Mr. and Mrs. Long and family were in Dallas from Thursday until Sunday.

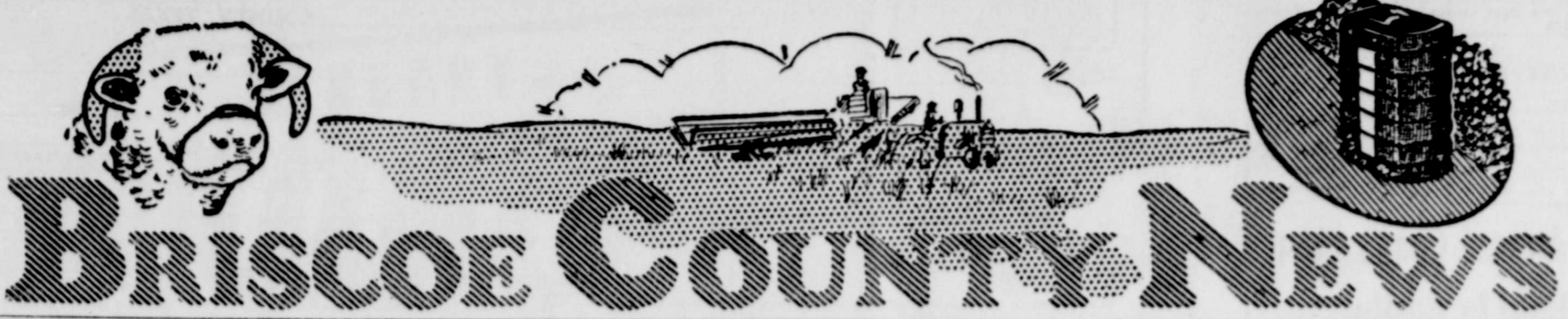
Louie Kitchens To Head Riding Club

Tax Depletion Data For Briscoe County Irrigation Farmers To Be Available Soon

A county-wide geological survey of the Ogalalla Formation is being made to establish guidelines for tax depletion purposes. This work is being done by W. D. Miller and W. E. Watkins, consulting geologists of Lubbock and Lamesa, who have made similar surveys in other counties outside the Water District. Charlie Rogers of Talia is assisting in this work.

All counties on the Southern High Plains are entitled to this tax deduction on their water, but for those counties outside of the Water District, the work has to be done on a commercial basis.

Wildcat Drilling Is Resumed Near Here

Texaco Inc. started again on a rank wildcat in the heart of the Palo Duro Basin in Briscoe County last week. The location was moved 30 feet east of the original filing with the Pampa office of the Texas Railroad Commission and had G. E. Kadane & Sons of Wichita Falls as contractor on its No. 1-A Glenn Cleveland "B". Operator was drilling at 2,743 feet. The test is to go to 6,500 feet to test the Pennsylvanian. There is no nearby production to the wildcat which is located 12 miles northeast of Silvertown. Texaco started its No. 1 Cleveland "B" but temporarily abandoned it at 1,702 feet in early October 1967. The location is about two miles south of the Texaco No. 1 Glenn Cleveland which was plugged and abandoned at total depth of 6,478 feet in lime on July 31, 1967.

**FARM INCOME TAX
 REPORTS DUE SOON**

Yep! It's that time again! Time to dig out all the farm records from the past year, consult the "Farmer's Tax Guide" and file that income tax return.

Completed returns must be filed by February 15 unless the farmer has already elected to file an estimated income tax return. If an estimated return has been filed, the farmer has until April 15 to file a complete return.

Farm business income and expenses should be included on Schedule F of Form 1040. Gross agricultural income includes receipts from crop and livestock sales, legislative program payments, qualifying patronage dividends, cash rental income and crop insurance proceeds.

On the other hand, farm expenses include such items as hired labor, repairs and maintenance, taxes, crop insurance premiums, interest on mortgages, cash rent payments, conservation costs, feed, seed, fertilizer, fuel, oil and other purchased supplies, storage costs, record books, qualifying farm organization dues and marketing and advertising costs.

