

### Problem: Catch Up With The Sun

The sun in the morning sky is much more important to man than the signal that a new day has begun. Since man first began marking time, the sun has always posed a problem. Leap years in our present Gregorian calendar are necessita-ted by the fact the solar year is longer than the calendar year. The problem is not new.

Sometime in the seventh century B. C., Numa Pompilius instituted the Roman calendar. Although it was revised several times, by the reign of Julius Ceasar, the Roman calendar was some two months behind

Ceasar put his best minds to work on a new calendar. They came up with a better method of keeping up, but could not decide what to do about the two months needed to actually catch up with the sun. They solved the problem by inserting two additional months between the months of November and December, making the then-current year, which we now refer to as 46 B. 
