23, 1967, commenced or completed the construction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1970, inclusive; provided an additional sworn statement is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the sworn statement or statements in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies.