Investment credit restrictions were relaxed after March 9, 1967. Qualifying credit may be claimed

Accident Statistics Revealed For 1967

The Texas Highway Patrol Supervisor for this area, Sergeant W. E. Wells, has announced the investigation of three accidents in

Briscoe County during November, in which two persons were injured and there was an estimated property damage of \$3,375.00, and two accidents during December which resulted in an estimated property damage of \$850.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for Briscoe County during the calendar year, 1967, shows a total of 34 crashes resulting in no persons killed, 23 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$32,965.00.

When the final traffic accident reports are tabulated for 1967, it is estimated that the death count for Texas will be 3,340 or about two per cent less than the all-time high of 3,406 traffic deaths in 1966. If this proves true, then it will be the first reduction in traffic deaths since 1960. This decrease should be a challenge for every driver to put forth his best defensive know-how and efforts to reduce accidents in 1968.

The Sergeant cautions all motorists to keep windshield, windows, outside rear-view mirrors, and all lights clear of ice, snow, sleet, dirt and mud. The driver's vision is obstructed in one out of five fatal accidents.

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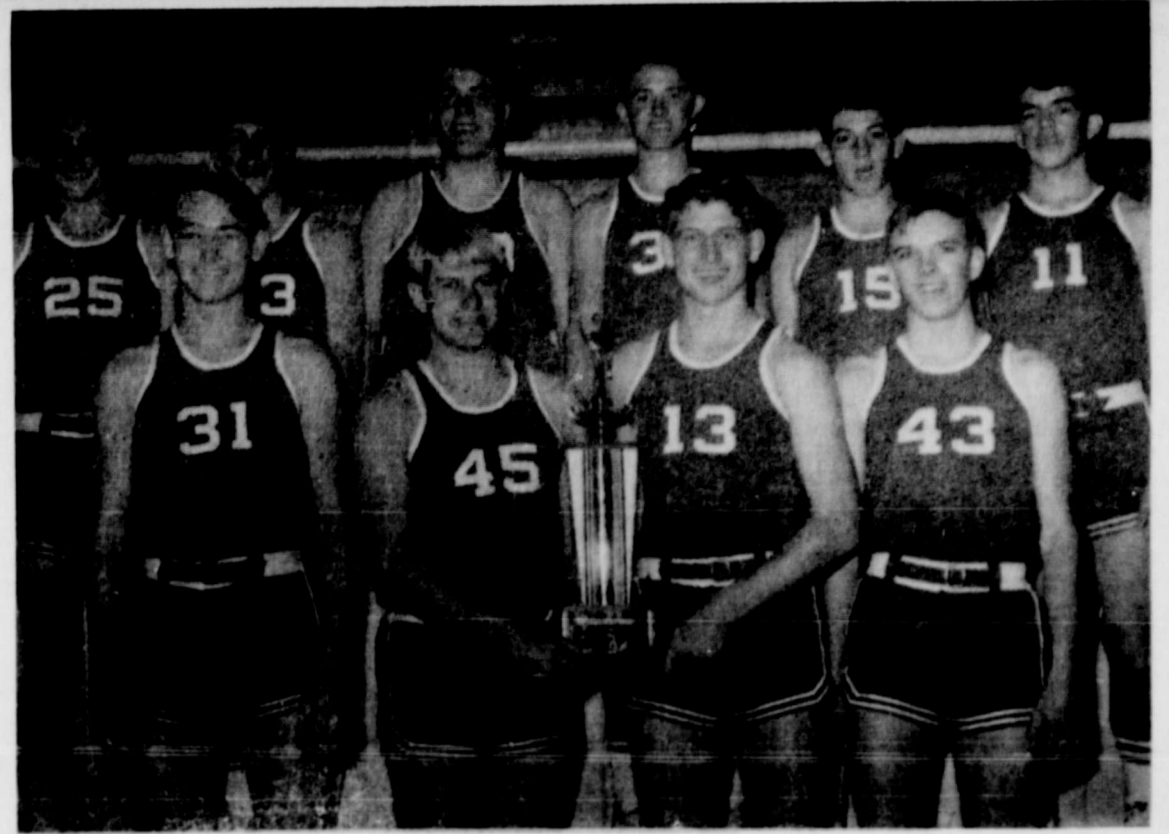
