We need to use our best weapon—the ballot to curtail as much of the liquor traffic as possible, and place so many taxes on alcoholic consumption that some of the people, at least, can't afford excessive drink-

Panhandle Farmers and Ginners In Good Mood

With high yields, good quality, and top prices, farmers and ginners of the Eastern Panhandle are all smiles.

Harvesting and ginning advanced rapidly under ideal weather conditions. The seven classing tables in operation processed a NUMBER 48 total of 22,000 samples for the week ending November 24, 1967. This brought the seasonal total to 44.000 samples compared with 28,000 as of the same date in 1966.






