Postal patrons can get the airlift service on packages maied to all military personnel at AP and FPO addresses overseas, ad in Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico. Postmaster Strange noted at the new airlift also applies to parcels mailed back to the States by servicemen from these military post offices.

Parcels on which the \$1.00 fee is paid get air transportation all the way-from here to the port of embarkation, and from there to the overseas base. Postal patrons formerly had to pay parcel post rates to get similar service.







Minors will have "provisional' stamped in white lettering in the band across the top of the license.

The Department of Public Safety will have 250 fulltime offices to handle the crush of in-person renewals. It had only 35 such of-

There are 5.8 million licensed drivers in Texas. About 2.5 million renewals are handled each year, but that's under the twoyear license system.

After a staggered start, all licenses will be good for four years and expire on the driver's birthday, for easier remembering.

If your license number ends with 1, 3, 5, 7 or 9, you will get only a two-year renewal. Evennumbered licenses will be renewed for four years. After that, ev-

eryone will get a four-year license. Four-year licenses will cost \$6 -double the money for double the time.

If you move or lose your license, it will cost you \$1 for a new license. This is 75c more than duplicates used to be. The color picture jacks up the price.

The picture will be taken on a roll of film that will be developed later. The new license will be mailed to you in about the same time previously needed for renewals - two to three weeks. Meanwhile you can drive on a DPS receipt.

All licenses will be laminated with clear plastic. No fair scratching over your picture just because you don't like it. Now alteration of licenses will carry a stiff penalty.
